

Pa. registration declining

HARRISBURG (AP) — Voter registration rolls in Pennsylvania's 67 counties show a decrease of 125,017 Republicans and 79,013 Democrats since May 1973.

Except for Clarion County, all of the 67 registration offices provided final figures for the May 21 primary. The Clarion period when the Democrats gained 38,020 voters.

In last year's primary, Clarion County had slightly more than 9,000 Republicans and 9,000 Democrats. Those figures were used in the survey after a spokeswoman said there would be only a slight decrease in registration.

After the 1973 primary, both parties regained some strength for last November's general election. The decrease in current registration figures from November is 133,006 for the GOP and 112,247 for the Democrats.

Registration normally dips between the general and primary elections each year. Between November 1971 and May 1972, Pennsylvania Republicans lost 37,278. The losses for the same time frame in 1972-73 were Republicans 99,761 and Democrats 18,694.

The exception to that rule in this decade came in the 1971-72 period when the Democrats gained 38,020 voters.

There are 5,471,851 voters registered for the primary, a decrease from 254,711 from November and 211,450 from last

May. The registration total includes 6,657 Constitutionalists from the state's third party and 156,893 independents and others.

In November, there were 7,250 Constitutionalists and 165,893 independents and others.

Party leaders said they could not comment on the reductions in voter strength since they did not have time to analyze the figures. The survey was completed late Friday.

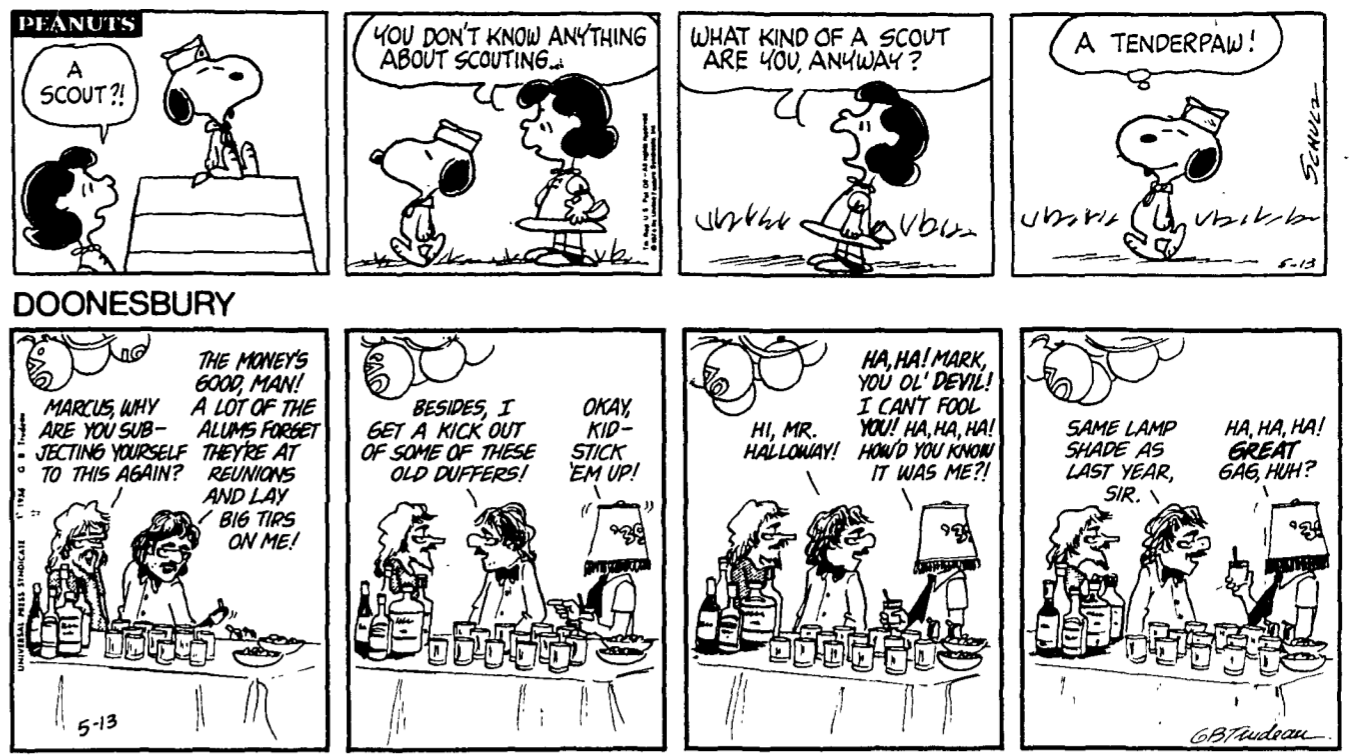
A spokesman for the state Elections Bureau said official figures had not been compiled because the bureau still was awaiting reports from 10 counties. The reports were due May 1.

A Republican spokesman, who asked not to be identified, said the registration drops might be traced to attrition, a "purging of the rolls" of those who had not voted in more than two years.

