Homecoming activities planned

On the last weekend in September, scores of alumni will swarm to University Park. The occasion, celebrated since 1920, is known as Homecoming, an annual event to acquaint former students with the campus and faculty and bring them up-to-date with University affairs.

All activities for this year's Homecoming celebration are being sponsored by two independently operating

organizations, the Alumni Association and the University Union Board's homecoming committee, composed of 16 student members.

According to Sally Auran, co-chairman of the homecoming committee, this year's events are designed to encourage both alumni and student participation. The committee has dedicated Friday to students and Saturday to alumni.

Aside from publicity money

for the weekend, the UUB received no University funds. The homecoming committee is funding this weekend through entry fees from the various competitions.

The weekend's festivities will begin at noon Friday, Sept. 28, with a jammy on the lawn of Old Main. From 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. a parade will march through campus featuring floats and banners made by various fraternities, sororities and other student organizations. The parade will conclude with a pep rally

at Rec Hall. Trophies will be presented to the group with the best float, banner and window painting, centering around this year's Homecoming theme, "A Hawkeye's View of Penn State University."

Saturday afternoon's highlight will be homecoming game, when the Nittany Lions take on the Iowa Hawkeyes. At halftime, University President John W. Oswald will honor Penn State alumnus astronaut Paul

Weitz. In keeping with a tradition which originated in 1940, this year's activities will include the selection of a Homecoming Queen. The queen will be selected by a panel of five judges, primarily for her contributions to the University. Although poise, personality and grace are additional attributes in a candidate's favor, the Homecoming Committee said the competition will not be a beauty contest.
