

Holmgren's 2 goals key 6-2 Flyer win

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Paul Holmgren scored two goals and assisted on two others as the Philadelphia Flyers defeated the Calgary Flames 6-2 last night in a National Hockey League game.

Calgary scored at 1:04 of the first period on a five-on-three power-play advantage as Holmgren and Mel Bridgman sat in the penalty box. Kent Nilsson scored his 43rd goal, 17th on a power play, to put the Flames ahead 1-0.

Sports briefs

Holmgren scored his first goal of the period, sliding a shot under Flames defenseman Brad Marsh, who screened his goalie, Rejean Lemelin. Holmgren then assisted on Philadelphia's next two goals, both power plays.

Ken Linseman put in his own rebound for his 17th goal of the season, and Rick MacLeish took a Linseman pass for his 38th tally and a 3-1 first-period Philadelphia edge.

The Flames closed to within 3-2 when defenseman Paul Reinhart scored on another power play 2:47 into the second period. Flyers defenseman Glen Cochrane had been assessed 29 minutes in penalties, giving Calgary the advantage.

Blues 6, Sabres 5

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — St. Louis defenseman Jack Brownschilde broke away to score a short-handed goal in the third period yesterday as the Blues trimmed the Buffalo Sabres 6-5 in National Hockey League action.

The Blues trailed 3-1 midway through the second period before Perry Turnbull, who also tallied :39 into the opening

period, and Mike Zuke erased the deficit with goals three minutes apart.

Following Brownschilde's deciding score, St. Louis increased its lead when Jorgen Pettersson and Wayne Babych added insurance goals.

Phillie cuts

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) — The Philadelphia Phillies sent seven players to their minor league spring training complex yesterday for further assignment, the National League team announced.

On Saturday, the Phillies released veteran right-handed pitcher Ed Hallerki, who had been invited to the team's spring training camp for a tryout.

The seven players reassigned included pitcher Scott Munninghoff, catcher Orzle Virgil, infielders Julio Franco and Ryne Sandberg, and outfielders Will Culmer, Bob Denier and Al Sanchez.

The cuts leave the Phillies with 26 players on their spring training roster, which must be trimmed to 25 by April 8.

Sixers win over Boston behind Erving

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Philadelphia 76ers, in a 126-94 romp over Boston, boot the Celtics out of first place in the National Basketball Association and hoped their impressive play yesterday sets the stage for the season finale.

"On the court we were intense and when we got 20 points ahead we knew we had won the ballgame before it was over," said the 76ers' Julius Erving, who pumped in 24 points, eight in the final quarter.

"There was a great feeling. It was an impressive victory for this last part of the season and I hope it sets the stage for our last game against Boston."

"Boston can do a lot of things better than they did today and we have to respect the Celtics," he added. "They were more pressure on us today since we went into this game a half-game behind Boston."

Asked how the loss affected the Celtics, coach Bill Fitch said: "The only injury was to our pride. Other than that we got out butts beat pretty well."

"I'm not worrying about Philadelphia again until we play them next Sunday (at Boston). We played poorly. We've got to play up to our ability again."

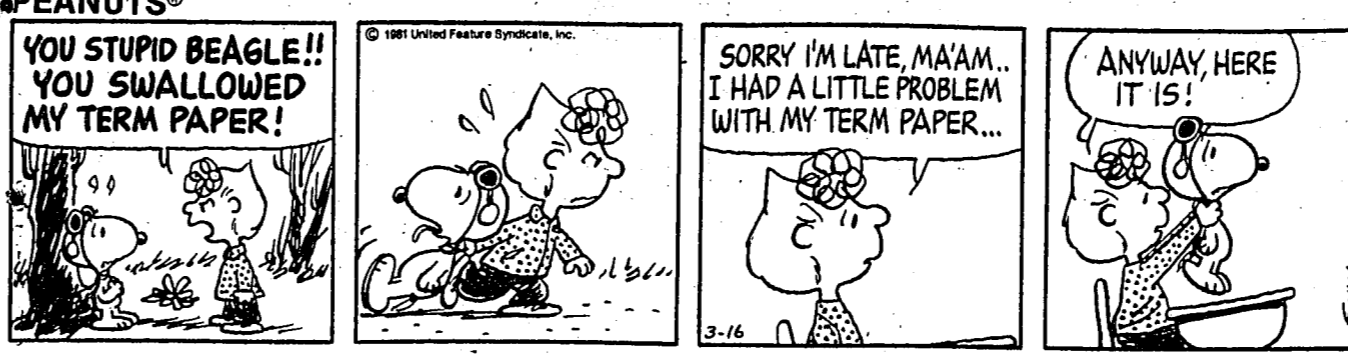
We just have to get our game going again and get our confidence.

