"In a time of crisis a black student should be able to turn to the University for help," Howard said, "but he can't, so he turns to Black Caucus."

According to Lewis, most students have the misconception that Black Caucus is a radical group. "Black Caucus wants to solve problems, not create them." he said.

Lewis said that Black Caucus does not

want to segregate, but rather promote black culture and give the University community an opportunity to become

aware of black cultures.

Hopefully the importance of this awareness will be in uniting all peoples," Lewis said.

According to Howard, Black Caucus needs more student participation. He said that in order to fight apathy on campus, Black Caucus has formed five committees to cover all activities and

problems encountered by the black community at Penn State.

The five committees are:

-The educational service committee will handle tutoring, advising on courses and curriculum and information on

financial aid.

—The social service committee will provide speakers, exhibits, parties and other social activities.

-The political service committee will initiate services dealing with policies and politics.


-The family services committee will deal with specific individual family problems including child care and religious affairs.


