

Phils take two, Buc's fall to Mets

CHICAGO (AP) — Bob Boone's eighth-inning home run snapped a 2-2 tie yesterday and led the Philadelphia Phillies to a 5-2 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Philadelphia also registered an 8-5 victory over the Cubs in the completion of a suspended game as Bake McBride singled home Larry Bowa with the go-ahead run in the top of the 15th inning.

The victories snapped a 10-game Philadelphia losing streak on the road.

Steve Carlton, 18-6, went the distance to register his eighth complete game of the season. He yielded eight hits, struck out five and issued one walk. The five strikeouts gave Carlton 200 for the season—the sixth time in his career he's reached that plateau.

Boone led off the eighth by slamming a 2-0 delivery off loser Mike Krukow, 7-12, for his eighth home run of the year. Two outs later Pete Rose ripped a single and the game as McBride tripled into the alley in right-center field. McBride then scored on a single by Mike Schmidt.

Mets 3, Pirates 1

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Ray Burris blanked Pittsburgh for eight innings and Alex Trevino broke up a pitching duet with a two-run single in the seventh inning as the New York Mets halted the Pirates' longest winning streak of the season at eight games with a 3-1 victory last night.

Burris, 6-6, and loser Rick Rhoden, 2-3, each allowed four hits through six innings of a scoreless game.

"The guy pitched a great game against us. What can you say? He challenged the hitters and he got us out," said Rhoden, who fell to 2-3 as Burris climbed to 6-6.

Expos 4, Cardinals 0

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Gary Carter doubled home Ellis Valentine in the fourth inning as the Montreal Expos, bolstered by a triple play, defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 4-0 last night behind the four-hit pitching of Fred Norman and two relievers.

The victory enabled Montreal, beaten 16-0 by St. Louis Monday night, to regain a share of the lead in the National League East with the Pittsburgh Pirates, who lost to New York.

Norman, 3-2, making only his fifth start of the year, allowed all four St. Louis hits in six innings plus before Elias Sosa and Woodie Fryman finished up.

Valentine opened the Expos' fourth with a single, the first hit off St. Louis starter John Fulgham, 3-5. After Warren Cromartie filed to deep center, Valentine stole second and Carter then hit a single, the first hit off St. Louis reliever Mike Balfanz.

Yankees 8, Chicago 4

NEW YORK (AP) — Ruppert Jones hit the first grand slam homer of his career in the 10th inning to give the New York Yankees an 8-4 victory over the Chicago White Sox last night.

The victory and Baltimore's loss to Kansas City put New York 3 1/2 games ahead of the Orioles in the American League East Division.

The winning rally started with one out when Aurelio Rodriguez walked and went to third on a single by pinch hitter Jim Spencer. Ed Farmer, 6-5, intentionally walked Willie Randolph to lead the bases before Jones hit his game-winning homer on a 3-2 pitch.

Boston 5, Tigers 4

DETROIT (AP) — Boston's Jim Dwyer belted a solo homer in the eighth inning to snap a 4-4 tie as the Red Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers 5-4 and spoiled the comeback of Mark "The Bird" Fidrych last night.

Dwyer's seventh homer of the season was a bitter disappointment to the 48,361 fans at Tiger Stadium who came to see the fourth comeback effort of Fidrych. The popular right-hander captured the imagination of the baseball world in 1978 when he was 19-9 and won American League Rookie of the Year honors.

The 6-foot-3 Fidrych was recalled Sunday from the Tigers' Triple A farm club at Evansville, Ind., where he has been trying to comeback from a variety of arm ailments.

Fidrych appeared just a little nervous in the first two innings, but quickly settled down and gave a creditable performance, allowing 11 hits while striking out three over eight innings. He gave way to Aurelio Lopez in the ninth after throwing 120 pitches, 80 of them strikes.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Amos Otis drove a bases-loaded walk in the winning run in the bottom of the ninth inning and lifted the Kansas City Royals to a 4-3 victory over the Baltimore Orioles last night.

The loss snapped a 10-game winning streak for the Orioles, who fell 3 1/2 games behind the New York Yankees in the American League East.

The Royals opened the ninth when Frank White was hit by a pitch from loser Scott McGreggor, 13-6. After a pair of fly outs, U.L. Washington singled to center, chasing McGreggor.

Texas 2, Indians 1

CLEVELAND (AP) — Toby Harrah blasted a two-run homer and Rick Watis won his ninth game with last-inning relief help from Victor Cruz as the Cleveland Indians nipped the Texas Rangers 2-1 last night.

Watis, 9-10, held the Rangers to four singles after a first-inning run on a leadoff triple by Mickey Rivers and Bump Wills' RBI single.

Flynn provides magic for Mets

It's a long way from slow-pitch softball to the major leagues, but nine years ago softball was Doug Flynn's game. And if some of his friends hadn't encouraged him to attend a Cincinnati Reds' tryout, he probably still be swinging at that big ball.

Flynn hails from Lexington, Ky., where basketball fever runs high during the winter months. He was a 5-foot-8 guard on the freshman basketball team at the University of Kentucky and was voted MVP. His job? Get the ball upcourt and play defense.

Now he's the guts of the Mets' defense — a take-charge guy who has evolved into one of the team's leaders. His steady play has settled shortstop Frank Tomars down and together they form one of the best double play combinations in baseball.

When the Mets got him in the Tom Seaver trade, Flynn was the best player in the league, and teammates Pat Zachry and Lee Mazzilli echo Tom, saying "he's the best."

Flynn's statistics are eloquent testimony. In 1978 he had the top fielding percentage among National League second basemen until the final day of the season, and last year led the league in assists and double plays, finishing with a .983 mark.

Yet he finished as runner-up both seasons in the Gold Glove balloting. Dave Lopes of Los Angeles won it in 1978 and Manny Trillo of Philadelphia took it last year.

Any batter he may have felt at not being selected has since subsided. "The Gold Glove is no longer that important to me," he says. "It's too political. I'm not out to win any popularity contest."

"That says a lot about him. He never has wanted to be an individual star and realizes that if his team does well, individual honors will come his way, too."
