ASA funds requested for flea market

The Undergraduate Student Government Student Affairs Committee requested money yesterday from Associated Student Activities Budget Committee to fund the operation of a flea market early next year.

The committee requested \$668.10 for the market, which is planned for Jan. 11, 12 and 13 to provide students with the opportunity to sell any used personal item.

The budget committee also heard a joint request from Colloquy, Interfraternity Council (IFC) and Panhellenic Council and one from the Graduate Student Association (GSA).

Colloquy, IFC and Panhel asked for \$3,391.90 to co-sponsor a Feb. 9 appearance of Leonard Nimoy at the University Auditorium.

GSA put in a request for \$3,616.80 to fund their year's operations.

In action on last week's requests the committee allocated \$1,820.28 of a requested \$1,888.88 to the Free University for the establishment of a Free U Library, according to Jeannette Morris, committee chairman.

The College of Business Administration Student Council received none of requested additional funds to cover its publications, Morris said.

The reason, she said, was the committee felt the council had been funded sufficiently in the spring to cover those costs. She said that the submitted printing costs "were not commensurate with other student organizations who print similar publications."
