

Linksmen whip Hoyas, set mark

With John Krumrine leading the way, Penn State's linksmen rebounded from Saturday's loss and whipped Georgetown yesterday, 379-423. In doing so, the Lions set a new team record for the lowest team score ever played on the University's Blue course.

"Obviously this is the best team play of the year," said Penn State coach Joe Boyle. "They all shot well, especially Krumrine."

Krumrine turned in an even par 72 Monday to lead all

golfers. The team captain had three birdies, three bogeys and an eagle along the way.

"The ball was really sitting up on the fairways," said Krumrine. "And the greens were in great shape for this time of the year."

The course might have been in great shape but the weather was typical Penn State — cold, windy and wet. It didn't deter the Lion linksmen though, as all top five golfers had sub-80 scores.

Following Krumrine's 72, Penn State's other low men were Fred Von Bargen (73), Tom Amendola (76), John

Markley (79) and Sherm Hostetter (79).

The old record of 382 fell even before all seven golfers were in the club house as the highest Penn State card turned in Monday was an 82.

"They all played so much better than Saturday," noted Boyle. "The short game was much better today."

Boyle's thoughts were echoed by Krumrine who felt that the team was much more prepared mentally for yesterday's competition.

"We had problems there with the weather just before the match," said the State

College native. "We didn't know whether we would play or not."

Krumrine was the most prepared Lion Monday. He shot 36 for each of the nine holes, going one under par on 2, 10 and 12. He finished his round with an eagle 3 on the 18th.

Krumrine added, "It was windy today but the wind wasn't blowing against you on the tough holes. I think the greens really made the difference today though; they were in top condition."

The putting surfaces didn't help the visitors from

Georgetown much as the lowest card turned in by a Hoya linkman was an eight over par 80 by Mike Carrol.

Penn State is now 4-1 on the season and the victory against Georgetown raised the Lions' all time series advantage over the Hoyas to 22-14-1.

Boyle noted, "I'm glad to see the team play like this now since we've got that big tournament (Kepler Invitational) later this week."

Penn State's next match is against Lehigh tomorrow at home with tee off time scheduled for 1 p.m.

"You have to have the intention of scoring, then you pass off. In high school you could mess around, not open, wait and then pass off. It doesn't work like that here. You have to go to the man with the intention of getting a goal."

More on Lion relays: the Over-the-Hill Club

An interesting delegation at Saturday's Nittany Lion Relays was a group called the Brooklyn Over-the-Hill Athletic Association.

Coch Charles Turner and his trackmen took a few cars and rambled five hours on the dreary Pennsylvania Turnpike from Fun City to Penn State, finally arriving here at four o'clock Saturday morning.

Was it all worth the trouble? Unfortunately not.

Turner had his tracksters entered in just two events — the 880 and mile relays — and despite predicting victory for his harriers in both events, they came out on the short end both times.

Undaunted, however, by his team's showing, Turner said he'd like to give it another shot next year. "I would gladly come back next year," he noted. "The people are nice here and it's always nice to get away from home."

Cornell Coach Jack Warner on the Relays: "Harry (Groves) did a great job with the meet. I think he's a good man — otherwise I wouldn't be here. Penn State has always had a good track name."

Lions Charlie Maguire and Mike Shine were voted by the coaches as the meet's best track performers and received watches for their efforts.

Groves said he will change the format for next year.

Plans will include running all the trials first and then following up with all the championship heats later. "This would make things more agreeable for the spectators," Groves said, noting that the "present format favors the participants more than the fans."

Groves was pretty satisfied with Penn State's showing in the two-day affair. "Everything was pretty much on the plus side," he said. "It takes competition like that to make us do our best. We're really making progress."

The meet also featured 11 events for women, who smashed old Stadium records in the shot put, high jump, javelin, discus, 400 relay and 880-yard relays.

In the meet's special events, Amy Welch ran the predicted fitness mile in 5:26.0, exactly matching her before-the-race prediction. And Sigma Chi Fraternity won the Interfraternity Council Mile Relay in 3:29.3.

Lion hurlers must endure

Now that the weather seems somewhat willing, baseball coach Chuck Medlar is going to find out how deep his pitching staff is.

The Penn State nine (4-1) hit the road today for the first of three games in three days. After today's contest at Bucknell, the Lions visit Villanova in a rescheduled rainout Wednesday and return home for Gettysburg Thursday.

Tack a doubleheader with George Washington on this weekend and that spells a need for some able arms on the hill. But Medlar doesn't appear terribly concerned about the pitching, which, as usual, is a Penn State stronghold.

"If these fellows pitch the way they know how, we shouldn't have any trouble," the Lion boss said. The fellows he was talking about are Len Bartek, Mitch Lukevics, John Maier, and Steve Nielsen.

Bartek (1-0) is Medlar's starter for today's game. He is to be followed by either Maier or

Lukevics on Wednesday, with Nielsen the likely choice for Gettysburg.

"But if we have to use all of them in one game to win it, we will," Medlar said. "We'll worry about the next game later."

With the way the game has been going for Bucknell, Medlar shouldn't need too many pitchers today. The Bisons (0-4) are suffering from an anemic batting attack. Co-captain and first baseman Bill Walsh is swinging a .364 club, but the next highest average is a tiny .167.

On the mound things are not quite so bad, however. Jack Recco, a freshman left-hander, will go for the Bisons. Recco, though 0-1, has pitched well and has a 1.29 ERA to prove it.

The Bucknell staff is rested, having been rained out of a doubleheader with Lafayette Saturday. In their last outing, the Bisons dropped an 8-5 decision to Rutgers, recent victim of a Lion doubleheader sweep.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Manager Danny Murtaugh is making no predictions about how much pitcher Steve Blass will help the Pittsburgh Pirates when he rejoins the club in Chicago today.

"I'll have a nice talk with him and read the reports from Florida," was Mur-

taugh's only comment.

Blass has been in Pittsburgh's minor league in Florida since the end of spring training, attempting to regain the form which made him a 19-game winner in 1972.

He has pitched every fourth day, but the reports from Florida have not been par-

icularly good. Blass surrendered 10 walks in one game.

Last year, Blass had a 3-9 record with a disastrous 9.81 earned run average.

The Connecticut native, who'll be 32 on Thursday, fared no better this spring, compiling an 0-3 record and a 7.71 earned run average.
