# Netwomen begin spring cleaning sweep

The women's tennis team feels it has something to prove this spring.

"We didn't have our accustomed undefeated fall," Penn State coach Candy Royer said. "I think they all want to prove something."

By beating Bucknell (9-0), James Madison (8-1) and Rutgers (9-4) at home over the weekend, the Lady Lions' spring mark now stands at 4-1. And even though the matches were one-sided, Lady Lion co-captain Carole Zajac said some good came out of them.

"There are always individual things you can work on," she said. "This weekend helped us to see how everybody's doing. Some things come out in matches more than they would in practice."

The results of the matches were never seriously in doubt. Against overmatched Bucknell, Penn State swept all nine matches in straight sets, the closest being 6-3.

James Madison presented a bit more of a challenge, with one singles match extending to three sets and two needing a tiebreaker. But again the Lady Lions swept the singles, losing only at No. 3 doubles.

Against Rutgers, only one singles

match went to three sets, and again all were won by Penn State.

"It was a little bit of a surprise," Lady Lion Carol Daniels said. "I thought everybody played well. It's easy to have a letdown when you're not playing teams on your own caliber."

"We had a couple of close matches with James Madison, but we pulled them out. I think we may have underestimated them a bit. We thought Rutgers would be tougher."

Daniels, the Lady Lions' No. 1 singles and along with Anne Beasley the No. 1 doubles combination, was one of five Lady Lions that won all three singles matches.

"I'm really excited about the way she's been playing," Royer said. "She's playing strong, aggressive tennis—and she's combining it with good mental tennis."

Daniels said the mental aspect of her game is one of the things she's been working on.

"I've had to work on my concentration," she said. "Sometimes I would lose control out on the court. But now I'm keeping much better control of myself and concentrating a lot more, and it's helped my game 100 percent."

She Whiteside continued her comeback after sitting out the fall season with an ankle injury. She swept her three singles matches at No. 4, and also combined with Cherise Dow for three doubles victories.

"Sue's making a great comeback," Royer said. "She's a necessary part of our team. When she's at singles, she makes us that much deeper. And she strengthens our doubles teams."

Depth is one thing the Lady Lions have a lot of. Royer is still undecided on a permanent No. 3 doubles team, and she used three different combinations—Zajac and Donna DiRenzo, Val Garcia and Liz Campbell, and DiRenzo and Zenia Matkowsky.

"I can't find an outstanding combination," Royer said. "There are five people I can use interchangeably. They're all strong."

"Everybody's working hard in practice; they're all giving 100 percent. There's a lot of intensity during challenge play—maybe more than match play. They all know the positions are on the line."

Said Zajac, "it (the competition) keeps us on our toes."

And since only one team will qualify from the Eastern Regional for the national tournament, being on their toes may be the advantage the Lady Lions will need.

# Thompson keys Buc win

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP) — Jason Thompson, in his first game as a Pirate, collected three hits, including a two-run homer, as Pittsburgh routed the Cincinnati Reds 14-1 yesterday in exhibition baseball.

Don Robinson, 1-1, was the winner, Frank Pastore, 1-1, the loser.

The Reds, now 11-13 in pre-season, went ahead 1-0 in the second inning. Dan Driessen walked, advanced to third on Johnny Bench's double and scored on a ground out by Ray Knight.

But Pittsburgh, now 15-11, got two runs in the bottom of the inning on Thompson's single and a home run by Bill Robinson.

The Pirates added two more runs in the third, another pair in the sixth and one in the seventh before erupting for seven runs of Reds reliever Jeff Lahti in eighth.

Two-run homers by Thompson and Kurt Bevacqua keyed the Pittsburgh outburst.

# Baseball team wives away pair

The new slogan for the Penn State baseball team this year — "It's gonna take a while."

The slogan was used Friday night, when the team bus broke down just across the New Jersey state line, forcing the team to travel at 25 mph all the way to New Brunswick.

The saying was used again Saturday, when the still-developing Lions lost a double-header at Rutgers, 6-5 and 9-0.

And the same slogan was used yesterday, when rain constantly interrupted Penn State's game with West Chester, which the Lions (2-5) eventually won, 6-3, in six innings.

"It's gonna take a while," Penn State coach Chuck Medlar said last night. "It's a young club. Today, we played very good baseball and beat a good club."

In the first game Saturday, the Lions hit the ball, got good pitching from Dave Spamer and were ahead 5-4 in the bottom of the last inning. But an error helped Rutgers score the tying and winning runs.

Penn State was one-hit in the second game and lost to Rutgers, 8-0.

After the game, the Lions were greeted by the same broken bus that brought them in.

It was late Saturday night when the team finally pulled into West Chester. There the Lions played the Rams yesterday afternoon between rainstorms.

As they did in Saturday's first game, the Lions got good hitting. Designated hitter Brad Mason hit a three-run home run in the third inning and catcher Terry Brush hit a solo shot.

Penn State got some good pitching too. Jim Bennett allowed two runs, four hits and struck out three in five innings.

And, after losing two games the day before, Penn State beat West Chester, 6-3, in the rain-shortened game.

"It looks like we might have put things together today," Medlar said last night. "We hit the ball well and Bennett pitched well. If we play the way we did today and get the pitching, we should do pretty well."

Of course, it may take a while.

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
