They aren't the same color as Dorothy's magical ruby slippers. And it's a sure bet they don't sparkle when the sunlight glints off their laces.

But for Lady Lion distance runner Liz Berry, the beat-up green Adidas Spiders she uses in all her big races have that same magic quality. They get her home safe and sound -- and fast.

And, oh yes, they're borrowed too, just like Dorothy's were. No, not from the Wicked Witch of the West, but, according to Berry, "from Paul Stemmer, a superstar on the men's track team."

Dorothy's slippers took her a long way, from Oz to Kansas, but Berry has gone at least as far in her borrowed shoes.

"These shoes have been through the cross country nationals in Madison, Wisconsin, with me, and Stemmer ran in the Olympic trials in them and just about everywhere else," Berry said. "I just

seem to do well in them. I've worn them in most of my big meets."

But you don't need Berry to tell you her shoes have been around. All you need do is look at them, or stand down wind. One or two of the spikes are broken. There's a hole in the side of one of them big enough to poke half a foot through. Their color approximates that of mold on two-year-old bread, and the smell — whew! If you've ever opened the lid on a can of worms that have spent the better (read worse) part of the day in the July sun you know what I mean. (This last bit of imagery assumes you can still remember the July sun).

Even Berry admitted the shoes smell almost strong enough to run around the track themselves. "They are mighty powerful," she said at the meet Saturday while holding them at arms length. 'No one wants to run with me. Here, take a whiff.'

"Don't do it," Patti Knighton, a teammate of Berry's, and forever after a friend of mine, said. "I just picked them up and had to throw them down. Man, they'll knock you out."

On Saturday, at the Pitt Invitational, they did their job knocking out the opposition. Berry, in her borrowed shoes, won the three-mile run in Penn State record time of 16:29.7. In the two-mile event, she finished second to teammate Kathy Mills, and both of their times were good enough to qualify them for the AAU Nationals to be held at the end of February.

"Everyone thinks I'm crazy for wearing them," Berry said, proving that at the very least she's lost her olfactory sense. "Coach Brooks thinks I run in them because they're Stemmer's but the fact is I just like wearing them. I'm superstitious about things like that.'

When last seen she was standing on the track with her eyes closed, tapping her heels together again and again and chanting, "there's no place like the AAUs, ... there's no place like the AAUs, . . , *

Flyers extend streak


PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Left winger Bob Kelly scored one goal and had two assists to help the Philadelphia Flyers defeat the Atlanta Flames 7-4 in National Hockey League action last night.


The Flyers took a 4-0 lead in the first 14 minutes and had to hang on to extend their unbeaten string to eight games (5-0-3). The win extended their Patrick Division lead to six points over the idle New York Islanders.

The Flyers scored 1:59 into the game when Gary Dornhoefer bounced a shot past Atlanta goalie Phil Myre from eight feet up the slot. Kelly made it 2-0 with a backhander at 4:11 and rookie Drew Callander got his first NHL goal by tipping in a Rick MacLeish drive at 6:07.
