House to vote on draft issue

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Armed Services Committee yesterday approved resuming registration of 18-year-old men for possible military service. The decision ensures the whole House will debate and vote on the controversial issue. The committee included a provision requiring the president to start registration again at the beginning of 1981 as it completed work on a bill authorizing weapons purchases and development for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1. Approval of the registration plan was by voice vote, but committee members had put themselves on record on the issue a short time earlier, 30-4, to defeat a proposal by Rep. Patricia Schroeder, R-Colo., to delete the plan. She opposed the plan adopted on

grounds we should "procure weapons and not people in this bill." In sharp debate, supporters of registration maintained it is "an insurance policy" that "will not draft a single individual." Opponents said it is a definite step toward conscription, "designed to lull some people to sleep." In addition to requiring the president to resume registration, the plan calls on him to tell Congress by next Jan. 15 if he wants standby authority for actual callups for service and how he thinks the registration should be carried out. The draft was scrapped when the all-volunteer military was started in 1973, and registration ended two years later. The issue rose again because of claims the armed services cannot find enough qualified volunteers.

Carter to defend Canal pacts

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter told Panama's President Aristides Royo yesterday he will oppose any congressional attempt to weaken Panama's canal treaty rights when it passes legislation implementing the pacts. After an hour-long meeting, the two leaders issued a joint statement pledging they would work "to ensure that both nations carry out the treaties, faithfully respecting both their letter and spirit." The White House is trying to reassure Panama's leaders that it will fight House attempts to write implementing legislation that would weaken rights accorded Panama in the treaties exchanged last June. The Panamanian government believes some provisions of a bill now before the House would violate the accords reached last year by Carter and Gen. Omar Torrijos, who chose Royo as his successor.

Israeli patrols withhold fire

Israeli jets flew over Palestinian refugee camps near Lebanon's port of Tyre yesterday and the Jewish state's gunboats patrolled offshore, but for the first time in five days the Israelis held their fire, Beirut's state-run radio said. In Israel, two explosions tore through a military munitions plant in the Tel Aviv suburb of Ramat Hasharon, injuring at least 16 persons including two schoolchildren, and sending Israelis scurrying to bomb shelters in fear of a terrorist attack. Israeli police ruled out Palestinian guerrilla sabotage in the guarded military installation. But the Palestine Liberation Organization claimed responsibility, declaring the attack was dedicated to the memory of a Black September terrorist who died in a mysterious bomb blast in

Beirut in January. The PLO news agency Wafa boasted in Beirut that the blast "killed or wounded no less than 50 of the Zionist enemy including a number of munitions but Israeli police late yesterday said emphatically the explosion was caused by a work accident "involving some mines that blew up." At the same time, the Israeli Armed Forces Command announced that the Palestinian guerrilla captured and wounded during the Palestinian raid into a northern Israeli kibbutz Wednesday had died of his wounds. The raid set off Israel's incursion into Lebanon in hot pursuit of three other commandos who fought an hour-long battle with an Israeli patrol. The Wednesday morning thrust was the biggest into Lebanon since Israel's invasion in March 1978.

Gov. says better plans needed

HARRISBURG (AP) — Better emergency plans are needed to help local authorities deal with a crisis such as the Three Mile Island nuclear accident, Gov. Dick Thornburgh told a state House panel yesterday. "I believe the development of clear evacuation parameters, and the education of the public as to what those parameters should be in any given situation, would greatly aid emergency preparedness officials in the future," Thornburgh said. "I don't want anyone to have to deal with a TMI again. But if it happens, let us see that this particular lesson is not lost," he added. The governor was the lead off witness before the 30-member House Select Committee on Three Mile Island, which is among a dozen federal and state agencies probing the March 28 accident. The investigation may take up to six months. Thornburgh's remarks were identical to those he gave before a U.S. Senate panel two weeks ago. He said he was plagued with notoriously unreliable information while he was

forced to make unprecedented decisions on whether to evacuate 650,000 people. He praised the readiness and performance of local civil defense authorities, but he added there were structural weaknesses in emergency plans that made them inadequate.

U.S., China sign assets pact

PEKING (UPI) — China has agreed to sign a long-delayed deal to pay the United States \$80.5 million for U.S. assets frozen in China in a move expected to ease the road toward a Sino-U.S. trade agreement, a U.S. spokesman announced yesterday. The spokesman said the agreement would be signed at 9 a.m. today in Peking's Great Hall of the People by visiting U.S. Commerce Secretary Juanita Kreps and Chinese officials. The United States has maintained it would not sign a trade pact with China without the assets agreement, under which Peking will have over \$80.5 million in partial payments for

U.S. assets frozen after the 1948 Communist takeover — about 41 cents on the dollar. The agreement, initiated in January but not signed because of last-minute changes, allows China to seek to recover Chinese assets, mainly commercial, frozen by Washington in retaliation for the Chinese action. Vice Premier Deng Xiaoping (Teng Hsiao-ping) gave a flat "Yes" earlier following a meeting with Kreps yesterday when reporters asked him whether the main trade pact would be initiated before she leaves the country Tuesday.

Asbestos workers file lawsuit

NORRISTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A class-action suit seeking \$52 million and a court-ordered warning about the hazards of asbestos has been filed against 11 U.S. and Canadian firms by seven former asbestos workers and the widows of six others. The suit, filed Wednesday in Montgomery County Common Pleas Court, is one of 1,500 asbestos-related complaints filed around the nation. It

contends the defendants knowingly allowed employees to work without safety equipment in a deadly atmosphere. The suit seeks \$26 million in compensatory damages and \$26 million in punitive damages from six affiliates of the Johns Manville Corp. in the United States and Canada and five other companies that supplied asbestos to the local firm.

Carter begins appeal for treaty ratification

WASHINGTON (AP) — With Senate leaders of both parties noncommittal about the new arms curb treaty with the Soviet Union, President Carter argued yesterday its rejection would cause the United States to be "looked upon as the warmonger." Carter also told a White House breakfast for retailers that if the Senate does not ratify the pact, this country would suffer a serious loss of trust among NATO allies, and efforts to halt the spread of nuclear weapons would be undercut. Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Byrd told the Senate he hopes action on the SALT II treaty can be completed this year — a hope echoed by Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, chairman of the Foreign Relations committee. Byrd, a West Virginian whose support could be crucial to Carter's search for the 67 votes needed for ratification, emphasized he remains uncommitted. In a brief speech at the opening of the

Senate session, Byrd said, "I'm not going to be intimidated by the idea that if my vote is against, that it goes down." Republican Leader Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee, who has suggested significant changes may be necessary to save the treaty, said he offered to keep Carter informed of the GOP head counts as the debate progresses. "I don't want my president to fly in the dark, to fly blind," Baker told his Senate colleagues. Carter appealed to representatives of the American Retail Federation "to help me sell to the American people and directly to the U.S. Senate the advantages of ratification." Contending ratification would be "the most important single achievement that could possibly take place during my lifetime for our nation," Carter declared. "Rejection of this treaty, now that it has been negotiated...would be a massive, destructive blow to world peace."
