There is no entry fee or other financial obligation required for entry.

Each Contestant must prepare and deliver from memory a 10 minute original speech

taking a position on one of these topics:

- Crowded Prisons: What to Do?
- Euthanasia: Mercy or Murder?
- E.R.A.: In or Out of the Federal Constitution?
- The Jury System: Is It Working?
- Choosing Good Judges: Elect or Appoint?

Judging Speeches will be judged on the basis of content, speaking technique, overall persuasiveness, and will be timed.

Competition Timetable

Level I - Manuscripts Manuscripts will be submitted for approval no later than January 31, 1981.

Level II - Auditions Competitors selected from the manuscript competition will be auditioned February 9-27. Quarter-finalists will be selected for a second audition after which semi-finalists will be named.

Level III - Semi-final Competition 9 semi-finalists will be brought to Lansing, Michigan, to appear before a select panel of Michigan court judges, April 2, 1981.

Level IV - Final Competition 3 finalists will compete before a panel of Michigan Supreme Court Justices, April 3, 1981.

Winner will be announced at a dinner the evening of April 3, at which time all 9 semi-finalists, their families, and the justices comprising the judging panels, will be the special guests of The Thomas M. Cooley Law School.
