

# Officials admit reason for removal

# Homosexuality linked to move

In a meeting between Joseph Acanfora's lawyer and Montgomery County, Md., school officials yesterday, school officials finally admitted the reasons for Acanfora's transfer to a paperwork job.

"They said they transferred me to keep me away from the youngsters because I'm gay," Acanfora told The Daily Collegian yesterday. The meeting was set up by a deposition granted Acanfora last week. The deposition

required school officials to answer specific questions regarding the transfer. Acanfora was transferred from his position as an earth science teacher in a Montgomery County Junior high school after he informed school officials of the controversy facing his teaching certification in Pennsylvania.

He was given a new position, without loss of salary, in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction in the district. His Pennsylvania certification had been held up while a board of six University deans Summer Term deliberated his moral character. State Education Secretary John C. Pittenger finally approved the certification in September.

The Washington Post reported earlier that school officials maintained that Acanfora was removed from

the classroom when an account of the controversy facing his Pennsylvania certification appeared in The New York Times.

Yesterday was the first time school officials admitted Acanfora's transfer was a result of his homosexuality.

The official school board position had been that Acanfora's transfer would last until an investigation of his credentials was completed. He said yesterday the officials told his lawyer the investigation was completed, and added he has not yet been reinstated in the classroom.

Acanfora said yesterday's questioning took place to obtain enough information to file for an injunction to return him to the classroom.

He said earlier that specific reasons for his transfer would be needed to allow an injunction to be granted.

He added school officials

would not let him out of work to participate directly in the questioning of Supt. Homer L. Elser and Dep. Supt. Donald Miedema but said his lawyer told him the results of the meeting.

He said the officials expressed concern over community response to a homosexual teacher, and added that keeping members of the community happy was one of the reasons for the transfer.

Acanfora said "I'm sure we have enough to be granted an injunction" and added he will file for one next week.

He said at the time he files for an injunction a date will be set for the suit filed against the district asking for his reinstatement and attorney's fees. While the injunction, if granted, would return him to the classroom only temporarily, the suit would reinstate him permanently.

# Students stay in halls for Thanksgiving recess

Due to the small number of residence hall students reserving space for the weekend of the Pitt-Penn State football game, only Hamilton, Beaver, Leete, Holmes, Beam, Runkle, Brumbaugh, Pinchot, Sproul, and Tener Residence Halls will be used.

Normal capacity of these halls is 2,900. Less than 200 residents made reservations by the dead line date Friday,

Nov. 10. Only students permanently assigned to these halls will stay in their rooms. Students from other residence halls will be assigned to the study lounges. Only students with reservations may check in after 2 p.m. Friday. All residence halls will be locked and admittance will be made through the main door of the building only. Students will be required to show their ad-

vance reservation receipt and identification card for admittance.

This procedure will be in effect throughout the entire weekend until 8 a.m. Sunday, when the residence halls will be officially opened for all returning students.

Vending services will be available during this period. Meal service in the dining halls will start with breakfast, Monday.

# Brandt prepares bargaining plans

BONN (AP) — Chancellor Willy Brandt's triumphant Social Democrats prepared yesterday for hard bargaining with their junior partners in the ruling coalition as the opposition Christian Democrats took stock of their crushing election defeat.

Chief government spokesman Conrad Ahlers announced that Brandt will meet Free Democrat leader Walter Scheel this week on forming a new government as soon as possible.

Brandt and Scheel are fully agreed on continuing the East-West reconciliation policies for which the Nobel Prize-winning chancellor won a resounding mandate in Sunday's election.

But observers said difficult negotiations on some domestic issues may lie ahead for the two parties before they can form a new government program.

The Free Democrats are

moderately right wing and favor free enterprise without state interference.

Ahlers told a news conference that the newly elected Bundestag, the lower house of parliament, will meet Dec. 14 and formally elect Brandt chancellor the next day.

The Social Democrat leadership met to lay down guidelines for its negotiators in a joint commission which will soon work out details of a governing compromise.

Brandt's party appeared in a strong bargaining position as it received 45.9 per cent of the vote to 8.4 per cent for the Free Democrats.

But the Free Democrats could insist on a bigger say because their share of the coalition's Bundestag seats is bigger than before. They will occupy 42 of the 496 seats against 230 for the Social Democrats and 224 for the Christian Democrats. The Free Democrats had 30 seats after the 1969 election.

# SDS plans speech by Guardian writer

Turgoff will speak on imperialism, either Jan. 11 or Jan. 18. SDS will ask a donation of 25 cents.

Other plans discussed by SDS at Monday's meeting include the publication of Henderson Station. The paper will be on sale Nov. 29 in the HUB, downtown and in the dorm areas for 15 cents.

"It will be a community paper which will try to relate to as broad a section as possible, rather than limiting itself to people who already agree with our anti-imperialist viewpoint," said member Even Myers.

SDS members have also organized an Internal Study Program in which they will discuss literature relating to the socialist cause.

"Labor's Untold Story" by Richard Boyer and Herbert Morais, put out by the United Electrical Workers, will be the first book for discussion. Works by Lenin and the pamphlet "Building the Anti-Imperialist Student Movement" are also tentatively scheduled for discussion.

# Cabinet shuffle planned

THURMONT, Md. (AP) — Plunging deeper into the planning of a second-term shakeup, President Nixon signaled yesterday a major shuffle of cabinet members before Inauguration Day.

As he began the second week of an extended stay at his Camp David retreat, Nixon paused in a series of mountaintop meetings with administration officials to receive reports from his Vietnam negotiator, Henry Kissinger.

The White House refused to discuss the content of Kissinger's new round of talks with the North Vietnamese in Paris, but said a second session would be held today.

Nixon spent the bulk of the day conferring on reorganization plans.

Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the President had not decided the makeup of his second-term cabinet, but said Nixon was

holding the series of meetings to determine the personal wishes of each member.

The spokesman acknowledged that shifting officials from one cabinet level post to another is under consideration.

At least two of the cabinet level officials who conferred with Nixon yesterday are reported interested in other government posts. They are Elliot Richardson, now secretary of Health Education and Welfare, mentioned as a possible Secretary of State; and Cost of Living Council Director Donald Rumsfeld, reportedly being considered as a successor to Housing Secretary George Romney.

Others meeting with Nixon were United Nations Amb. George Bush, Central Intelligence Agency Director George Helms, Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz, and presidential assistant Leonard Garment.
