Unit OKs court nominee

Court nominee Juge John Paul Stevens won unanimous approval yesterday from the Senate Judiciary Committee. Hisconfirmation by the full Senate is ex- opinions on women's rights issues.

Stevens, nominated by President Ford to fill the seat of retired Justice William O. Douglas, sailed through the committee's hearings earlier this week without encountering serious opposition. The 15-member committee voted 13 to 0 to recommend confirmation. Two absentees, Sens. Hiram Fong, R-Hawaii, and John Tunney, D-Calif., had previously indicated their support for the 55-year-old former anti-trust attorney who is now a member of the 7th U.S. Cir-

Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., a candidate for his party's presidential nomination, voted for Stevens but indicated he disagreed strongly with his previous

"His views ... on equal justice for women do not demonstrate the type of empathy and concern that I would prefer in a Supreme Court justice," Bayh said. "If the choice had been mine, Judge Stevens would not have been the

Rulings by the Chicago U.S. appeals court judge in sex discrimination suits provoked opposition among women's rights groups, including the National Organization for Women which charged him with being "insensitive" to Fong described as "highly com-

Bayh said he voted for Stevens because of his "intellectual abilities" and integrity, adding that he could not conclude that his views on women's rights were of such magnitude to deny him confirmation.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass. reported to the committee that Stevens' tax returns for the past 10 years and a breakdown of his finances had been found to be satisfactory by former Internal Revenue Service Commissioner Mortimer Caplan who examined the


