

# Hawks topple Canadiens

MONTREAL (AP) — Shifty Stan Mikita scored two goals and assisted on two others last night, leading the Chicago Black Hawks to a wild 8-7 victory over Montreal in the fifth game of their National Hockey League Stanley Cup championship series.

The victory kept the Hawks' hopes alive in the best-of-7 series. Chicago still trails, 3-2, with Game 6 scheduled for tomorrow night

in Chicago. If a seventh game is needed, it will be played Sunday in Montreal.

Mikita, playing despite a badly gashed middle finger on his right hand suffered in the opening game, twice tipped in long shots by defenseman Pat Stapleton past Montreal goalie Ken Dryden. And twice, the helmeted Black Hawk center man set up key goals for Chicago, struggling to stave off elimination in this

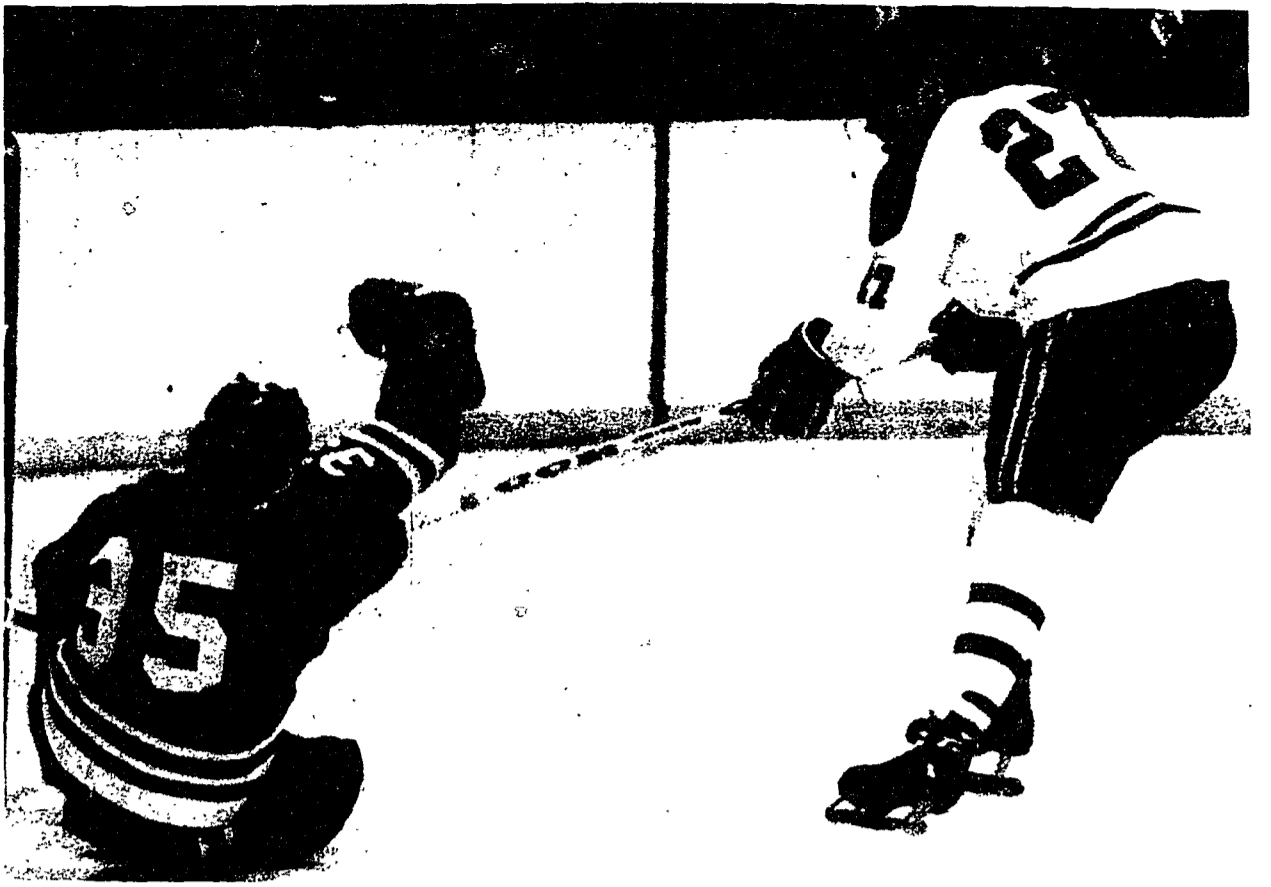

Montreal's Mahovich brothers, first Frank and then Pete, had the Canadiens' first period goals. In between, Dennis Hull and Mikita connected for the Black Hawks so the score after 20 minutes was 2-2. Then the fireworks really began.

Larose scored from the right side of the ice in the opening minute of the middle period and after rookie Dave Kryskow tied it for the Hawks again, Larose hit from the left side, making it 4-3 Montreal.

Then Mikita tied it, after bowling Dryden over into the net and then regaining his feet just in time to get his stick on Stapleton's shot.

# Knicks, Pacers take cage wins

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Knicks, riding the 33-point performance of Dave DeBusschere, built up a big early lead and held off a belated Los Angeles rally for a 103-98 victory over the Lakers last night and a 3-1 lead in their National Basketball Association championship series.

The Knicks, who lost to the Lakers in five games in last year's final after beating them in seven games for their first NBA title in 1970, can

clinch the best-of-7 series with another victory tomorrow night at Los Angeles.

DeBusschere, a rugged 6-foot-6, 235-pounder, poured in 22 points in the first half when the Knicks raced to a 55-44 lead. The burly forward hit 11 of 15 field goal attempts during that span.

DeBusschere, whose previous high in 133 playoff games was 29 points, connected for 10 points in the first period when New York spurred to a 29-16 lead and

garnered 12 points in the second quarter when New York established its biggest advantage (47-26) with 4:42 left in the half.

Then, in the final period when the Lakers ran off eight straight points, four by Jim McMillian, slicing New York's lead to 94-92 with 1:15 remaining, DeBusschere again took charge. With 48 seconds left, he rebounded a missed Bill Bradley shot and was fouled on the play by Bill Bridges. DeBusschere hit the

free throw for a three-point play and a 97-92 lead.

LOUISVILLE (AP) — George McGinnis stole an inbounds pass and drove under for a stuff shot in the final 23 seconds last night to clinch Indiana's 89-86 victory over the Kentucky Colonels.

It gave the Pacers a 3-2 lead in the American Basketball Association best-of-seven championship playoff series. While McGinnis supplied

the last-second heroics, it was veteran Freddie Lewis who ignited the Pacers' last half drive. Lewis finished with 31 points, 28 in the second half.

At one stretch early in the fourth quarter, Lewis hit 11 of 13 Indiana points as the Pacers took a nine-point edge, their biggest of the night.

Indiana lost a chance to go ahead with only 31 seconds left when a pass to McGinnis went out of bounds under the basket.

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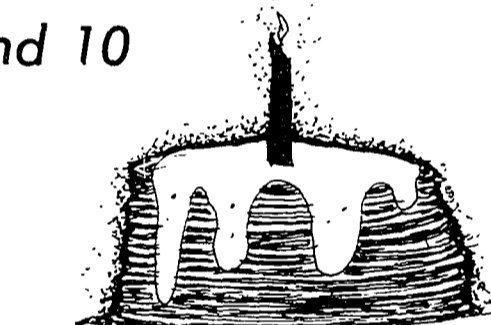
