EDUCATION: A.B., Dickinson Coll.; J.D., Dickinson Sch. of Law.

OCCUPATION: State Senator
TRAINING & EXPERIENCE: Dist. Atty. of Clearfield Co., 1954-61; U.S. Atty. for the Western Dist. of Pa., 1961-63.

ANSWER TO QUESTION: The energy problem is definitely a federal concern. The Congress should adequately fund research directed at finding new means of energy. Pennsylvania, with its vast coal reserves, could benefit economically from any new methods of either mining or using coal. — I believe in a responsible defense budget. Over the years it has been something of a sacred cow and was not scrutinized closely enough by Congress. We need a strong defense, but there is no reason why we cannot achieve that while exercising fiscal prudence.

TRAINING & EXPERIENCE: Mbr. Bar, all Pa. Courts & U.S. Supreme Court; 30 yrs. exp. banking; 17 yrs. in Pa. Legislature — GOP Floor Leader 9 yrs., GOP Whip 4 yrs. Currently serving 7th term in Congress.

ANSWER TO QUESTION: (1) Employment. Employment opportunities in 23rd district have been improving each year because of opening of Interstate 80 where over 3000 new jobs have been provided. I have assisted in funding of new industrial parks which will increase employment, and to this end strongly support new highways. (2) Energy. The 23rd Dist. comprises 100 per cent pure Pa. oil fields, including other resources. We need to provide incentives to develop oil, gas and coal. We cannot create jobs, nor maintain our standard of living, unless we have an adequate supply of energy.

ANSWER TO QUESTION: Unemployment and the high cost and scarcity of energy are two major and related priorities. If we had full employment, we'd have a balanced budget, with fewer people needing unemployment compensation or welfare. U.S. industry is working at 73 per cent of capacity. That's wasteful and inflationary. Our standard of living, and our industrial machine, must not be dependent on a hostile oil cartel. We must act quickly to develop alternate sources of energy.

EDUCATION: Yale, B.A.; Harvard, MBA

OCCUPATION: U.S. Congressman
TRAINING & EXPERIENCE: Service in 92nd, 93rd and 94th U.S. Congresses.

ANSWER TO QUESTION: Jobs and transportation are and will continue to be among my highest priorities in the U.S. Senate. Unemployment is tragic for the individual who must go jobless and it is also a burden on the taxpayer who must pay the welfare costs that unemployment entails. With an expanding labor force, it is vital that Congress foster a new environment of growth and development so that people who want to work will be able to do so. Railroads are essential to the health of Pennsylvania's economy. In the coming years we must make certain that we have a rail transportation system that can move goods and that can service the coal regions, which will play a vital role in helping America become energy-independent.

development of Pa.'s coal mining capabilities, especially of high quality low sulphur anthracite, and the doubling of steel production in the state through introduction of the Jordan Blast Furnace concept.

OCCUPATION: Social studies teacher, Westerly Parkway Jr. H.S.

TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE: Pres., Pa. State Ed. Assn., 1969; Pres., Natl. Ed. Assn., 1972. Mbr., Bd. of Trustees, PSU, 1969 - present. Currently represent Pa. Education Comm. of the States. Extensive legislative and executive experience, state and natl. govts., 1968 - present.

ANSWER TO QUESTION: 1. Education: Current school subsidy studies to determine long term revision will necessitate increased revenue to provide equitable funding to local districts and increased appropriations for higher education. 2. Land - use Planning: Future planning must be a cooperative effort between state, regional and local units with the state providing research, incentives and minimum legislation to guarantee preservation of farm land, recreational facilities and environmental protection while providing balanced economic and industrial growth.

ANSWER TO QUESTION: (1) Education — Research and programs to qualify people for jobs are essential functions of education. The economy, land use, housing, conservations, veterans affairs and environment are local as well as state and national problems. Education and educational facilities can play an important role in providing solutions to these problems. With appropriate support, the university can continue to provide leadership, facilities and research to help solve these problems. (2) Land Use Planning - Land is limited. Planned use is essential. We must preserve our farms, therefore inducements to keep land in farms are a necessity. Recreational use, waste disposal, housing and conservation are other considerations. Proper balance must be maintained.
