Lennig favors senior citizens housing

Dorothy J. Lennig, Democratic candidate for State College Municipal Council, said she supports the Bellaire Avenue senior citizen housing project and approves of its location next to the University sewage treatment plant.

"It's not the best site in State College, but I think the council is moving in the right direction to start on a small project," Lennig said in an interview Friday.

Several advantages to the site, she said, are its nearness to a park, doctor's office, dry cleaner, drug store, laundromat and gas station. She also said a bus route could be rerouted into the project and carpools formed to provide transportation for the residents.

Lennig said a housing project was going up near the site, adding that many of the homes already are being sold. If the smell from the treatment plant was bad, the houses would not sell, she said.

Referring to possible low-income housing projects in the future, Lennig said: "It's a good project to see if this thing works."

Lennig said she would "love to see a human rights ordinance passed" by council. The only problem, she said, was that unlike larger cities, the State College mayor has no power to enforce such an ordinance.

Discussing the proposed Allen Street Mall, she

said, "I support (it) — anything to make the downtown area nicer for pedestrians." She said funds for the project would have to come from the municipality because downtown

merchants are not supporting the project, and because the borough had once been able to get federal funds for the project, but had waited too long.

She also said she would like to see a farmers' market established downtown.

Lennig, a member of the Centre Area Transportation Authority, said she felt the area transportation system has improved greatly.

"We cannot buy new buses right now," she added, however.

She indicated she would work towards rerouting certain bus routes during peak-hours to increase efficiency, getting the University to subsidize the area transportation system, and setting up a bus route between State College and Bellefonte.

She also said she wants to establish a centralized transportation hub in the borough from which taxis, buses and car rentals could operate. Lennig said "doing your homework" was the main function of a councilman — researching issues to be able to make decisions on them.

On council accessibility, she said council members are very accessible.

"I've never heard anyone complain that they couldn't get a hold of a councilman," she said.

Lennig said the council should establish a relationship with the Organization for Town Independent Students to discuss housing and housing code problems.

Philly barge blows up

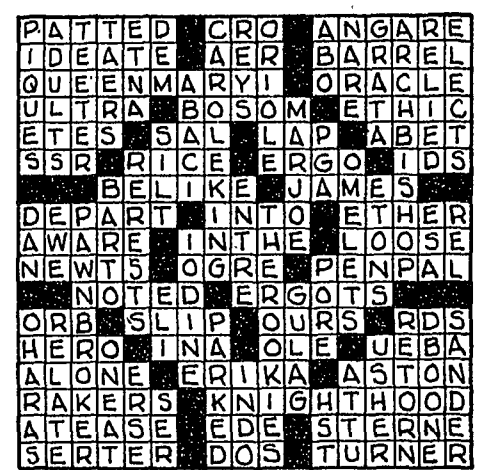
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A barge taking on home heating oil at the Gulf Oil Refinery in South Philadelphia exploded and split apart, dumping flaming oil into the Schuylkill River Saturday.

The captain of the barge, James Farlow, 56, of Princess Anne, Md., was still missing yesterday and believed dead. The other man on the barge,

Jeffrey King, 22, of Trumbull, Conn., dived into the water and swam ashore. He was treated for minor injuries at the Gulf Oil dispensary.

The flaming oil spread across and down the river, threatening other vessels and a bridge before the six-alarm fire was brought under control shortly after 4 p.m.
