Carew stays hot; Yanks nip Boston

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. (AP) — Minnesota's Rod Carew slammed four hits yesterday and boosted his major league-leading batting average to .403.

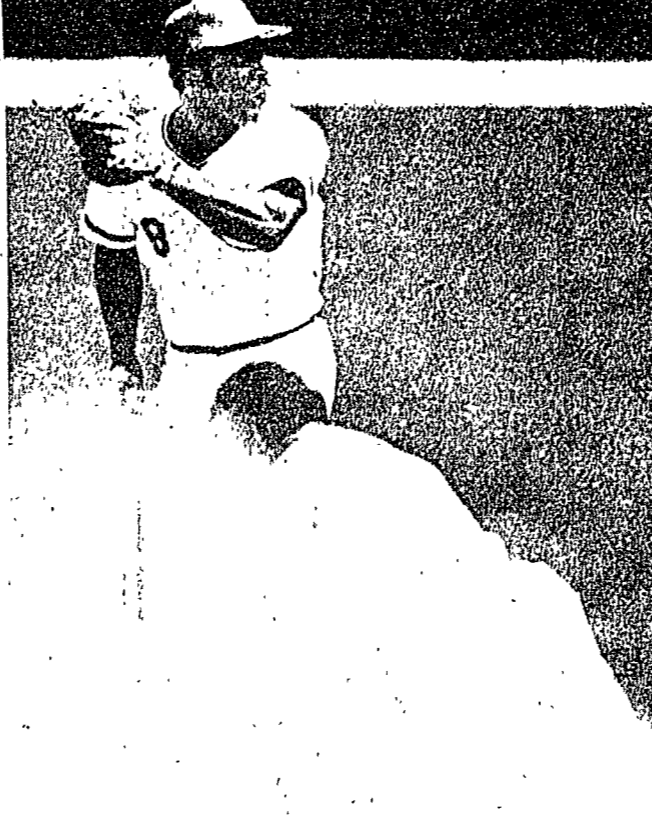
The five-time American League batting champion homered, doubled and singled twice in five official at-bats. He drove in six runs and scored five in Twins' 19-12 victory over Chicago.

It was the sixth four-hit game of the season for the 31-year-old Carew, who also has had one five-hit game this year.

In 69 games, Carew already has 114 hits — a pace which would enable him to surpass the all-time major league record of 257 set by George Sisler in 1920.

Carew also has knocked in 51 runs and scored 58 times and leads the major leagues with 13 triples, also a record-setting pace. The single-season mark is 26 set by Shoeless Joe Jackson in 1912 and tied by Sam Crawford in 1914.

But Cubs keep winning Bucs split with Expos

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Warren Cromartie's two-run single off relief pitcher Rich Gossage keyed an eighth inning rally that gave the Montreal Expos a 6-3 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday and a split of their doubleheader.

The loss snapped a six-game winning streak for the Pirates, who won the opener 7-4 with the help of a tie-breaking homer by Al Oliver.

The Pirates took a 3-0 lead after six innings of the second game as Bill Robinson, celebrating his 34th birthday, rapped a two-run homer and a run-scoring single off Montreal starter Stan Bahnsen.

However, Sam Mejias clouted a two-run homer in the Montreal seventh to chase Pirate starter Odell Jones.

After Pirate reliever Larry Demery walked Chris Speier to open the eighth, Gossage came on and surrendered four straight singles, including a two-run, bases loaded bouncer up the middle by Cromartie.

In the first game, Gossage earned his 13th save by retiring the side in order in the ninth after the Pirates had broken a 4-4 tie with three runs in the eighth. Oliver's ninth homer, a solo belt off Montreal starter Steve Rogers, put the Pirates ahead to stay. They added two more unearned runs in the eighth.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Steve Garvey hit two home runs, one in a six-run first inning, as the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Cincinnati Reds 9-3 in the second game of a doubleheader yesterday.

The Reds won the opener 5-4, as Dan Driessen continued his hot hitting with three hits, including a home run, and two RBIs.

The Dodgers and Reds split the four-game series this weekend and Los Angeles remained 8½ games ahead of the Reds in the National League West.
