The Who never die, they just get better

NEW YORK —The Who don't have to defend their title as the world's greatest rock 'n' roll band anymore. As of Monday night, the old Who gave away that title to the new Who in their fourth of five concerts at Madison Square Garden. The group's effective fusion of their old explosive style and material with the new proved they reign supreme over the world of rock music. Sure, the Who have changed a little. Roger Daltrey cut his hair for a film role and there are two new members: Kenny Jones behind Keith Moon's drum set and John "Rabbit" Bundrick on keyboards. But their high level of performance has remained intact. When Pete Townshend launches into the opening power chords of "Pinball Wizard," you know you're about to experience one of the most exciting stage performances ever. The energy level at any Who concert, both on stage and in the audience, is higher than most groups ever attain or can afford. But Monday night the group had the "rafters" knocking just the way it's described in "Long Live Rock."

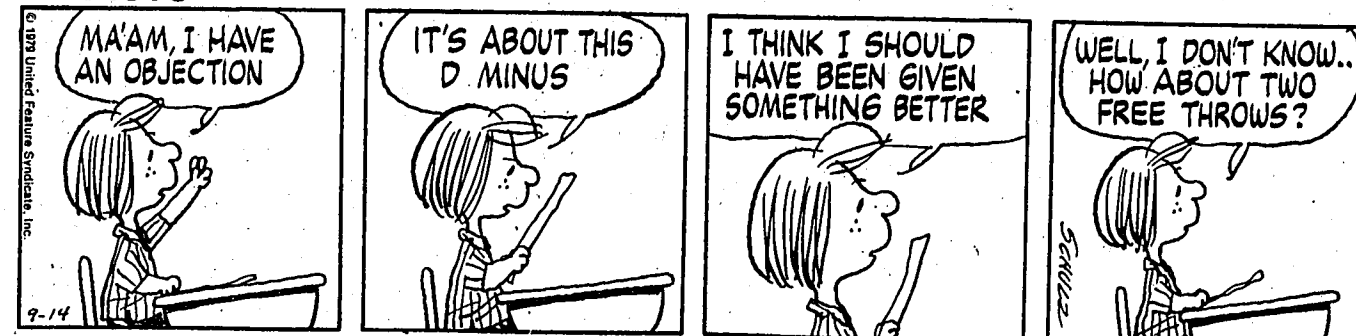

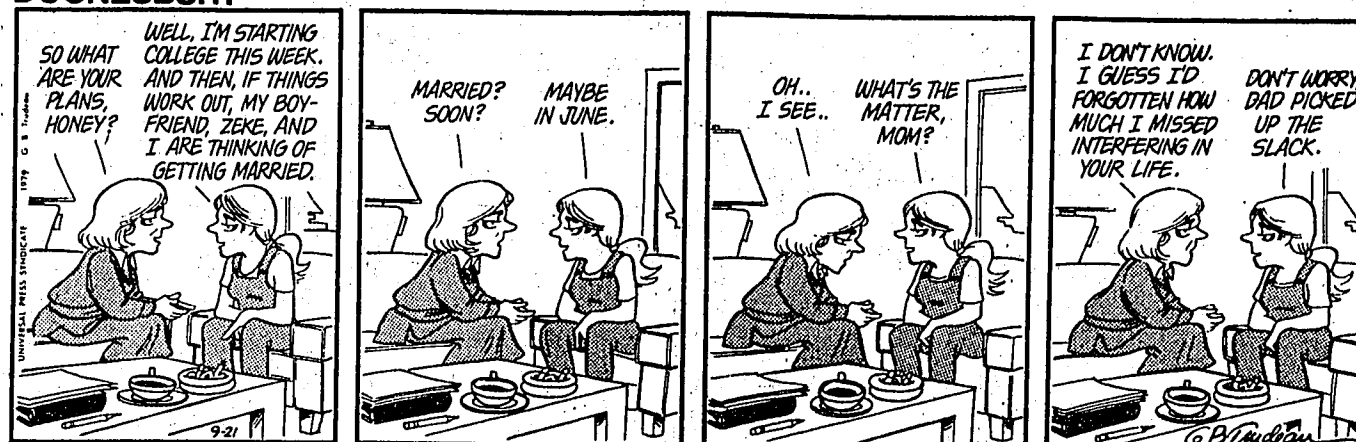
Who surprised everyone by appearing at 8:30 and playing nearly three hours, opening their set with "Substitute" followed by "Can't Explain," two early Who songs used to open their recent concerts in Europe.

It wasn't long, however, before the original Who achieved their perfect order of stage presence. Roger Daltrey pranced the center stage, treating his microphone like a lariat while Townshend wowed the audience with his power chords done windmill-style and his legendary leaps and splits. Despite the effects of a period of instability for the group, brought to a head last fall by Keith Moon's death, the Who's performance was unforgettable.
