**Goldschmidt honorable mention winner in contest**

A Penn State history professor noted for the unusual ways he has of getting his students totally immersed in the subject of Middle East history was one of the winners in the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education's nationwide contest for Professor of the Year.

History professor Arthur Goldschmidt Jr. was one of five college professors who received an honorable mention in the council's annual competition.

Goldschmidt is an associate professor of Middle East history and former chairman of the Middle East Studies Committee. Gerald Egger, head of the history department, recommended Goldschmidt for the award and the University sent in the nomination.

Egger called 1981 a "particularly good year" for Goldschmidt, and Eddy said, "I feel as if I've done nothing this year but give him awards. He is an extraordinary person."

On receiving the award, Goldschmidt said, "I am deeply honored and proud to accept this award."

Eddy then read a letter a copy of which had been sent to the council earlier to the audience from Stanley P. Paulson, dean of the College of The Liberal Arts. The letter said Goldschmidt is "determined to change students' attitudes and force them to seek their knowledge."

"He tries to give his students total immersion into the middle eastern world, sometimes coming to class dressed in the native garb of that region," Paulson wrote. "I know of no one who makes himself more available to the students."

Concerning the current problems in the Middle East, Goldschmidt said the Chris-

tians and Moslems are now feuding in Egypt as well as other nations in the unpredictable region.

"In many countries, religious alliances are influencing politics too much," he said. "(Egyptian President Anwar) Sadat thinks so and I agree."

In order for Saudi Arabia to get its AWACS search and radar planes from the United States, "Saudi Arabia should play a more active role in supporting the Camp David peace process," Goldschmidt said.

Among the other awards received by Goldschmidt is the 1976 Outstanding Academic Adviser of the College of The Liberal Arts. He is also the holder of the Class of '33 award for Outstanding Contribution to the Humanities.

Goldschmidt will not be on campus for the next academic year. He will be making his fifth trip to Egypt, this time to Cairo to do research on two books.
