

Oswald to discuss PSU fiscal situation at SAB

University President John W. Oswald will discuss Penn State's fiscal situation with student leaders at the Monday meeting of the Student Advisory Board.

Vice president for student affairs Raymond O. Murphy said Oswald called the special meeting to talk to the board about the budget crisis and the mailing campaign being organized by the University administration.

The University administration will be mailing letters asking students, parents of students and Penn State alumni to write letters to legislators requesting an end to the budget crisis.

Monday's meeting will be the first SAB session open to the press and public.

Oswald agreed last summer to allow the meetings to be opened if the board approved the move. The board voted last month to open the meetings and Oswald officially declared them public last week.

Undergraduate Student Government president Grant Ackerman said he felt the meeting was scheduled too close to the finals period for student leaders to attend.

Murphy said the meeting was called for Monday because the budget situation letters are being sent out and students are being called on to lobby in Harrisburg. — by Mary Ellen Wright

ASA allocates for 16 groups

Sixteen organizations received a total of \$11,199.62 in funds from the Associated Student Activities Budget Committee during Fall Term.

The Penn State Film Organization received the largest allocation, \$2,556.90. The next largest sum went to the Homecoming Committee, who received \$1,595.17. The Blue Band was allocated \$1,465.68 and the International Council received \$1,288.90.

Other organizations funded by the ASA were Black Caucus, the Undergraduate Student Government Academic Assembly, Homophiles of Penn State,

International Relations Organization, Friends of India, USG Department of Legal Affairs, Hong Kong Society, Circle-K, Jazz Club, Ukrainian Club, Eco-Action and the Hetzel Union Board.

Local airport's move debated

The Transportation Committee of the Centre Region Council of Governments met yesterday and discussed commuter service and area response to the proposed University Park airport.

It was suggested by a member that the committee appeal to the State College community for response to moving the airport from Philipsburg to State College. The move has already provoked some negative response in Philipsburg and one committee member said, "I see no reason why we can't marshal all resources here just as they're doing there."

"It's about time we get the people in the Centre region behind us," he said. Written communication between the University and the transportation

committee concerning improved commuter service to the airport has so far been less than satisfactory, committee member Clarence Trotter said. — by Jim Zarroli
