

## Phils lose 3rd straight

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Bill Bonham fired a seven-hitter while Jerry Morales cracked a two-run double and Bobby Murcer homered to lift the Chicago Cubs to a 6-2 victory over the winless Philadelphia Phillies last night.

Bonham, who struck out four and walked one, lost his shutout bid in the ninth when he made a throwing error on a bunt. After Garry Maddox blooped a one-out double for the Phils, Larry Bowa bunted and Bonham threw the ball past first base, with Maddox scoring.

Bowa raced all the way to third and scored on Greg Luzinski's single. After Jay Johnstone singled, Bonham got Bob Boone to fly out to end the game.

## Golfwomen take fourth

The Lady Lion golfers finished fourth in the Lady Buckeye Invitational and did about as well as expected, according to coach Annette Thompson.

"We did well, considering it was our first tournament," she said, adding that the ten other schools competing in the tournament had all competed in at least two previous meets this season.

Myra Norsworthy of Kentucky was the individual winner with a two-day total of 154. Judi Mitchell had Penn State's lowest score with a 168. Renie Kelleher was next with a 172.

## Leafs edge Flyers in opener

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Darryl Sittler and Dave Williams each scored one goal and an assist in a three goal first-period spree and the Toronto Maple Leafs held on to upset the Philadelphia Flyers 3-2 last night in the first of a best-of-seven National Hockey League quarter-final playoff series.

Three minutes later, Williams, who assisted on Sittler's score, took a pass from Sittler and sent a 30-footer that hit a Philadelphia defenseman's stick and deflected past Parent.

In other series openers, Boston whipped Los Angeles, 8-3, the New York Islanders edged Buffalo, 4-2, and Montreal demolished St. Louis, 7-2.

Less than two minutes later, Errol Thompson made it 3-0 — three goals in 4:42 — backhanding a shot past Parent on the end of a two-on-one break. It turned out to be the winning goal as the Flyers rallied for scores in each of the last two periods.

The Maple Leafs, fresh from a best-of-three game triumph over Pittsburgh, took a 1-0 lead at 4:10 on a 20-footer past goalie Bernie Parent, who was sprawled on the ice.

Philadelphia, appearing flat in the early going as the result of an eight-day layoff, finally scored at 13:25 of the second period on a 15-footer by Rick MacLeish.

"Four of our six players hit as well as anyone in the tourney with their drives and irons," the coach said. "But our short game hurt us, most importantly our putting."

"Kelleher in particular had more trouble than usual hitting the ball," Thompson said. "She did not have the acceleration she normally has, causing her game to be inconsistent."

Thompson attributed her team's difficulties to the course's large, difficult greens.

Kelly Grimes finished third for the golfwomen with a score of 181, and Kathy Patrick followed with a 182.

"When getting into shape, putting is the last area in which you regain your proficiency," she said. "We just putted too much."

Hallie Bunk and Sally Slater finished with identical scores of 185.

The Lady Lions finished with a score of 703 behind Kentucky, which had 643, Michigan State with 663, and Ohio State with 674.

The Lady Lions' next competition is the Marshall Invitational, April 22-23.
