Jesse F. Core, an adjunct professor of mining engineering at the University, was recently made an honorary member of the American Institute of Mining, Metallurgical and Petroleum Engineers. Core was one of four men to be honored by the Institute this year. There are only 50 living AIME members at any time.

Robert Stefanko, professor of mining engineering, was installed last month as the 1979 president of the Society of Mining Engineers.

The Society is a 24,500-member national organization of engineers engaged in the mineral industries.

Billy Ray Baumgardt, professor of animal nutrition, has been named associate dean for research and associate director of the Agricultural Experiment at the University.
