Only two wrestlers remain from this season's 2-11 squad. Sam Sallitt is a senior and 158-pounder John Hanrahan a freshman, but both have their work cut out for them in Iowa this weekend.

"I think it will be a good test for both of them," said Penn State assistant coach Andy Matter. "There aren't any bad wrestlers in that tournament.

Sallitt and Hanrahan advanced to the NCAAs by way of their places in the Eastern Wrestling League Tournament held in Pittsburgh two weeks ago. Sallitt took second place in the 190-pound class in that tournament, while Hanrahan was voted as one of four wild-card selections into the Nationals.

'Sam has been there before,'' Matter said, referring to Sallitt's opening round loss in the NCAAs last boot.
