Israel defense minister gets party nod

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) - Defense Minister Shimon Peres won his first challenge in the race for prime minister yesterday with a vote by the Mapam party, the ruling Labor party's dovish partner, to stay in the Israeli coalition.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, whose resignation set the stage for Peres' nomination, will have to pay a \$1,600 fine and his wife will face

criminal charges for an illegal bank account they held in the United States, the Ministry of Finance said yesterday.

The leftist Mapam leadership, deciding whether to pull out of Labor because of opposition to Peres' hawkish stance, voted 159 to 115 'to remain in the coalition.

The secret-ballot choice included a proposal to re-evaluate Mapam's relationship with Labor in six months. But that clearly was a face-saving measure, since the vote reversed Mapan's intention, announced in February, to pull out of Labor if Peres was chosen as a candidate for prime minister.

Labor's central committee later approved a final list of candidates for parliament, giving Yigal Allon and Abba Eban the No. 2 and No. 3 spots
