ARHS wants refrigerator option

The Association of Residence Hall Students will send Housing and Food Services a proposal concerning next year's mandatory refrigerators which would give students the option of returning unwanted refrigerators.

The Board of Trustees has approved a \$33 room and board increase for next year which includes a \$5 per person charge for permanent refrigerators.

"It's not fair to make it mandatory," North Halls Representative Randy Whisler said.

Under the proposal, students will be

able to return refrigerators for two days after the first five days of class. Also, students will be able to get a refund for Fall Term, and the charge will not be included in the bills for other terms.

Whisler said refrigerators are a "luxury item" which students may not want to pay for, and some students have a "tight budget."

The proposal would also give new and transfer students the option to have a refrigerator placed in their rooms if one is not there when they arrive in winter and spring. All occupants would have to be present to process the return and refund.

Having both roommates present when refrigerators are returned will avoid hassles, Whisler said.

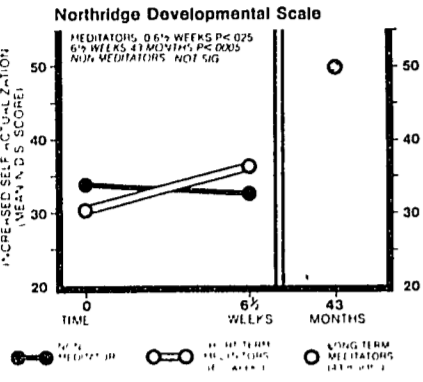
The University has already purchased the refrigerators, he said.

If the proposal is accepted, then the cost is "Housing's problem because they already purchased them," Whisler said.

Phil Grosnick, assistant director of Residential Life, said, "It would just take longer to pay for them; it would have to be done over time."

Steve Osborn, ARHS president, said if the proposal is accepted, students could be informed by a newsletter in the mailboxes at the beginning of Fall Term.
