# Flyers drop Islanders in opener

### Get first victory over New York in two seasons

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Goals by Phil Holmgren, Brian Propp and Al Hill within 81 seconds of the second period led the Philadelphia Flyers to a 5-2 victory over the New York Islanders last night in the National Hockey League opener for both teams.

The victory was Philadelphia's first over New York in two seasons. The Islanders, the leading regular season team in the NHL last year, had a 4-0 record against Philadelphia in 1978-79.

Leading 1-0 on a first period power play goal by Rick MacLean, Philadelphia broke the game open at the start of the second period.

Holmgren, who was the team's leading scorer through the exhibition season, rebounded Norm Barnes' shot past Islanders' goalie Billy Smith only 1:34 into the period for a 2-0 Philadelphia advantage.

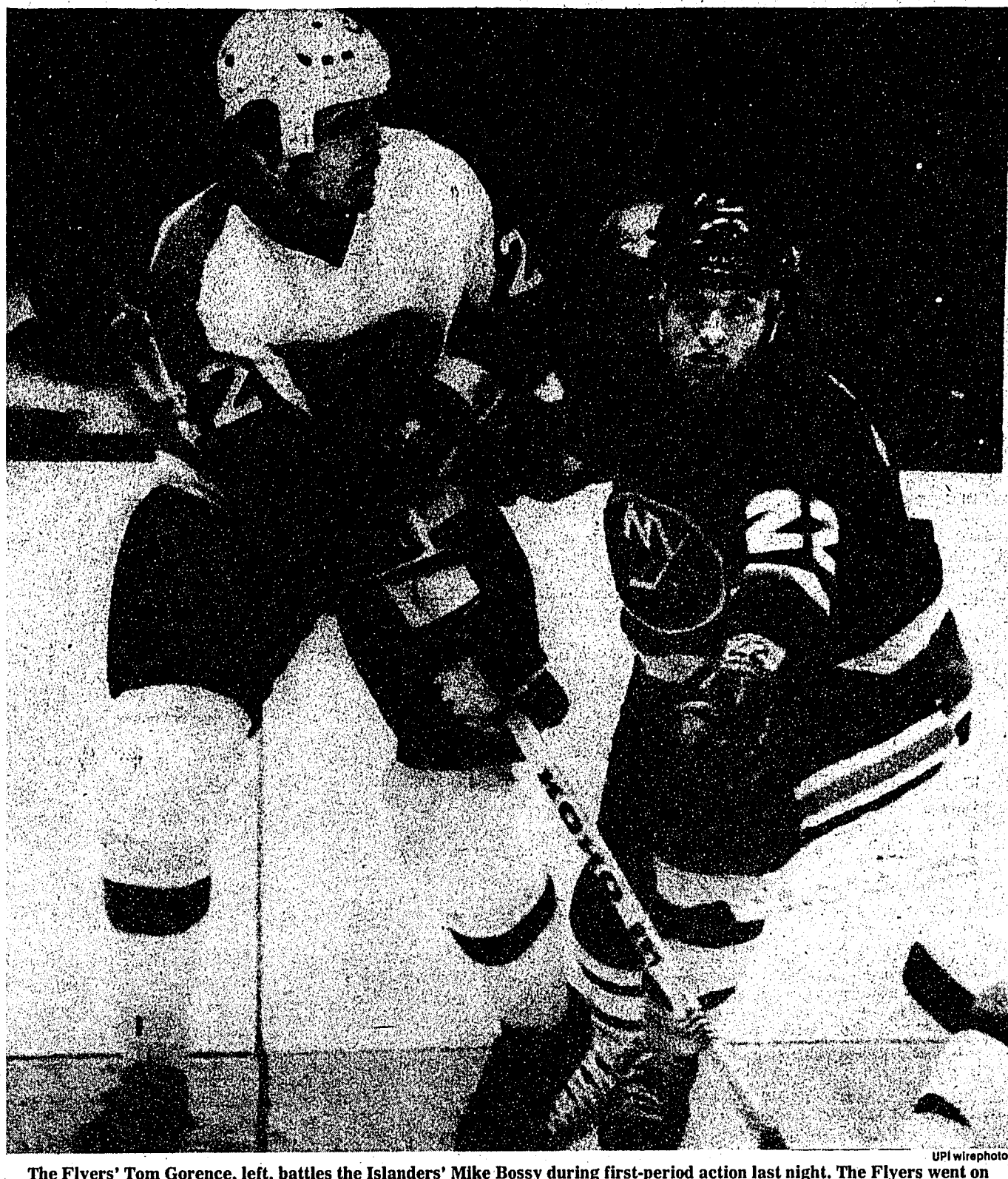
Brian Propp, the Flyers' top junior draft pick, scored his first NHL goal 1:04 later, feeding Bobby Clarke at the end of a 2-on-1 break. Propp skated to the net, where he picked up the puck after Clarke's shot hit a New York defender.

The rookies shoveled the puck under Smith for a 3-0 lead.

At 15:14 of the period Bryan Trottier, the league's leading point scorer last year, scored the Islander's second goal.

Philadelphia's final goal was by Tom Goreaux with 2:38 to play in the game.

The start of the game was delayed 25 minutes while the Flyers honored their former goaltender, Bernie Parent, who was forced into retirement by an eye injury last February. His jersey — No. 1 — was retired, the first time any NHL team has so honored a goaltender.

The new store has been added to the growing number of businesses in downtown State College. Campus Factory Outlet, 322 E. College Ave., was opened in August by Michael Rush (60-economic) and Larry Segal, who will become a student at the University next term.

"We're hoping that youth will support youth," Segal said. He said the purpose of the store is to offer to name brand merchandise at low prices and in great diversity.

"We can offer low prices because we're directly from the manufacturer," Segal said.  
The store contains very special displays, and most of the items are just stacked on shelves that Segal built himself. "It helps cut down on the cost," he said.

Some of the items that have been selling especially well are tape cassettes, hair dryers and popcorn poppers, Rush said. "We've gone through four case loads of tapes, and the popcorn makers sell to college students like crazy," he said.

Both townspeople and University students have been going to the new store.  
"I just stopped in to see what it was like. It's a pretty good store with a good selection of small electrical appliances," State College resident Bill Aull said.

Another student who did not give his name said, "25 percent off market price for a watch sure isn't bad, but I'm going to shop around a little more."  
The stereo and camera equipment is scheduled to arrive this week, Rush said. "Once the stereo gets here, we'll double our volume of customers," he said.
