

Professor earns legal privilege before the Supreme Court

Entitled to argue legal cases before the Supreme Court

Barry Myers, associate professor in the College of Business Administration, recently became a member of the select group of attorneys permitted to argue cases before the U.S. Supreme Court.

"It's a real experience to argue a case there," Myers said. "The Supreme Court is different in that it's an academic exercise."

To be entitled to argue cases before the Supreme Court, an attorney must be in practice for four or more years. Then he must take an exam and file an application for admission to the highest court in the state they practice in.

Once admitted to the highest court in the state, he needs recommendations from two attorneys already practicing before the Supreme Court. Lastly, the attorney must be in good standing and have all his credentials in order, Myers said.

The fact that many attorneys do not know how to apply for admission to the Supreme Court is a major reason why the group is so small, Myers said. Also, many attorneys do not apply for professional reasons, because they are unlikely to

see any of the cases they argue reach the level of the Supreme Court.


Although Myers has no cases before the court now, he has definite ideas on how the election of Ronald Reagan will affect the direction of the court's decisions.

Myers, who calls himself a moderate to liberal democrat, said chances are good that several of the court's liberal justices will retire during the next four years.

He further speculated that if Ronald Reagan, as president, fills the vacant positions with conservative justices, the court might take a "conservative bent," but added, "I guess you always have to remain optimistic."

The question of how Myers' associate professorship will combine with his new status was emphatically answered by Myers himself: "First and foremost, I'm an associate professor."

Myers received his Bachelor of Business Administration degree in economics from the University, and his law degree from Boston University. He specializes in business law and environmental land use and energy laws.
