## Kindrachuk lifts Flyers to victory

Kindrachuk's rebound score over Boston's sprawling goaltender in the second period snapped a tie, and the Philadelphia Flyers went on to beat the Bruins 3-1 Sunday night for their first victory in this National Hockey League semifinal playoff.

It was Kindrachuk's second shot in the series and his second score.

Kindrachuk's goal from the left circle helped Philadelphia reduce the Boston lead in the best-of-seven series to 2-1.

The fourth game is scheduled to be played here Tuesday night.

Kindrachuk's go-ahead goal that snapped a 1-1 tie came after Tom Bladon's shot from the right point rebounded off the left pad of Boston goalie Ron Grahame. With Grahame Kindrachuk beat the goalie to the near

Earlier, the Flyers brought the sellout crowd of 17,077 to its feet with a firstperiod goal by Andre Dupont at 11:36 from just inside the blue line.

Dupont's second goal of the 1978 playoffs whizzed into the far corner. beating Grahame, starting in goal for the first time in the series.

With 1:06 of the penalty left, Terry O'Reilly passed back to Brad Park, who fired a slap shot past Flyers' goaltender Bernie Parent on the stick side to make

In the third period, the Flyers scored an insurance goal at 3:22 when Bobby Clarke carried the puck around the Boston net and laid a perfect pass on the stick of Bill Barber, who was standing on the doorstep of the Bruins goal.

Barber just knocked it past Grahame, a fugitive from the World Hockey Association.

So, the series thus far has been a home ice affair, with Boston winning 3-2 in overtime and 7-5 at the Boston Garden.

### Princeton snaps netmen's 15-game streak

The men's tennis team remembered. something very important Saturday morning at Princeton.

It remembered how to lose, as 20thranked Princeton walloped the visiting Lions 8-1. Not since March 14, when Maryland edged the host Lions 5-4, had State even been involved in a close match, let alone a losing one.

The Lions, 16-2, regained their magic touch Sunday afternoon at Temple with a 6-3 victory over the Owls and, in the process, set a school record for most wins in a season with 16.

"Princeton is just a super team with a lot of telent and class," said Lion coach Holmes Cathrall. "The kids are just plain tired. Getting up for them and losing was a letdown." Cathrall said.

Mark Darby, the Lions No. 1 singles player, had an especially rough two days losing to Princeton's Jay Lapidus, 6-3, 6-3 and Temple's Nick Gregory, 7-5, 3-6, 7-

The Princeton loss also marked sophomore Tim McAvoy's initial defeat of the season, as the Tiger's Jon Gross

beat him 6-4, 6-3. In other results of the Princeton match, the Tiger's Tim Brightfield beat State's third-ranked Alex Davidson, 6-2, 6-3. Jim Zimmerman defeated Bill Schmucker, 6-4, 6-2, Leice Shiras edged John Freatman 7-6, 6-4, and Tim Wilson lost to Steve Meister, 4-6, 7-5, 6-3.

Penn State's only point of the match came when Davidson Schmucker teamed up to beat Brightfield-Gross, 6-3, 6-3. Lapidus-Shiras defeated Darby-McAvoy, 6-4, 6-1 and Zimmerman-Meister got by Freatman-Wilson in three sets, 6-7, 6-4, 6-4.

Cathrall said he was pleased with the team's win over Temple. "Temple is one of our rivals, so we were happy to beat them," Cathrall said.

In that match McAvoy bounced back to crush Temple's Alan Bond, 6-1, 6-1, while teammate Freatman beat the Owl's Gary Solomon, 6-4, 6-2. Wilson edged Dan Waintrup, 6-2, 7-6. Davidson lost to Felipe Oreamundo, 64, 64 and Bob Litterst defeated Schmucker, 6-0, 7-

The Lions swept doubles against the Owls with Darby-McAvoy pulling out a 2-6, 7-5, 7-5 win over Gregory-Bond. Davidson-Schmucker beat Rami Rothlost and Litterst, 6-3, 6-4 and Freatman - Wilson defeated Oreamundoand Mark Boggs, 6-4, 6-4.

## Watson chips his way past Trevino for third title

DALLAS (AP) — Tom Watson, twice tied by Lee Trevino, responded to the pressure with a boyish grin and some magnificent shots down the stretch and scored his third victory of the season Sunday in the \$200,000 Byron Nelson Golf Classic.

The dynamic red-haired Watson finished off the 4under-par 66 with a fantastic chip shot from deep trouble on the 18th, saving par there and the \$40,000 first prize that made him the season's leading money winner and the game's 17th \$1-million winner.

Watson acquired his ninth American title - not including his two British Open triumphs — by a single stroke over the onrushing Trevino with a 72-hole total of 272, eight shots under par on the 6,993-yard Preston Trail Golf Club course.

Trevino, now a two-time runner-up this season, also shot a 66 in the hot, muggy weather and finished at 273.

It was another 3 shots back to the group of four tied for third at 276. Veteran Don January and two-time PGA champion Dave Stockton shot 67s. Ed Sneed had a closing 68 and nervous Joe Inman a 69. Defending champion Ray Floyd was alone at 277 after

South African Gary Player, whose three-tournament winning streak was broken last week, closed with a par-

70 and a 285.

Current PGA champ Lanny Wadkins shot 69-293, Arnold Palmer was 74-291 and Johnny Miller 69-288.