"It's not something that will take weeks to do, hopefully, just another game. We were not tired physically or mentally. The 76ers set the tone early. The challenge was there. But we were not able to meet it. It was just our fault."

The Celtics dropped to second place in the division. It was Boston's ninth straight loss at the Spectrum.

The 76ers scored the first five points and never trailed. The closest Boston came was in the first quarter, 12-15.

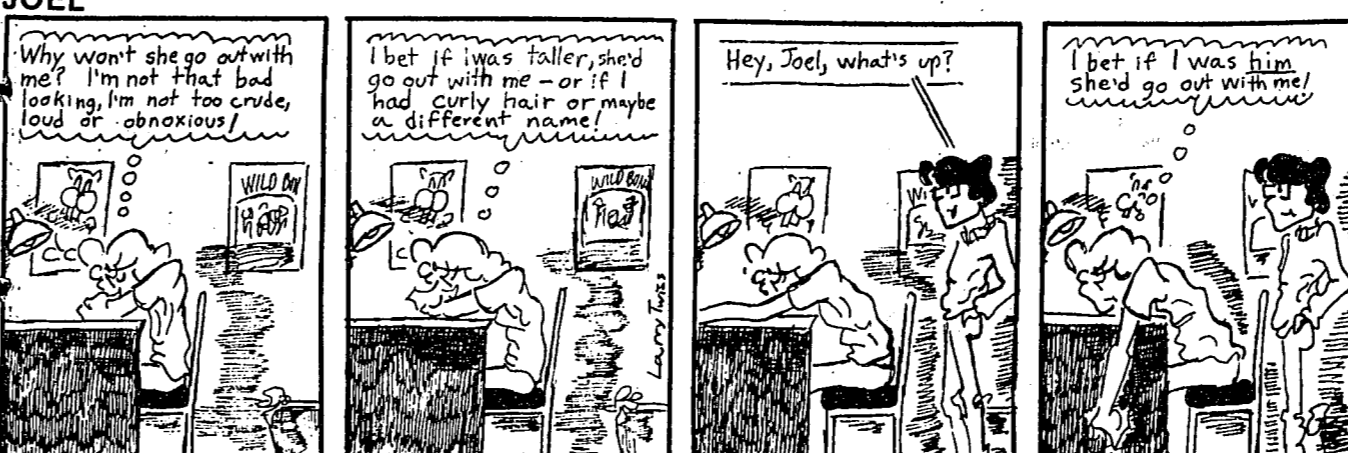

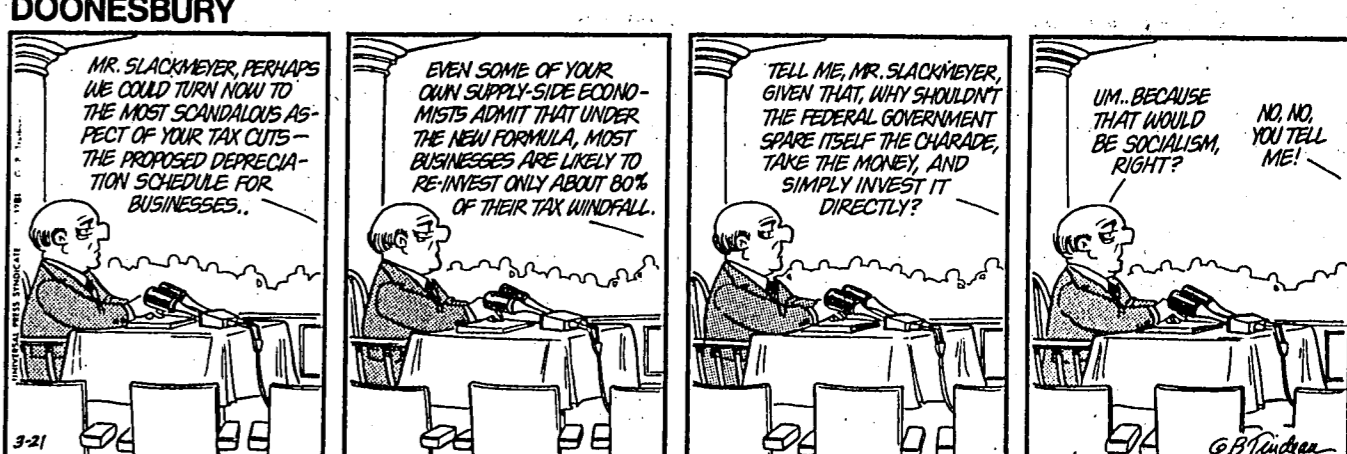
