

# County has 82% voter turnout

# Final election results in

Official vote totals tabulated from the Nov 7 election indicate more than 82 per cent of the registered voters in Centre County cast ballots. Of the 42,193 eligible voters more than 34,705 voted. Final totals were similar to the initial vote returns.

In the race for Congressional representative from the 23rd district, 17,558 county voters decided to grant Republican Albert W. Johnson a sixth term while 16,122 voted for his Democratic challenger Ernest A. Kassab of Unionville. Johnson won by more than 20,000 votes in the district.

Centre County, which also includes the 77th state legislative district heavily supported incumbent Democrat Galen E.

Dreibelbis over Republican Charles L. "Bud" Yorks, 12,328 to 7,079. Both candidates are from State College.

Democrat Robert P. Casey outslugged challenger Republican Franklin M. McCorkel by more than 7,000 votes in the county race for the state auditor general office. Casey won 20,147 to 13,094. Democrat Grace Sloan beat Republican challenger Glenn E. Williams 18,129 to 14,790 in the state treasurer race.

President Nixon easily defeated Sen. George McGovern, according to county totals, 20,683 to 13,194. Constitutional Party candidate John Schmitz gathered 273 county votes.

Mark C. Schechter (10th-economics) overwhelmingly won the one write-in position on the 11 member State

College Government Study Commission with 1,132 votes. John Dombroski was next with 76 votes, James Filko had 51 and Paul Holtzman gained 33 votes. All are State College residents.

A county report on all final figures will be submitted to the state by Nov 27. Voter registration in the county resumed Dec 7. Wright said increased registration rolls will cause about 12 precincts to be split, several of these are in State College.

The referendum asking that a study commission be formed to investigate the possibility of home rule for the borough passed easily, 7,791 to 1,554. The proposed amendment to the state constitution concerning aid for flood relief, which passed statewide, was approved here, 20,049 to 6,840.

Vote tabulations were completed Wednesday by four women at the courthouse in Bellefonte working as county employes for the board of elections. According to Betty Wright, chief registration clerk, hundreds

of write-in votes for the government study commissioners and absentee ballots slow the counting process.

# Hanoi may reject agreement

PARIS (AP)—On the eve of Hanoi peace negotiator Le Duc Tho's return to Paris, North Vietnam warned the United States yesterday it will reject any major changes in the draft peace agreement.

This is due here from Moscow today and is expected to resume his secret negotiations with President Nixon's security adviser Henry A. Kissinger in the next few days. There was no official word on the date of Kissinger's arrival in Paris.

Communist delegates at the 167th session of the semipublic peace talks repeated their charges that the United States was stepping up the war while trying to back out of the agreement negotiated here last month between Kissinger and Tho.

North Vietnamese delegate

Xuan Thy told the three-hour meeting "we resolutely reject all the pretexts put forth by the United States and Saigon to demand modification of the substance of the agreement."

The Hanoi delegation spokesman Nguyen Thanh Le recalled that Kissinger told a Washington news conference Oct 26 that only minor drafting changes are needed to complete the still unsigned agreement in a final secret session with Tho.

"If the United States is willing, we can complete agreement in less than an hour," Le told newsmen.

The acting Saigon delegate Nguyen Xuan Phong reiterated his South Vietnam government's vigorous objections to parts of the draft agreement.

The chief U.S. negotiator, William J. Porter, avoided any reference to the points still under dispute, but pleaded for moderation in the talks scheduled to resume Nov 30. The delegations agreed to skip next week's regular Thursday session because of Thanksgiving Day.

"Each of us is aware that the restoration of peace in Vietnam is approaching," Porter told the meeting. "Each of us is equally well aware of the efforts being made to refine and perfect the accomplishments of negotiation so that a settlement fair to all will result."

"It is reasonable, therefore, to expect that our deliberations in this forum be consistent with the good will and seriousness required for productive negotiations."

Moscow radio and the news agency Tass said Tho met in Moscow with Politburo member Mikhail S. Suslov, Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko, and Konstantin F. Katushev, secretary of the Communist party's Central Committee.

The Soviet media provided no details of the discussion. They presumably briefed Tho on current Kremlin thinking on Vietnam.

A North Vietnamese Embassy official said Tho probably will leave for Paris today.

# Recycling center permit delayed

An application for a permit to allow the Jawbone glass recycling center to remain operational has been delayed until a meeting can be scheduled with the State College Zoning Board of Appeals or an informal settlement is reached.

The group was told last month to shut down because it was in violation of zoning ordinances that prohibit the storing of waste material such as glass in a residential zone.

The group responded they would appeal the decision, made by Lee L. Lowry, borough zoning officer, and ask for a zoning ordinance.

They then realized they could ask for a "temporary use permit" to allow the land use for one year with the possibility of extending that three years, if the use was shown to be in the general welfare of the public.

Last week, the group sent a letter to Lowry explaining their request.

Lowry said he replied that a decision on a temporary use permit would have to be made by the zoning board of appeals.

At any meeting of that board, Lowry explained they could do

one of three things:

- apply for a temporary use permit,
- appeal Lowry's decision on the zoning law interpretation or,
- ask for a zoning variance to allow the recycling to continue.

Representatives of the Jawbone group have said they will exhaust all avenues of appeal, if necessary.

But before they make any appeals, they said they will try to reach an informal agreement with Lowry, going to the appeals board only as a last resort.

Lowry has said he is not opposed to what the group is doing. He has offered to make land available at the borough's landfill site about four miles north of State College on route 322.

But, he said, "It is our policy to enforce zoning ordinances when complaints are received." He added he had received several complaints from residents in the area. The center is located at 415 E. Foster Ave.
