

Professor To Direct Local Casey Campaign

Bernard Hennessy, professor of political science, today was named to head the Centre County Casey-Kline campaign committee.

The various campaign appointments were made in Harrisburg this morning by Auditor-General Robert P. Casey, candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. James Subjack (12-history-Dunkirk, N.Y.) was named to head Students for Casey-Kline at the University.

According to Hennessy, the efforts of the Centre County committee will be "directed toward projecting the true picture of Bob Casey throughout the county in his campaign to win the Democratic primary in May."

Student Coordinator Jim Subjack said Students For Casey-Kline will man a Casey table at the Hetzel Union Building next week in an "attempt to get more people involved." Subjack stated that changing Casey's image will be one of the main objectives of the campaign. "Casey has matured, he really wants the governorship," Subjack said.

The fact that the Young Democrats broke

party tradition by publically endorsing Milton Shapp, and that this drive was spearheaded by the Penn State chapter concerns Subjack. He said, "We need a lot more exposure about Casey to the people. Right now he is surrounded by relative anonymity." He discounted Casey's landslide loss by 50,000 votes to Shapp four years ago by saying, "Casey is much stronger throughout the state than he was in '66."

Subjack described the present student campaign drive as consisting of "about a dozen hard-core members," but said the appearance of Casey's running mate, Ernest Kline, at the University should "generate considerable enthusiasm." Kline will speak at the "Earth Day" program to be held here Apr. 17.

Subjack and Hennessy are working on a possible University appearance for Casey, possibly late this month. Subjack said, however, no definite plans have been made but added he felt Casey's personal appearance would "raise a lot more enthusiasm" at the University.

Applications Available at HUB Desk

Wanted: Miss Penn State

Applications for the Miss Penn State contest are now available at the Hetzel Union Building Main Desk and from the Association of Women Students residence hall presidents. To enter the contest, an applicant must have a minimum all-University average of 2.3 and at least a 2.0 average the previous term. The contestant must have participated in at least two activities, one of which is current.

The applicant also must have attended the University, either at University Park or a Commonwealth Campus, for her entire college career and must be in the fourth to ninth terms. A particular group may sponsor only one contestant and receive points for it. If another member of the group wishes to enter the contest, she may do so as an independent.

If the contestant is not sponsored by a group entered in Spring Week, a fee of \$2

must accompany the application. The deadline for entering the contest is Apr. 13. The preliminary round of judging to limit the contestants to ten semifinalists will occur Apr. 22 and 23. A second round of judging on May 7 will determine five finalists. A dinner will be given for the five finalists and 20 faculty judges on May 18. Final judging will take place May 19 in conjunction with the Spring Week Awards Night.

Libby Hegyes (11th-pre-law-Brownsville) and Lee Metzger (11th-marketing-Ermasus) are chairmen of the Miss Penn State contest whose applicants are judged on a activities, beauty, personality and poise.

Miss Hegyes said, "The biggest change this year is that candidates for Miss Penn State

do not have to be sponsored by a group. The reasoning behind this is to insure that the new Miss Penn State will be truly representative of the University."

Patrol Enforces Driving Rules

Regulations prohibiting student driving during class hours on central campus will be enforced according to Campus Patrol officials.

They reminded that University regulations permit student driving on central campus only between 5:30 p.m. and 7 a.m., Monday through Saturday morning, and from 12:30 p.m. Saturday until 7 a.m. Monday.

Central campus is described as Shortledge Road between East College Avenue, Curtin Road and Burrows Road.

As a safety measure, stop signs will be placed at two locations along Curtin Road where there is a heavy pedestrian traffic. University officials said yesterday.

One of the locations is at the crosswalk at the intersection of Allen Road and Curtin Road, and the other will be at the crossing east of the Forum. It is expected that the signs will be erected today.

Drivers on campus are reminded that the speed limit on campus roads is 15 miles an hour and also that pedestrians have the right-of-way at campus crosswalks.

Road: Curtin Road from Shortledge Road to Burrows Road, and Burrows Road from Curtin Road to West College Avenue.

Police Road, which is not a through street, also is closed to student driving. The driving restrictions on these roads are designed to reduce traffic congestion during

class hours and to improve safety conditions for pedestrians.
