

# Wolves devour Lion grapplers

Penn State's wrestling team jumped to a quick 12-0 lead last night, but didn't win another bout in Ann Arbor as the Michigan Wolverines upended the Lions, 32-16.

The Wolverines, now 2-0 and perennial Big-10 runners-up to powerful Iowa, won six and drew two of the last eight bouts and avenged last year's 28-6 Rec Hall loss to the Lions.

The Lions, 2-1, gained their short-lived 12-0 lead when freshman Mike DeAugustino, remaining at 3-0 for the season, won by forfeit at 118 lbs., and Jimmy Earl, now 4-2, used a second period headlock to pin Amos Goodlow.

However, the comfortable lead disintegrated on the strength of two superior decisions at 134 lbs. and 142 lbs.

Rich Lubell bombed Penn State freshman Bernie Fritz, in his first varsity match, 17-2, at 134 lbs. Fritz is the brother of former Lion and NCAA champion John Fritz. And at 142 lbs., Carl Briggs closed the Lion lead to two, 12-10, when he slaughtered State's Terry Shultz, 26-7.

But a close team match after the 142 lb. bout has been the rule so far this season for Penn State. Indeed, last night was the first time the Lions were

winning after the initial four bouts. Against Florida, the Nits trailed 11-3, and against Buffalo, they were losing by a 9-5 count.

But Bill Vollrath and Dave Becker, a pair of very dependable Lion middle weights at 150 lbs. and 158 lbs., could not turn the Lions around this time.

Vollrath, now 5-1, was decked by sophomore Mark Churella, who finished third in last year's NCAAAs. Churella, who beat Vollrath last year, was in command throughout and finally pinned the Lion at 7:04 with a 13-2 lead.

In the first close bout, Becker and Brad Holman entered the third period locked at 2-2, with the Nittany Lion junior, now 5-1, on top. But midway through the period, the referee ruled a point for Holman because Becker deliberately took Holman off the mat.

Becker then let Holman up for a 4-2 Wolverine lead, as Becker then needed a takedown, with the accompanying riding time point to win.

But Holman countered a quick Becker move to the leg and took him down with 29 seconds left to seal a 6-3 win and provide a 19-12 Wolverine lead.

Things only got worse at 167 lbs., where Ed Neiswender pounded out a 9-3 nod over Ashley Swift, now 2-1.

Jerry White's 0-2 career record against Wolverine



Mark Johnson indicated a rough match for the Lion captain. But White wrestled well to grab a 5-3 lead after two periods.

After Johnson escaped to start the third, both grapplers gained simultaneous stalling points and White held a slim 6-5 lead with 19 seconds remaining. But Johnson used a single-leg to take down White with 11 seconds to go and White's riding time point preserved his 7-7 draw.

At 190 lbs., Lion Bill Bertrand led 8-0 in the second, but Harold King used two takedowns, back points, and two stalling points on Bertrand to rally to a 10-10 tie.

Finally, State's Sam Salitt was decked by Mitch Marsciano in 7:38 of the final stanza.

# Search starts for '77 Super Bowl king

It's sort of a version of "new faces of 1976" in Saturday's upcoming National Football League playoff games. But on Sunday it's like old times.

The playoffs begin Saturday with the two wildcard teams on the road - Washington at Minnesota in the National Conference and New England at Oakland in the American Conference. The Redskins aren't

exactly what you'd call fresh new faces, but they are making a return to the playoffs after a one-year absence.

The Patriots, though, are new to this sort of thing. The last time they made the playoffs was the only time they made the playoffs, when they were the Boston Patriots of the American Football League in 1963. They were demolished 51-10 by San Diego in the AFL title game.

Sunday brings a pair of rematches of 1975 playoff teams, one of them literally a mirror image of a game of a year ago.

In the AFC, Pittsburgh's Steelers, the winners of the last two Super Bowls and of their last nine regular-season games, are at Baltimore. A year ago, Baltimore took a nine-game winning streak into Pittsburgh for a first-round game and came out of

it on the short end of a 28-10 score. Los Angeles is at Dallas Sunday in a replay of last year's NFC championship game, when the Cowboys rode into Los Angeles and trampled the Rams 37-7.

Pittsburgh at Baltimore is a fascinating matchup. The Steelers allowed a league-low 138 points while the Colts scored a league-high 417. Pittsburgh, trying to become the first team to win three Super Bowls, allowed an incredibly low 28 points in its last nine games, five of them shutouts.

"We're the No. 1 offensive team, but the Steelers have the hottest defense," says Colts running back Lydell Mitchell. "It's frightening. Maybe there's not really a word for it. Maybe 'phenomenal' is even a better description."

"If we can play the type of ball we're capable of playing, it's there," Pittsburgh running back Rocky Bleier said of a third straight NFL title. "If we can play basic football, keep our emotion going and play the kind of ball we're capable of playing, we can do it."

