Rising star wins Patty golf tourney

MAPLEWOOD, Minn. (AP) — Beth Daniel, in only her second year on the LPCA tour, successfully defended her Patty Berg Golf Classic championship with a 2-stroke victory over Hollis Stacy yesterday at Keller Golf Course.

Daniel, last year's Rookie of the Year, started the day with a 3-lead over Stacy but her bogey on 17 and Stacy's birdie narrowed the gap to two strokes. Still, Daniel was able to par No. 18 and finish with a 1-under 72 for a 54-hole total of 210.

"A lot of times you know when it's your golf tournament," said Daniel. "You can stand over puts and know that you'll make them. That's how I felt today and most of yesterday; all I had to do was hit the shot and know that I'd come through."

Daniel, who has finished in the top 10 in each of her last 12 events, picked up a winner's check of \$15,000, moving her to fifth place on the current money list past Nancy Lopez-Melton.

"Beth has played good golf all year," said Stacy, who finished with a 2-under 71 for a three-day score of 212. "She never was a rookie coming to the tour. She was about as much of a rookie as Lopez was."

Daniel, who led Patty Hayes by two strokes when play was suspended after 12 holes, started the day by holing out from a bunker on the par-3 19th hole and two holes later she sank a 20-foot putt to set the pace for the day.

"I was sure to win this one," said Stacy, who also finished first at the Golden Lights Championship a month ago, has earned nearly \$10,000 this season. The 23-year-old native of South Carolina said she got base early on the back nine and had to shake herself up.

"No one was really charging at me," she said, "and I was just playing for par. At 14 I decided I'd better start playing for some birdsies."

Football coach outspoken critic of nuclear power

HARRISBURG (AP) — Mickey Minnich, one of the state's most successful high school football coaches, isn't going to be a victim of the nuclear fallout from Three Mile Island after all.

Minnich is back at his old job as head coach at Steelton-Highspire.

"It feels good to be back," says Minnich, who admits some hard feelings linger over his decision to be an outspoken critic of nuclear power.

When Minnich decided to resign as coach to protest his unhappiness with new duties as assistant principal, the school board relieved him of all his duties.

"If TMI never happened, I might not be in this predicament," said Minnich the day after he was fired. Minnich had appeared on network television and had been interviewed by national publications. Steelton-Highspire and Minnich's home in Newbury Township are within a three-mile radius of the crippled nuclear power plant.

