U.S. cager's edge Puerto Rico 95-94

MONTREAL (AP) - Phil Ford's two free throws with nine seconds remaining lifted the United States to a 95-94 comeback victory over Purerto Rico yesterday in men's Olympic basketball.

Puerto Rico's Butch Lee, a New York City native who starts at Marquette University. had a shot roll around the rim and off, just before Ford provided the winning margin from the free throw line.

Puerto Rico got its final basket at the buzzer, a short jump shot by Neftali Rivera, a 27-year-old veteran competing in the Olympics for the third time.

. Until those closing seconds, the United States, which trailed by seven points with less than nine minutes remaining, appeared headed for only its second defeat in Olympic history

The first one, a one-point loss to the Soviet Union in the finals at Munich four years ago, cost the Americans the gold medal.

Ford, from the University of North Carolina, led the Americans with 22 points. Mitch Kupchak, also from UNC, added 17 and Adrian Dantley of Notre Dame had 16. Lee scored a game-high 35 points for Puerto Rico.

It was the second victory for the Yanks. Puerto Rico fell to 0-2 in the round-robin tournament.



The Puerto Ricans were leading 78-71 with 8:35 remaining before the Americans began chopping away behind Ford and Kupchak.

The United States took its first lead since early in the second half on a layup by Dantley with just over four minutes remaining.

Puerto Rico again took a three-point lead on two occasions before Quinn Buckner and Ford connected on consecutive baskets for an 89-88 American lead.

Rivera twice put Puerto Rico ahead in the final minutes before a tip-in by Dantley of Buckner's missed shot gave the Yanks a 93-92 lead with a half a minute to go. They stayed in front the rest of the way.

The comeback left the United States with an all-time Olympic record of 65-1, having had its 63-game winning streak stopped in Munich when the Soviet Union scored its controversial victory.

Montreal Olympic results

MONTREAL (AP) - Brian Goodell and John Hencken continued America's world record-shattering domination of men's swimming events in the Summer Olympics yesterday. But American Shirley Babashoff lost her bid to beat East German Petra Thumer and break East German domination of women's swimming.

Goodell won the gold medal in the 1,500 meter, freestyle and Hencken won the 100meter breaststroke gold, making five straight U.S. victories in as many men's swim events. But Miss Babashoff failed in a stretch duel with Miss Thumer in the women's 400 freestyle.

Goodell, of Mission Viejo, Calif.; was timed in 15:02.40 in the 1,500 meter freestyle. Bobby Hackett of Yonkers, N.Y., won the silver in 15:03.91 and Steve Holland of Australia was third in team gold medal in gym-15:04.66. All three were under Goodell's previous world record of 15:06.66 for this metric mile event.

Hencken, of Santa Barbara, Calif.; produced his third world record time in two days in winning the men's 100troke in 1:03.11.



David Wilkie of Great Britain was second in 1:03.43 and Arvidas Iuozaytis of the Soviet Union was third in 1:04.23. Hencken, 22, tied his world mark in Monday's preliminaries and then

lowered it to 1:03.62 in Monday night's semifinals. In the women's 400 meter swim, both Miss Tumer and Miss Babashoff broke the world record of 4:11.69, Miss

Thumer was timed in 4:09.89 and Miss Babashoff in 4:10.46. Shanon Smith of Canada was

Nadia finds her new fame hard to contend with

MONTREAL (AP) - Romania's Nadia Comaneci is the world's Olympic darling but she also is a tired little girl of 14, embarrassed by all the attention she is getting-and homesick "I want to go home," the doll-like gymnastics marvel replied when asked if she planned to follow her Montreal

adventure with an exhibition trip around the world.

She also said that gymnastics, which were "fun --- like a game," when she started at the age of 7, had now become very demanding.

"It is work," she says now. She never idolized — or copied — Russia's Olga Korbut. If she has an idol at all, it is Alain Delon, the French movie actor. She enjoys school, specializes in the French and English languages, but likes French best. She dislikes to answer questions in English. Her favorite

English words are "hamburger" and "okay."

These were a few of the tidbits that emerged from Nadia's first in-depth press conference since arriving in Montreal and capturing the hearts of spectators and the world's TV millions with her fawn like grace, her daring and childish charm.

She appeared timid when she was ushered into a room adjacent to the Romanian headquarters at the Olympic Village and was immediately surrounded by newsmen and photographers, with shutters snapping and bulbs flashing.

She was accompanied by her 15 year-old teammate, (Teodora Ungureanu, and her coach, Bela Karolyi, a handsome man of 35 who could not hide his pride.

Nadia sat straight in her chair, showing no nervousness and letting her brown eyes search those of every questioner. She rarely smiled. When she did, it was a tight-lip smile.

She looked like a little girl who was desperately anxious to run away and play. She even admitted this to be true.

"I came here prepared to do gymnastics, not to be interviewed," she said when asked if the situation made her uncomfortable.

Questions were asked in several languages, mostly English and French, and translated by an interpreter.

One British television man asked Nadia if she would please say something to Britain in English.

Nadia pondered a moment, blushed for the first time and replied: "I would prefer to say it in French."
