

Eagles maul Saints

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Quarterback Ron Jaworski ran for two touchdowns and passed for two others as the Philadelphia Eagles beat the New Orleans Saints 28-7 yesterday in a National Football League game.

The Eagles built a 21-0 lead and the defense shut down the Saints until the final period, when sub quarterback Bobby Douglass passed nine yards to

tight end Henry Childs in the end zone to avert a shutout. Jaworski swept 2 yards with three seconds left at the end of a 10-play, 57-yard drive for the Eagles' final touchdown.

Philadelphia gained a 14-0 halftime lead on Jaworski's score, which capped a 13-play, 66-yard drive. Horst Muhlmann kicked the first of his three conversions.

Steelers stumbling

DENVER (AP) — Rick Upchurch returned five punts for a team-record 167 yards, including an 87-yard scamper for a touchdown, and the aggressive Denver defense allowed Pittsburgh across midfield only three times in a convincing 21-7 decision over the Steelers in National Football League action yesterday.

Upchurch, who tied an NFL record

with four punt returns for touchdowns last season, fielded a line drive punt from Bobby Walden late in the first quarter, burst up the middle and outraced the Steeler defenders to the goal line.

It was the first punt returned for a touchdown against the Steelers since 1969.

Divers make big splash at Invite

Penn State diving coach Bob Goldberg knows what he's talking about when he says the Lady Lion divers have depth.

It was so crowded on the winners' podium as the women picked up the team trophy at Saturday's Penn State Invitational Diving Championship that Becky Binny was accidentally pushed into the pool, by her coach no less.

Penn State's four women divers finished second through fifth in the three-meter event; and second, third, fourth and 11th in the one-meter event to put them well ahead of second-place Clarion in the final standings.

"We had a couple of missed dives, but overall it was super," Goldberg said. "We had as many highs as lows, but I think it's clear we've established ourselves as a very formidable team."

The Lady Lions might have picked up the individual honors, also, had it not been for the expertise of Clarion's Aleta

Rice. She won both the one-meter and three-meter events.

"One of the reasons Aleta won was the 'dd' (degree of difficulty) factor," Goldberg said. "She does all the difficult dives."

Divers are scored on a combination of the degree of difficulty of the dive and how well they perform the dive. A higher degree of difficulty tends to get the diver a higher score, if the dive is performed well enough.

Binny, the defending champion in both events, finished second to Rice in the three-meter event. Binny's score was identical to her winning score last year.

"Maybe I was too psyched up for this meet," Binny said. "On two preliminary dives I stubbed my toe. But I got it together in the finals."

Freshman Katie Bewley was leading the field in the three-meter event after Friday's preliminary rounds. She finished fourth behind Rice, Binny and another Lady Lion, Lisa Pellow. Bewley

was second to Rice in the one-meter event.

"This was great for her first collegiate meet," Goldberg said. "The only dive that gave her trouble was the back one-and-a-half."

In the men's events, Clarion's Tony Perriello took the individual titles in both events. Maryland won the team honors, while Penn State finished fifth.

Freshman Craig Brown was the only Lion diver to reach the finals in both events. He finished fifth in the one-meter event and ninth in the three-meter event.

"Craig did a fine job," Goldberg said. "This was his first competition ever on the three-meter and he missed just one dive."

Sophomore Pat McFadden finished sixth on the one-meter. He was 15th in the three-meter event and missed the twelve-diver cut for the finals.

Penn State's only other men's diver, freshman Bob Ambrose, was 20th in the

three-meter event and 26th in the one-meter event.

Goldberg was satisfied with both the men's and women's performances in the sixty-one diver, 51-team invitational, especially since his team had not concentrated on this meet in recent weeks.

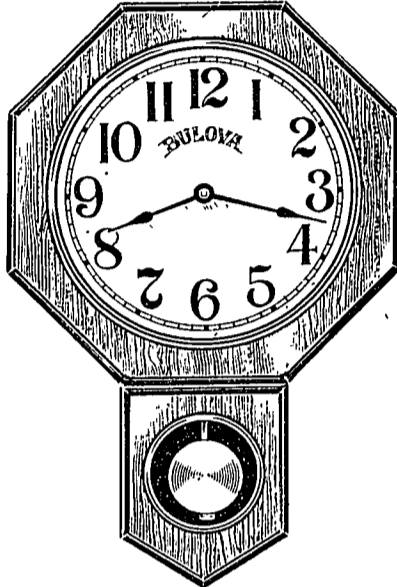

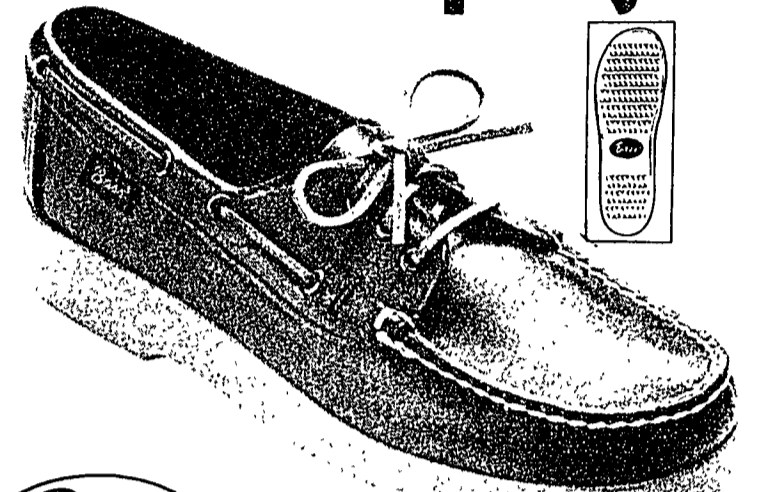