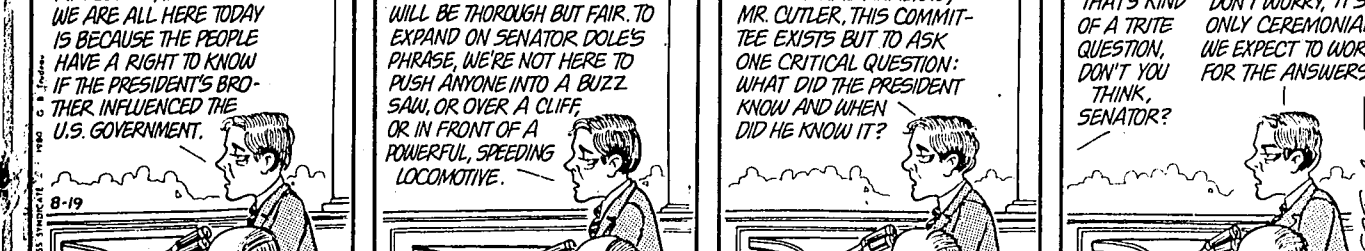
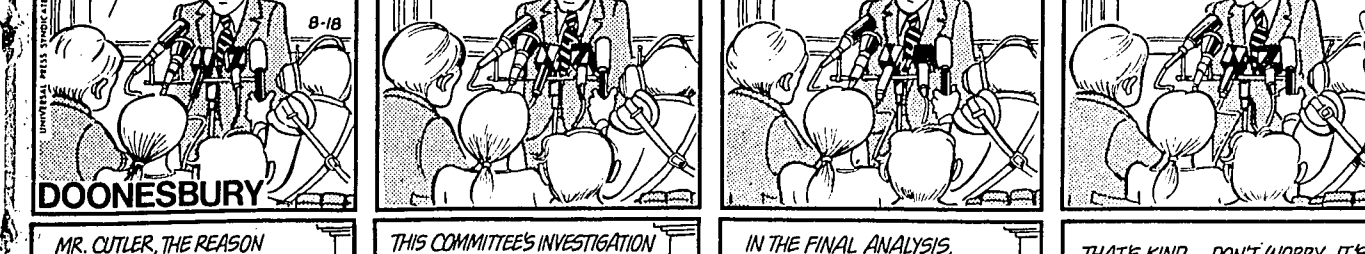
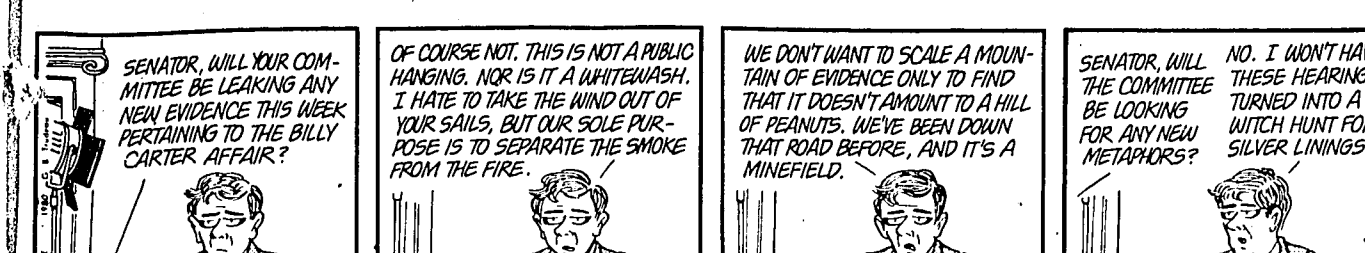
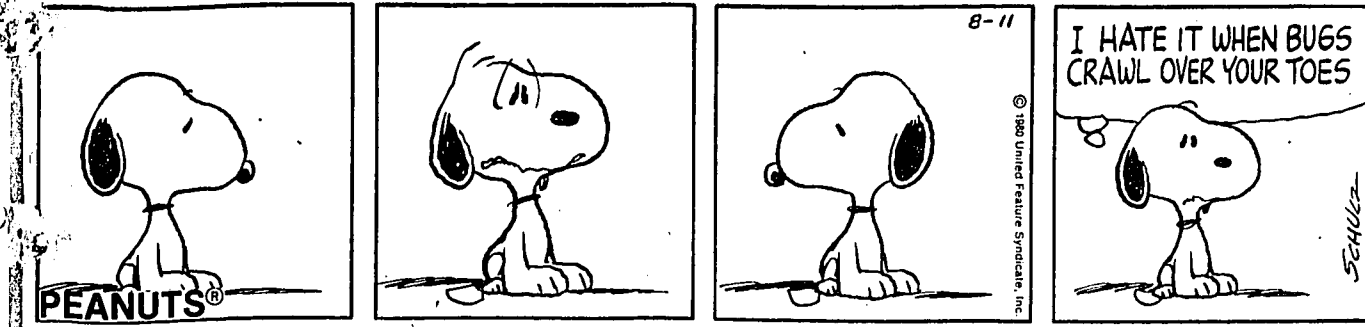
Minnich's unemployment didn't last long. The board was advised that its actions were illegal. Minnich agreed to meet with the board, which gave him his old job back.

The board denies there was any connection between his decision to fire Minnich and his role in nuclear power.

"TMI never entered into the damned thing," board vice-president Dr. William Albright said flatly.

Minnich says he's willing to accept that statement and hopes everyone will forget the past. But he says he's not going to turn his back on the nuclear protest movement.

When Minnich started speaking out on nuclear problems, many critics said he should stick to football.
