And the night they can assure themselves, with a win over visiting Temple, the vital home field advantage in the playoffs. And the night Penn State's quickly-turning-coachinglegend, Walter Bahr, meets the team he coached five years ago.

"Temple is always a good game," Bahr said. "It's a game the kids look forward to every year. Our players know theirs from summer ball. I know their coach, their kids."

Bahr recruited some of Temple's players who will play tonight during his last year there. But if he has his way, the visiting Owls will have to work their asses off, if they intend to score.

"We're playing good, solid defense," the coach said. "We're covering for each other - teams are going to have to work hard to score."

The Lions, though, were criticized for their last two wins. Lacksidasical wins, some called them. Bahr said it at first but a look at the game films changed his mind.

"We played better than I thought. Maybe I was a little too critical," he admitted. "We moved the ball around pretty well.
