Rogers bids for 4th Boston title

By DAVE O'HARA AP Sports Writer BOSTON (AP) — Bill Rodgers, bidding for an unprecedented fourth consecutive victory on his hometown course, and Japanese sensation Toshiko Seko renew an old rivalry in the 85th Boston Marathon today...

Two years ago, Rodgers wore down Seko in bone-chilling rain and 42-degree temperatures to run the fastest marathon in American history — 2 hours, 9 minutes, 27 seconds. Seko was second, 2:21:12.

Both Rodgers, a 33-year-old Boston sportsman, and Seko, winner of the prestigious Fukuoka International Marathon in Japan last year, had three years, dodged queries about setting possible records.

"I think I'm capable of breaking the record, but I'm just looking forward to a great race," Rodgers said. "I want to be in the thick of it, to be part of the action."

"I'm in excellent shape, but I'm not thinking of a record," Seko said. "You can't think of records going into a marathon. Maybe in shorter races you can, but not in a marathon."

Trevino wins MONY-TOC title

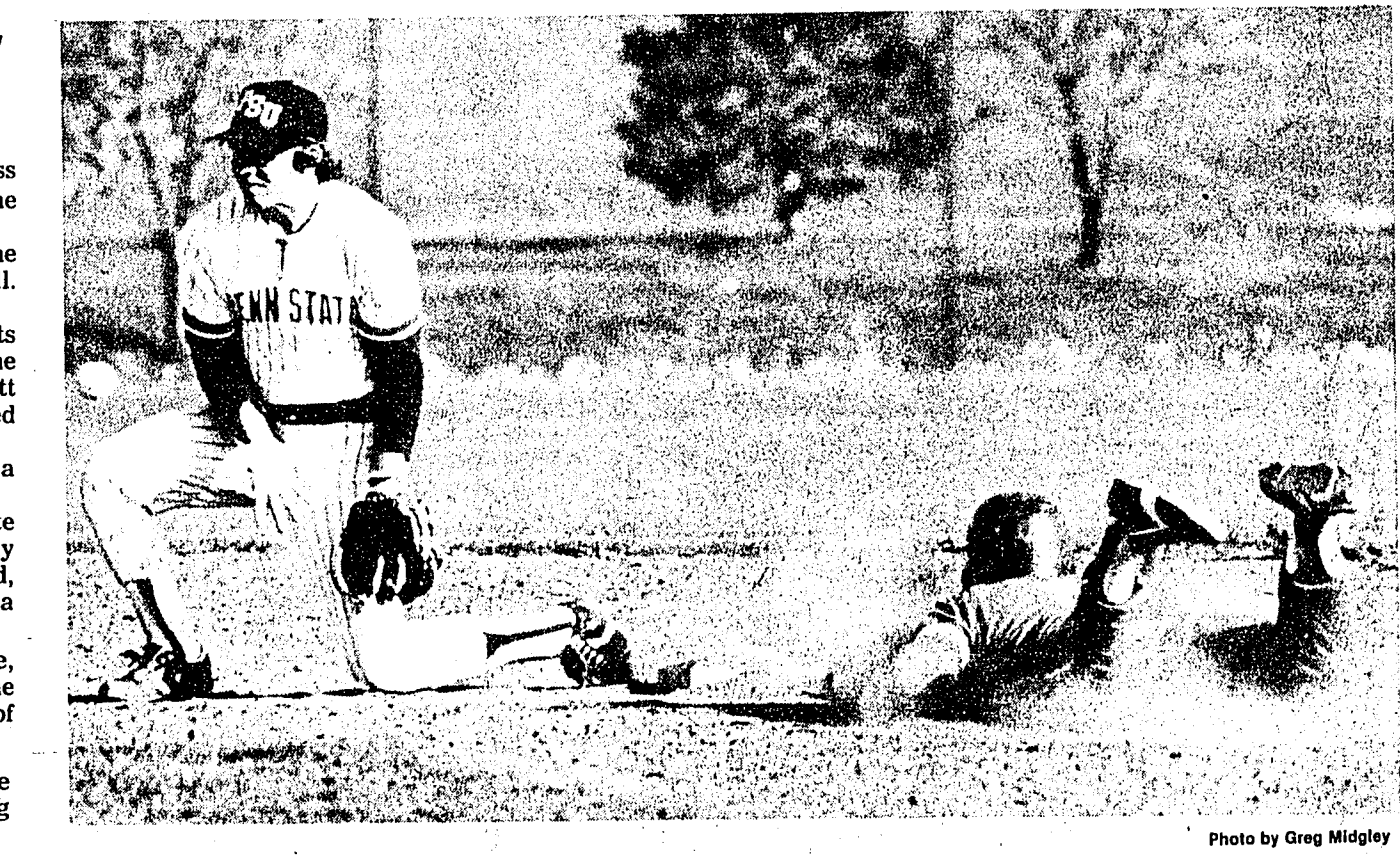
