

Lion golfers eager to defend Eastern title

What a difference one week can make. Last Saturday, while the Lion golf team was in the process of dismantling West Virginia, coach Joe Boyle was singing the blues as he looked ahead to the upcoming Eastern championships.

"I don't know," Boyle said. "The guys were just getting their games together, then we get four days of rain that keeps them inside and throws off their timing."

Since then, however, the skies have cleared, and on the eve of the Eastern Intercollegiate Golf Championships, Boyle's sad song

has picked up some happy tunes. "They're really coming together now, and most of the guys can't wait for Saturday," the Lion coach said.

"We needed a few days to give the boys a chance to play regularly and get the finer points ironed out."

"Now, everybody is coming around, and Danny O'Neill and Fred Von Barga look especially sharp. If they come through and have a hot round, we'll give 'em all trouble."

"In the process of ironing out the finer points, Boyle's linksmen have been playing from sunrise to sunset, and its been paying off.

Team captain and defending EIGA medalist O'Neill has been busy sharpening up his already tough game while experimenting with a new one wood, made with the controversial graphite shaft. It's designed to add a few yards to a drive and in O'Neill's case, it means he'll probably be

hitting tee shots anywhere from 250 to 290 yards. Number two man Von Barga prepared for the Easterns by recording the first ace in his life Tuesday, when his five iron to the par-three 16th drifted onto the green and into the cup.

John Krumrine, Rex Ferguson, and Harry Hamilton round out the Penn State five and they all look as sharp as ever on the eve of their Eastern title defense. But what about the competition.

Rumor in the Lion camp has it that Penn looks like the best bet to steal the crown, if anyone does.

"I'm worried about them," Von Barga said. "Penn has five strong golfers to throw at us, and if a few of them get

regular season confrontation, but Boyle's linksmen escaped with a slim one-stroke victory. The second time around, it could be a different story, and look for Columbia's George Smithy to be in the race for medalist honors. He defeated O'Neill by four strokes in their last meeting, and appears fully capable of doing it again.

Princeton poses as a definite threat as it tries to settle a debt it has with the reigning Eastern champs. Two weeks ago, the Happy Valley five took a trip to Saucon Valley and handed the Tigers their first seasonal loss.

With talented Randy Riley and Jim Francis leading the way, Princeton should give the Lions a real run for the laurels.

Besides the obvious favorites entered in the field of 21 teams some of the unknowns participating in that event could make some noise.

"There are a lot of teams from the New England area competing in the Easterns

Scarpetta carded a 70 on that occasion, and looms as a real threat to challenge O'Neill for medalist honors.

So Penn is definitely in the running for the crown but Columbia, Princeton, and Villanova also can be added to the list of challengers capable of becoming king of the hill.

Columbia almost bumped off the Lions during their

Secretariat favorite for Derby; Hawks stop Canadiens 7-4

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The entry of Secretariat and Angle Light was pegged yesterday as the even-money favorite for tomorrow's 99th and richest running in history of the Kentucky Derby.

"Both of them just couldn't be better. Just bring 'em Saturday," said trainer

Lucien Laurin as he entered the pair in the race.

Owners of 13 horses plunked down \$2,500 each to enter. If all 13 toss another \$1,500 in the pot to start, the race will gross \$198,800.

CHICAGO (AP)—The Chicago Black Hawks blitzed

the Montreal Canadiens with four first period goals, two of them shorthanded, within one minute, to score their first Stanley Cup final victory 7-4 last night.

The Hawks' triumph in their first home start after 8-3 and 4-1 defeats at Montreal left the Canadiens leading 2-1 in the best-of-seven championship series. The fourth game will also be played at Chicago Stadium Sunday.
