**On Campus** — "Zabriskie Point" — Two post-revolutionary innocents try to figure the system but end themselves destroyed by the backlash. Directed by Michaelangelo Antonioni. Music by The Grateful Dead. The Rolling Stones and Pink Floyd. **Shandylall** — DJ Gran Stan plays original golden oldies Friday and Saturday night.

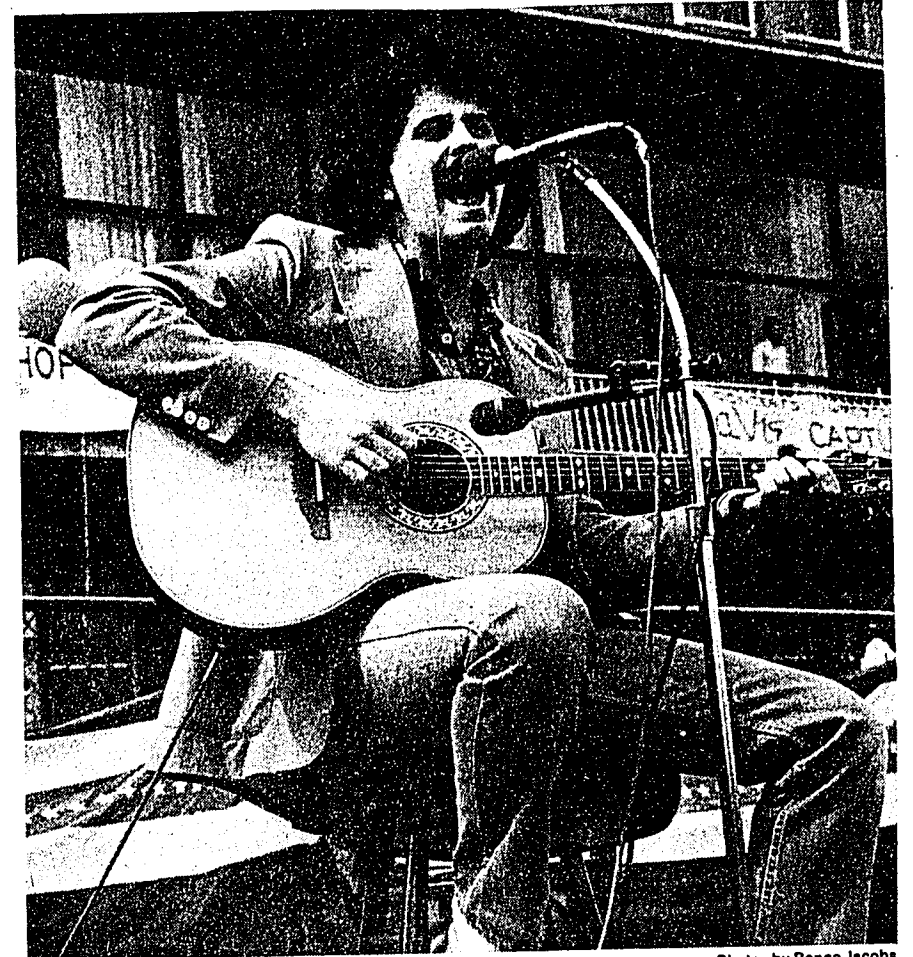
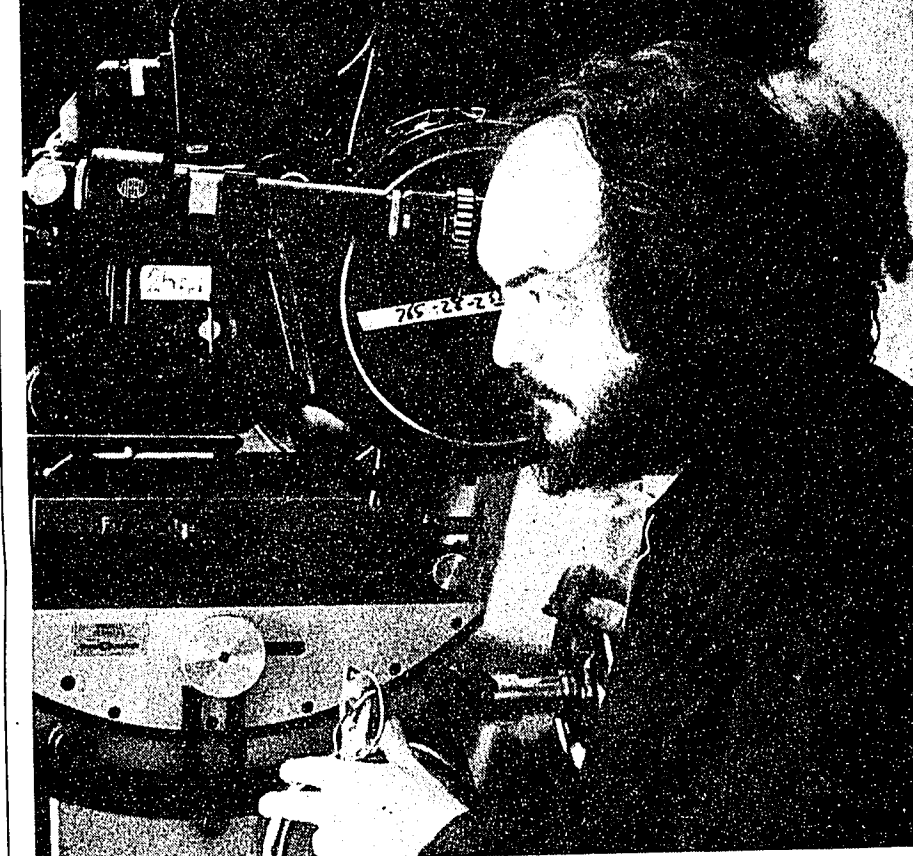