Dallas would not doubt like to play Washington in the Dec. 26 NFC title game, if only to get even for Sunday's

27-14 loss at home to the Redskins.

According to one Las Vegas oddsmaker, Oakland is a seven-point favorite over the Patriots, Minnesota rates a four-point edge over the Redskins, Pittsburgh is a three-point favorite over the Colts and Dallas is listed at 3 1/2 points over the Rams.

Two of the playoffs - New England at Oakland and Los Angeles at Dallas - are rematches of games played earlier in the year, although one of them was an exhibition. On Oct. 3, the Patriots, having already knocked off Miami and Pittsburgh on successive weeks, made it three straight upsets by crushing the Raiders 48-17.

"That score doesn't mean a thing now," says Oakland quarterback Ken Stabler. "You've got to go out there each week and do it. Going into the playoffs, everybody is even."

About eight weeks earlier, in the second weekend of preseason play, Los Angeles beat the Cowboys 26-14 to reverse the 1975 playoff outcome. "I expect a typical, hard-nosed Dallas football team," Rams Coach Chuck Knox predicted.

"We'll have to play our best game of the year."

# Orangeman hit century mark, peel Lion cagers

That sigh you hear is from John Bach and the Penn State basketball team. A tough three-game road trip, which netted three losses, is finally over. After dropping road games to Kent State, 73-70, on Thursday, and Marquette, 79-49, on Saturday, the Lion cagers lost to 15th-ranked Syracuse, 101-63, last night to drop their season record to 2-4.

The Orangemen, 7-1, started slowly, but led throughout the contest before a capacity crowd at Manly Field House on the campus of Syracuse University. The Orangemen gradually built up a lead during the first half, and ran off eight consecutive points late in the first stanza to take a 44-25 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Syracuse held a decisive edge in rebounding at halftime, 18-9. Penn State's top two rebounders, Carvin Jefferson and Steve Kuhn, could garner only six rebounds combined.

The Orangemen took complete charge of the contest at the outset of the second half, upping their lead to 25 points less than halfway through the second period.

Leading 70-40 with 10:52 remaining in the game, the Orangemen ran off a 10-point barrage behind the shooting of 5-10 senior guard Jim Williams and 6-5 forward Reggie Powell to take a commanding 80-40 lead.

Syracuse maintained its large point

spread and cruised to its seventh victory in eight games.

One of the most exciting moments in the game, at least for Syracuse fans, came with less than 30 seconds remaining when Kevin James, a 6-4 junior guard, canned a jumper to push the Orangemen over the century mark in scoring.

One of the bright spots in an otherwise dismal game for the Lion cagers was the play of senior forward Chris Erichsen, who scored a season-high 28 points (his career high was 31 against Muhlenberg last season). Erichsen, who was admittedly in a slump but pleased with his performance against Marquette, scored 20 second-half points to pace the Lions.

Jeff Miller, a consistent double-figure scorer this season, tallied 12 points. Rob O'Connor had eight, Steve Kuhn collected six, and Jefferson scored five.

Williams led a well-balanced Orangemen scoring attack with 20 points. He was followed by Powell with 16, Marty Byrnes with 14, Larry Orr with 10, and Larry Kelley with 10.

TWO-POINTERS: Erichsen has wrestled the scoring lead away from Kuhn. After six games, Erichsen is averaging 13.5 points per game. Kuhn and Miller are each averaging 10.8 ppg, and Jefferson is fourth with 9.8 ppg. The Lions travel to St. Petersburg, Fla. Friday to compete in the Big Sun Invitational with South Florida, Memphis State, and Florida.

# Irish enhance upset tradition

The giant-killers of Notre Dame upset two Top 10 teams during the first month of the college basketball season. Now, the Fighting Irish are giants themselves.

Notre Dame upended Maryland in the first game of the year then, last Saturday, the Irish stunned UCLA 66-63 on the Bruins' home court. As a result, Digger Phelps' troops, 4-0 through games of Sunday, climbed to fourth place from seventh in The Associated Press weekly poll of 45 sports writers and broadcasters. Notre Dame received 601 points and five first place votes, and now opponents will be looking to

knock them off. Michigan remained No. 1, followed by Marquette and Kentucky.

Michigan, 4-0 after beating Vanderbilt 97-76, gathered 850 points and 34 first place ballots. Marquette, 4-0 after beating Western Michigan 78-53, Florida 64-61 and Penn State 79-49, collected 728 points and two first-place votes. Kentucky, also 4-0, received four No. 1 ballots and 662 points after knocking off 1976 national champion Indiana 65-51 and beating Kansas 90-63.

Fifth-ranked San Francisco, 8-0, collected 473 points with victories over Houston,

Tennessee and Utah and the Utah classic crown.
