

USG distributes aid information

For undergraduate students who have no idea of the kind of scholarship they can apply for, the Undergraduate Student Government Academic Affairs Department has an answer.

At the beginning of Fall Term's seventh week, a Scholarship Information Guide was distributed by Academic Affairs to campus and downtown areas. The guide was compiled by a committee of seven students under the direction of Director of Academic Affairs glibb Angelo.

Angelo said not everyone is eligible for a scholarship, although each college has a different means of awarding scholarships. He said the general requirements for obtaining a scholarship include a 3.00 average, fulltime college attendance and financial need.

The guide includes scholarships awarded by each college, memorial scholarships, the amount of the award, the number of awards available, eligibility requirements and whether or not a parental confidential statement is needed.

The guides have been distributed to Interfraternity and Panhellenic Council presidents, resident assistants, Organization of Town Independent tudents and Association of Residence Halls Students. The guide is also available from some downtown eating establishments.

Angelo said he hoped the guide would also make students more aware of the Office of Student Aid, which lends assistance to students in need of financial aid to continue their education.

The guides also have been distributed to the Commonwealth Campuses through the Branch Campuses Services Department.

Gov. disputes story

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Louisiana Gov. Edwin W. Edwards says he has no doubt that two young black students slain at Southern University were felled by a deputy sheriff, the Los Angeles Times reported yesterday.

In Baton Rouge, Edwards called the story "irresponsible, inaccurate and unauthorized" and said his remarks had been taken out of context. The Times, however, said it was standing by the account.

In a dispatch from Baton Rouge, La., where the schools' main campus is located, the Times said Edwards believes that "we'll probably never know which deputy sheriff fired the shot."

The newspaper quoted the governor as saying at a luncheon meeting, "I have no doubt it was a deputy sheriff who fired."

The two students were shot in the head Thursday as police and sheriff's deputies moved to break up a demonstration by students in front and inside of the university administration building.

Law enforcement officers say they fired only tear gas

canisters. Edwards said Friday it was possible that they mistakenly fired buckshot. The school has been closed until after Thanksgiving.


The Times said Edwards also disclosed that:

—He will fire university President G. Leon Netterville, who he said is out of touch with the students, in July.


—He will accede to all of the demands of the students and welcomes their participation in the school administration, but will not agree to a complete student takeover of the campus.

In a statement issued yesterday, Edwards accused the author of the article of showing "a gross lack of regard for the whole truth" and said the reporter had attended only 30 minutes of a two-hour meeting between Edwards and Justice Department officials, then wrote "an irresponsible, inaccurate and unauthorized two-minute summarization, out of context."

Edwards denied he said he would fire Netterville, adding that in any event, that power rested with the state Board of Education.

Green. Also arraigned before Green was Rodney Klinger of State College. He was charged with the violation of a controlled substance and was released on \$5,000 bail.

Michael G. Janosko (10th-accounting) was listed in fair condition yesterday at the

Mountainview unit of Centre Community Hospital. Janosko had been hospitalized after an automobile accident on Rt. 64 Friday.

According to Rockview State Police, Janosko, a passenger in a car operated by William Chuba (graduate-computer science) was hospitalized after the Chuba vehicle went out of control while attempting to pass another car and rolled down an embankment.

Chuba and three other passengers were treated at Mountainview and released. Damage was estimated at \$1,000.

A bicycle operated by Scott Palermo (4th-biology) struck a pedestrian, Barbara Winfree (5th-community development) when she

stepped out from behind a parked vehicle on S. Garner Street. The bicycle then skidded into the rear of a car operated by Glade Horner of Centre Hall.

Palermo and Winfree were treated for cuts at Ritenour and released. Damage was estimated at \$25 for the bicycle.


