Working in a college town, it comes as no surprise Dreibelbis knows his college football. It also comes as no surprise that he picked the Lions.

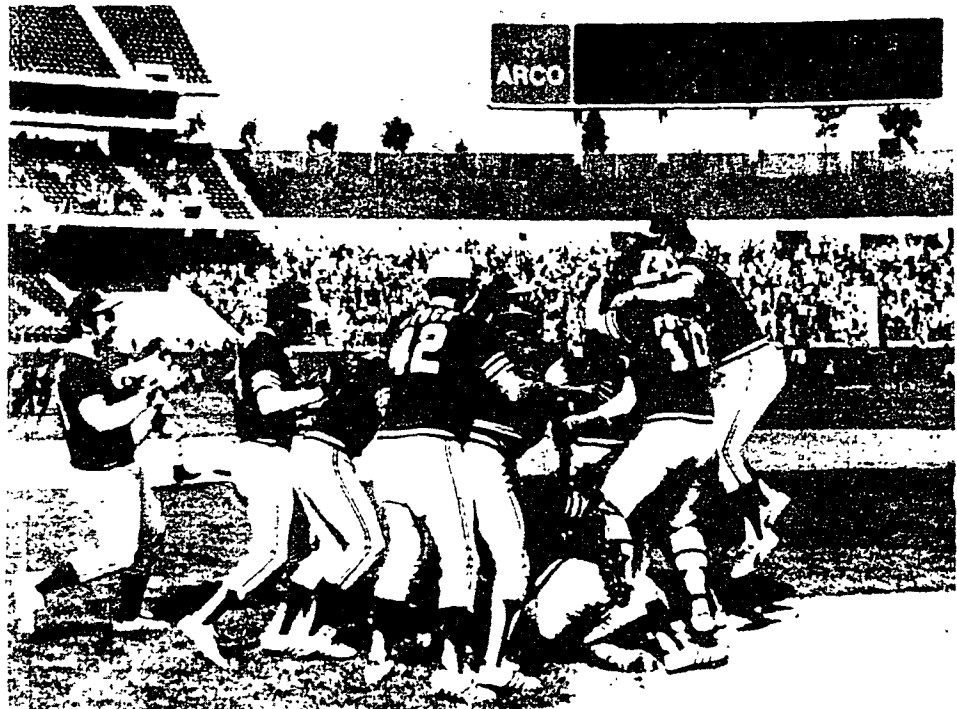

# A's join NY in Series

OAKLAND (AP)—Jim "Catfish" Hunter, Oakland's top money pitcher, gave the A's another shot yesterday at baseball's biggest prize.

His five-hitter beat the Baltimore Orioles 3-0 in the deciding fifth game of the American League playoffs and set up the World Series opener here between the A's and the New York Mets.

"Charlie Finley, our owner, has told us that if we win the World Series again, those rings he gave us last year are going to look like babies compared to this year's," said the right-hander who beat the Cincinnati Reds twice in the 1972 Series.

Finley, who presented World Series rings this spring with an estimated value of

\$1,400 each, said, "I know damn well we're going to win again."

Hunter, a 21-game winner three seasons in a row, struck out only one batter yesterday, but the Orioles' hitters pulled just a handful of pitches and popped up more than half a dozen.

"I'm a control pitcher, and I was making them hit my pitches. That's why they were popping up," said the hurler after his second victory of the play-offs.

If the A's repeat as World Champions, they'll be the first team to do so since the New York Yankees of 1961-62.

"I'm aware of that, and I was aware that Baltimore had never lost a playoff game, too," said Hunter after his



shutout. The Orioles, who were after a fourth league title in five years, swept their opponents in the playoffs from 1969 through 1971.

Williams made it clear that A's wouldn't go into the World Series overconfident against the Mets, who finished barely over .500 in the regular season in winning the National

League's East Division. They won a five-team dogfight for the title.

"Some people said none of those teams were good ones. I disagree. I think they were all good clubs and just knocked each other off all season."

Hunter's pitching gave Oakland its second straight five-game AL playoff triumph. The A's went the dis-

ance last year against the Detroit Tigers.

The right-handed control specialist didn't allow a hit until Andy Etchebarren, Baltimore's leading hitter in the playoffs, stroked a two-out double in the fifth inning. No Baltimore runner got any further than second base during the game, which drew only 24,265 to 50,000-seat Oakland Coliseum on a sunny day.

The A's, who blew a 4-0 lead Wednesday, staked Hunter to his 3-0 lead with one run in the third and two in the fourth.

Joe Rudi drove in the opening run, scoring Ray Fosse from second base with a sharp single to left field off Orioles starter Doyle Alexander. Fosse reached base on the first Baltimore error of the playoffs, charged to Brooks Robinson, when the third baseman knocked down a hard grounder but fell.

Dick Green sacrificed Fosse to second and Berty Vampaneris popped up before Rudi singled.

Vic Davalillo and Jesus Alou, two players acquired from National League teams in separate transactions on July 31, drove in the fourth-inning runs and knocked out the 23-year-old Alexander, making his first pitching appearance since Sept. 28 and his first post-season appearance ever.

Baltimore Manager Earl Weaver brought in 22-game winner Jim Palmer, who started Wednesday's game, and Palmer held the A's scoreless the rest of the way.

But the right-hander Hunter, winner of the second playoff game against Baltimore, had all the runs he needed.

# Oklahoma-Texas leads long list of traditional grid rivalries

Plenty of memories will be kicked around with the footballs tomorrow when 16 traditional rivals meet on college gridirons for at least the 60th time.

Oklahoma carries an 11-point index advantage into its 68th game against Texas. Other index differences and game numbers for the 60-and-over crowd include:

Yale 12 over Brown (78)  
Kansas 13 over Kansas St (71)  
Rutgers 15 over Lafayette (67)  
Nebraska 15 over Missouri (67)

(67) Michigan 17 over Mich. St (66)  
Washington 4 over Oregon St (60)

Also nostalgic are these scores: Fordham 40, Rutgers 13; John Carroll 36, Toledo 7; Cincinnati 41, Louisville 0. They are from the 1953 season and illustrate how much college football can change in 20 years.

Index comparisons show these teams to have declined the most since 1953: McPherson, Kan.; Fordham; John Carroll, O.; Washington & Lee, Va.; College of Idaho; Shippensburg, Pa.; Get-

tysburg, Pa.; St. Olaf, Minn.; Cincinnati; and Wheaton, Ill. All have dropped more than 36 index points.

Here is this week's rating differences. Higher rating teams have won in 76.3 percent of the 800 games covered to date.
