

Lion Nine Tops Colgate, 9-4

Penn State's baseball team dug itself into a hole yesterday but managed to come back strongly and defeat Colgate by a 9-4 score. The victory was the fifth in a row for the Lions and their first of the season on the road.

All of Colgate's runs came in the first when State starter Denny Lingenfelter gave up three walks and the Lion defense fell apart to the tune of three errors. State gave the Red Raiders so much help that the four runs were scored without the benefit of a basehit.

Lingenfelter walked the first two batters of the game. When Tom Wilson bunted, Lingenfelter fielded the ball and threw wildly to first, one run scoring. The next hitter, catcher Ray Ilg, also drew a pass. John Reid then grounded into a force at second, and the Colgate's second run crossed the plate.

Two Throwing Errors
State handed the Red Raiders their next two runs on a silver platter. Reid set out to steal second, and when Lion catcher Toby Frymire threw the ball into centerfield Wilson scored and Reid kept right on running for third. Farrell Franks picked up the ball in center and, trying for a play on Reid, threw over third baseman Steve Bazarnic's head. Reid was able to waltz in with the Raiders' fourth run.

Although all this scoring took place without a hit, State coach Chuck Medlar thought a pitching change would be appropriate. Left hander Dick Foster was summoned from the bull pen and proceeded to turn in one of State's best pitching efforts of the year.

Foster gave up a hit to the first man he faced but went on to retire the side. He gave up only one hit the rest of the way.

State Bounces Back
State got back in the ball game with four runs in the third. Franks walked with one out, Bazarnic singled and Dave Fore also walked, loading the bases. Shorty Stoner took a careful look at every pitch and wound up receiving the third pass of the inning, forcing in State's first run.

Gary Kanaskie grounded out scoring Bazarnic with the second tally. Ken Barto, batting with two out, rapped a line single driving in two runs and knotting the game at 4-4.

The Lions scored what proved to be the decisive run in the fourth as John Featherstone singled, moved to second on Foster's sacrifice, and crossed the plate on Bazarnic's single.

The bats kept rattling as the Lions piled on two runs in the sixth and two more in the eighth. Franks picked up two RBIs in the sixth with a bases loaded double. Fore tripled and Stoner doubled to highlight the Lions eighth inning action.

"We were very impressed with Foster," commented Medlar after the game. "He did a fine job under the adverse conditions."

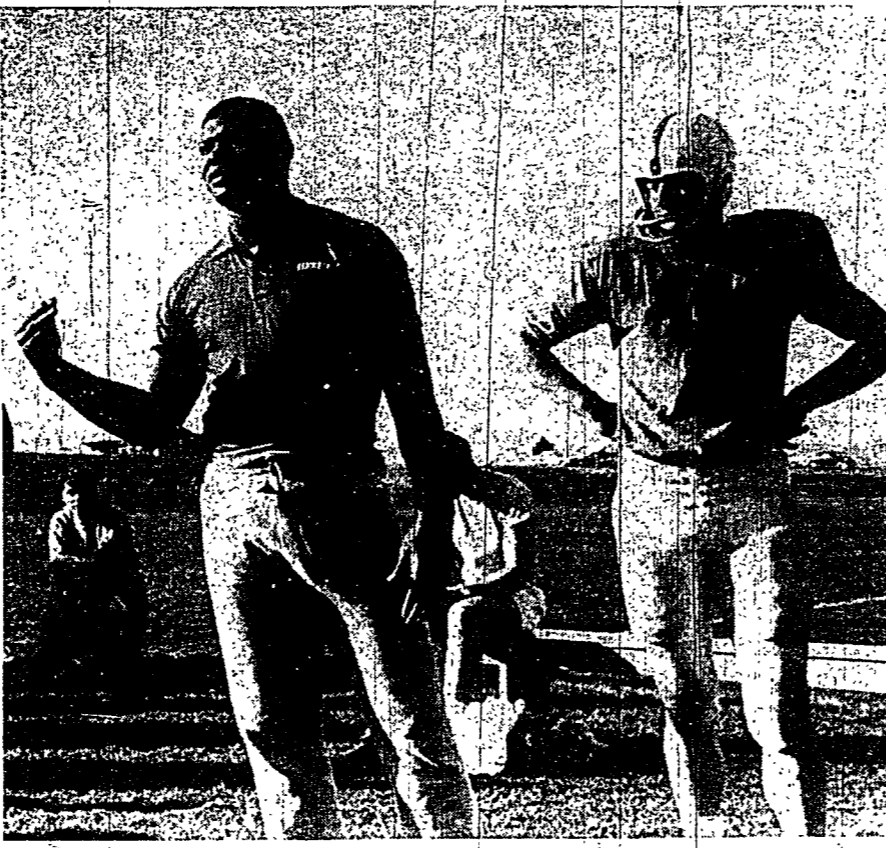

Penn State's golf team extended its winning streak to four straight yesterday in downing the Orangemen from Syracuse 5 to 2. The match, played on Syracuse' hilltop Drumlins Golf Course, was again hampered by a persistent wind. Penn State now stands at 6-3 on the season.

Dave Hamby, exhibiting his best golf so far this season, shot a 3 under par 68 in winning medalist honors for the second consecutive match. The Lions senior defeated Till of Piety Hill 4 and 3.

For the first time this year, number two man, Scott Yard, was defeated. Although shooting fine golf, Yard was upset by Bushee 3 and 2.

The only other individual loss by a State linksman was suffered by number 3 golfer Jim Geiger. He was also upset 3 and 2.

The remainder of the Lion lineup proved to be winners yesterday. Ernie Saniga in the number four slot downed Benjamin of Syracuse 4 and 2. Number five man Dick Johnson again demonstrated his consistent play, defeating Pagano 6 and 5.

The only sophomore to crack the starting squad, Frank Guise, made it two out of three in varsity competition by overcoming Beyer 5 and 3.

Holding up the tail end of the lineup was Rusty Washburn. Washburn shot an extremely fine 71, a score topped only by Hamby on the windy afternoon.

Coach Boyle has been quite pleased with the strong showing of his linksmen of late.

"These guys are really playing golf like they should," he said yesterday. "Our lineup is definitely set for Easterns as we have finally reached the point where our best men are in their strongest positions."

Relay Teams Score at Penn Relays

Penn State's 880-yard relay team set a Penn State record yesterday running in the Penn Relays. The team of Bob Kester, Rich Shane, Andy Wayne and Bob Beam combined for a time of 126.7 to place fifth in the trials and qualify for today's finals.

The same team qualified for the 440-yard relays with a preliminary time of 41.7. No other State competitors made the finals as Chip Rockwell failed to qualify in the triple jump with a mark of 22-9 and Jim McWilliams missed the discus finals with a throw of 152-5.

The distance medley team also finished out of the money in the trials with a time of 9:59.5 for sixth place.
