

Man arraigned for burglaries

• Robert A. DeArmitt, 18, of Pine Grove Mills, was arraigned before District Magistrate Clifford Yorks yesterday on 20 counts of burglary.

DeArmitt's arrest in connection with a series of burglaries of College Township businesses during the morning of May 4 led to the closing of several other burglary cases, the State College Police Department said.

DeArmitt's preliminary hearing is set for May 16. He is being held at the Centre County Jail in lieu of \$10,000 bail.

Investigation by state police at Rockview is continuing, State College police said.

• Two fires of suspicious nature were reported to the State College police over the weekend.

The first fire was at the Lenwood Corporation Apartments, 917 S. Allen St. The fire, which was reported Sunday by a tenant, was in a cardboard trashcan in the laundry room at the apartment building. The fire was put out by the tenant before the arrival of the police and fire departments, State College police said.

The second fire took place at 212 College Ave. Sunday. A visitor who was going from the third to second

floor exit smelled the smoke, found a cardboard box on fire underneath the staircase and removed it, police said.

• An attempted rape near 112 W. Mitchell Ave. was reported to the State College police Sunday. The assailant grabbed the victim from behind, placed his hand over her mouth and pulled her to the ground, police said.

The girl got her mouth free and screamed. A neighbor heard her and turned on the porch light causing the assailant to flee, police said.

The assailant was described as a black male in his twenties, six feet tall with an afro hairdo. He was wearing dark pants, sneakers and a white jacket, police said.

• Jacqueline Rogers, 502 E. Foster Ave., Saturday reported the theft of her three-speed bicycle from her home. The bike was valued at \$75, State College police said.

• Donna Schaeffer of Littleton, reported someone slashed the left front tire on her car while it was parked near 278 Osmond St. The tire was valued at \$50, State College police said.

• A 1971 Ford Pinto was reported

stolen yesterday from Abramson's Auto Wrecking, 2268 E. College Ave. The car was found in the woods near Fox Hollow Road with the windshield and lights smashed and the roof caved in from someone jumping on it, State College police said. Estimates of the damage are unknown.

Bill for rape victims introduced

HARRISBURG (AP) — A bill to set up a statewide office to help coordinate funding and services for victims of rape and domestic violence was introduced yesterday in the Senate.

The chief sponsor, Sen. Michael O'Pake, D-Berks, said local programs are struggling and face elimination without state help.

"I believe it's about time that the state recognize the importance of such programs and lend what resources it can," O'Pake said at a press conference called to announce the bill.

The bill calls for an Office of Crime Victims, which would provide financial

assistance to local crime victims' programs and develop a comprehensive plan on crime victims' needs.

O'Pake stressed that he wasn't proposing an addition to state bureaucracy.

"We're not creating a new agency," he

said. "It will be an office within the governor's office."

The office would be paid from a \$10 fee imposed on those who plead guilty or who are convicted of crimes and from a \$5 fee added to the cost of marriage licenses.

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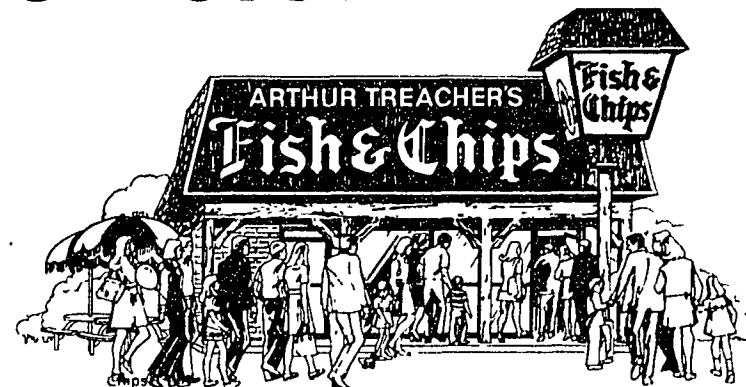
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
