Quad renovation plans expected

The University is expected to draw up plans this summer for the renovation of West Halls and Pollock quads. West Halls Residence Association (WHRA) received notice from the University last week that the original plans for paving the West Halls upper quad would be redesigned by the office of Physical Plant.

Controversy began early in the term, when WHRA

initiated a petitioning drive to prevent the upper quad from undergoing the \$25,000 facelift. The proposal called for turning the grassy plot into a paved central patio bounded by benches, a terraced lawn, trees and shrubs.

The group contended that the area was one of the few recreational areas available to West halls residents. However, the University

held that the quad was designated as a "landscaped" rather than a recreational area.

Vice president for business Ralph Zilly said yesterday that the University has consented to a new design which would place a greater emphasis on trees and shrubs, rather than patio and benches. The finished drawings will be sent to a WHRA representative for consultation.

Zilly also said plans are

being drawn up for renovation of the Pollock area quad where a circular wall has been crumbling.

According to Paul W. Pierson, head of Landscape Planning and New Construction, the wall and its foundation will be removed and grass planted. He also suggested the possibility that "a small pad" would be built for "a small band or combo." "This is just the minimum kind of work to try and clean up the area," Pierson said.