In the state's 10 largest counties, Democrats gained voters in three: Luzerne, from 86,909 in November to 89,626; Montgomery, 90,109 to 90,295, and Bucks, 85,251 to 85,840.

Major Democratic losses came in Allegheny County, down by 46,632 and Philadelphia, a cut of 24,988.

Republicans lost heavily in Delaware County, a drop of 14,993; Philadelphia, 32,541, and Allegheny, 24,369.

Security tightens in Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Foreign diplomats, frightened by guerrillas, have wrapped themselves in tight security and have turned some embassies into fortresses of glass and grillwork.

U.S. Ambassador Robert C. Hill rides to work in a \$30,000 Chevrolet, so heavily bomb-proofed that his chauffeur complains the thick glass hurts his eyes to see through.

British Ambassador Sir Donald Hopson practices shooting regularly, and his embassy's hired guards have used up to 2,000 rounds a month in target practice.

Argentine federal police guard all embassies here, but some countries — including Germany, Brazil and Israel — have brought their own sharpshooters from home. Others employ extra bodyguards.

The Marxist People's Revolutionary Army (ERP) kidnaped Alfred Albert Laun III, the U.S. Information Service man in Cordoba, on April 12. Laun was critically hurt in the scuffle and was left on a riverbank by the guerrillas.

Embassies had taken elaborate precautions before then, but no diplomats had yet been bothered during the recent years of Argentine terrorism.

"Right now everyone is scared," said one western diplomat. "I guarantee you that the first time someone is hit in Buenos Aires, there'll be a line to the airport."

Reaction may not be that drastic if there is a new attack, but some embassies are already planning cutbacks. Some dependents, including at least one ambassador's son, have been sent home.

"I think we can presume that since they failed with Laun, they will try again," said one European diplomat. "I think people who tended to be blasé about security are sitting up and taking notice."

After the Laun kidnaping, the U.S. Embassy pulled back its other three U.S.I.S. men in the interior. The 80-person staff was told not to leave the Buenos Aires area on personal business. Official trips must be approved by the ambassador.

Two specialists flew in from Washington to take over security.

Parties are discouraged and, when given, hosts are asked to submit guest lists to the U.S. security officers.

Protection has been necessary increasingly since 1968 when terrorists stepped up activity here. In five years, the American community has dropped from 8,000 to 4,000, estimates say, including 200 top business executives.

But it is not only the Americans who are worried. The vault-like British Embassy is like Fort Knox. Visit slips are passed through a slit in a thick glass wall and guests are escorted in and out.

The Israelis, with more than just Argentine guerrillas to worry about, are reported to have the tightest security.

The Council for Exceptional Children will meet 7 tonight in 269 Willard. Elections will be held.

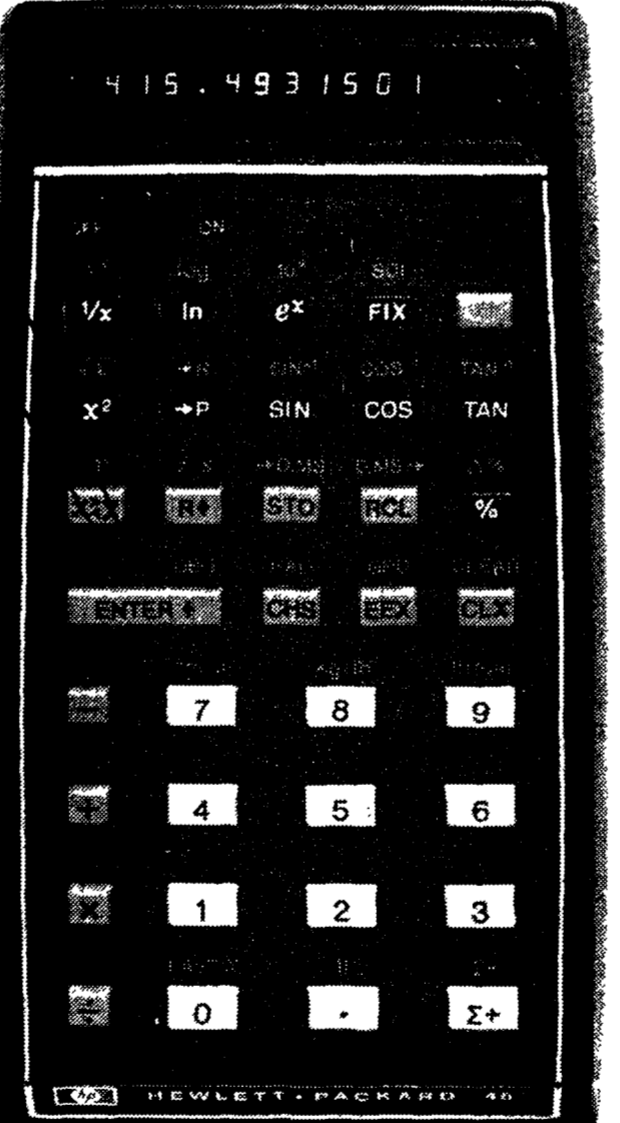
