The Penn State Greeters Club will hold a panel discussion and evaluation of the courses in Food Service and Housing Administration at 8 tonight in the Maple Room of The College of Human Development South. Freshmen are urged to attend.

Panel members include: William Dean, Class of '48, head of hospitality programs at the Harrisburg Community College; Philip Haefner, Stokesay Restaurant manager; Norman Miller, food service director of York Hospital, and Clinton Quigley, '48, hotel and restaurant consultant for Smith-Derrick real estate.

Tonight's program initiates a three-part fall lecture series. Oct. 10, Hugh Sarraf, director of sanitation in Harrisburg, will discuss a research project compiled by the University dealing with "attitudes toward sanitation in restaurants." Oct. 24, Charles J. Grebinger from the Pan American Coffee Bureau in New York City, will present a coffee tasting demonstration.

Penn State Greeters, organized in the forties, is a student affiliate of the Penn State Hotel and Restaurant Society. The primary purpose of the Greeters is to keep students informed of career possibilities by maintaining contact with professionals in the hotel and restaurant field.

### Cater Buffets, Teas

Members get experience in quantity food preparation by catering buffets and teas for themselves and local and campus groups. The Greeters hold a major buffet once each term in the Maple Room of the College of Human Development South. The buffets, open to the public, cost about \$2.75, and are well attended.

The Greeters' major annual project is a formal spring dinner dance at The Nittany Lion Inn. The dance is held in conjunction with the yearly meeting of the Penn State Hotel and Restaurant Society and draws many alumni.

The Greeters annually send representatives to the New York Hotel Show at the Coliseum in November, an exposition of the latest developments in the hotel industry. The Greeters maintain a booth at the show and are available to provide information about the Hotel and Food Service curriculum at the University.

The club also publishes an alumni newsletter, "The Transcript," once each term. The Penn State Hotel and Restaurant Society is a major contributor to its financing.

Greeters meet at 7:30 p.m. the first and third Tuesday of each month in the Maple Room of the College of Human Development South. Dues are \$3 per year.
