

Army Band, Chorus to give concert

The United States Army Field Band and Soldier's Chorus will present a free concert at 8 p.m. Monday in Schwab.

Known as "The Kings of the Highway," the band and chorus made up of 100 soldiers travels thousands of miles every year on at least two major concert tours.

The Soldier's Chorus is made up of 20 vocalists and presents its own arrangements of well-known compositions at each Field Band performance.

The band's repertoire includes classical, semi-classical and popular selections, choral arrangements, novelty numbers and military marches.

Corps recruiters to return to PSU

Peace Corps recruiters are returning to the University next week in search of volunteers for its varied programs of overseas work.

The recruiters will be stationed at a table near the main desk of the Hetzel Union Building Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Last year, Penn State was the number one contributor of applications to the Peace Corps in a 10-state area stretching from Maine to Delaware.

In the 10 years of the Peace Corps' existence, 158 volunteers from the University have completed service overseas, and there are 51 recent University graduates now helping people in 60 nations where the Peace Corps is programmed.

According to Tim Kreiger, one of the recruiters, the Peace Corps hopes to recruit students from many fields, including agriculture, business administration, civil engineering, mechanical engineering, home economics, industrial arts and education. Kreiger said the Corps also continues to fill the program with as many liberal arts majors as possible.

Kreiger added that married couples and families also are urged to join.
