

# Bruins take 2-0 lead as Flyers' rally fails

BOSTON (AP) — Rick Middleton, the first game hero in overtime, scored two goals, including the tie-breaker with less than six minutes remaining, and spoiled Philadelphia's amazing comeback Thursday night in lifting the Boston Bruins to a 2-0 victory and a 2-0 lead over the Flyers in their National Hockey League semifinal playoffs.

Middleton, whose overtime goal gave Boston a 3-2 victory in the series opener Tuesday, came through once again for the Bruins after the Flyers had rallied from a 5-1 deficit, finally pulling into a 5-5 tie on Bobby Clarke's goal at 1:41 of the third period.

The Bruins regained the lead for good just 59 seconds after Clarke and Boston's Don Marcotte were penalized for interference at 13:25.

The Bruins went on the attack and kept the Flyers in the Philadelphia zone. Defenseman Mike Milbury passed to Brad Park, the veteran playmaking defenseman, then spotted Middleton all alone at the corner of the goal and fed him a perfect pass. Middleton merely flipped the puck over Philadelphia goalie Bernie Parent at 14:24.

The Bruins then got an insurance goal as Gregg Sheppard scored at 16:39 on a short backhanded flip. Park helped set up the goal for his third assist of the game.

The Bruins jumped to a 2-0 lead as Bobby Schmautz scored unassisted on a power play and Middleton followed with a goal just 54 seconds later.

Wayne Cashman hiked the score to 3-0 with a power play goal in a game just 12:31 old.

The Flyers' Orest Kindrachuk got Philadelphia on the board with a goal while Boston was shorthanded at 17:48, but John Rattelle made it 4-1 on a pass from Middleton at 19:51. Schmautz scored his second goal early in the second period before the Flyers came charging back.

Bill Barber, Rick McLeish and Bob Dailey scored in order for the Flyers to pull Philadelphia to within 5-4 after one period. Then Clarke tied the score setting the stage for Middleton's game winner.

The best-of-seven series now moves to Philadelphia for the third and fourth games Sunday and Tuesday.

### Tracksters go international

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Four American track and field performers will compete this weekend in an international meet at Fort de France, Martinique, the Amateur Athletic Union said Thursday.

They are quarter-miler Stan Vinson of Chicago, half-miler Bill Martin of New Rochelle, N.Y., high jumper Benn Fields of Salisbury Mills, N.Y., and triple jumper-high jumper Ron Livers of Norristown, Pa.

Organizers of the 1978 Ocean State Marathon in Newport, R.I., have decided to limit the 26-mile event to 1,600 runners this Oct. 29.

"If you get 3,000 people running and 6,000 people watching, you might have problems, especially if someone got hurt," said Bobby Doyle, two-time Ocean State champion. "Newport can't handle it. It's too congested."

Last year there were about 1,100 starters and 950 finishers. For October's race, the committee has already received 246 entries.
