

CFA, TV fray is delayed

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Just as the NCAA was driving for the winning touchdown, the College Football Association pulled a truly nifty trick.

The CFA moved back the game line and took possession. Now the CFA is driving.

Who finally will emerge victorious in this struggle for control of football television has become tougher than ever to predict. But a few things seem logical.

The CFA, figure most observers, admitted weakness yesterday by moving the deadline for final declaration on its separate television pact from Sept. 10 to Sept. 18.

The 61 CFA schools had been told since July they would have three weeks, or until Sept. 10, to change the ballot they cast at their Aug. 21. The vote to adopt the CFA television plan

with NBC was 33-20 at a meeting in Atlanta, and 31 votes were needed. Penn State was one of those voting "yes."

Then, from all appearances, CFA support began eroding. Last week, the Big Eight, Southeastern and Atlantic Coast conferences said they were withholding final decision on adopting the NCAA or the CFA package to give the NCAA a chance to call a special convention to reorganize its top football division.

In federal court in Oklahoma, the universities of Oklahoma and Georgia filed a similar action on the property rights issue, insisting the schools themselves, not the NCAA, own the property right to telecasts of their own football team.

And then yesterday, the announcement came that the CFA board of directors had changed the final declaration date to Sept. 18.

And that could be years from now.

Dolphins host Pittsburgh tonight

MIAMI (AP) — The Pittsburgh Steelers and Miami Dolphins were the most dominant teams in the National Football League during the 1970s, winning six of the decade's 10 Super Bowls.

But their storied histories — although still very much a part of the mystique of both clubs — will be in the background tonight when the American Conference rivals, both struggling to recapture the magic of the past, collide in a nationally televised matchup before more than 65,000 people at the Orange Bowl.

The 8:30 p.m. game could be billed as a battle between experience — the Steelers retain 15 veterans who have played in four Super Bowls and 10 others who have appeared in at least one — and inexperience, as the Dolphins have just more than 24 years of age and retain only two players from their last Super Bowl appearance, in 1974.

The Steelers, though, looked unseasoned in their 1981 opener Sunday, fumbling eight times, losing five, while quarterback Terry Bradshaw threw two interceptions in a 37-33 loss to Kansas City.

Miami, meanwhile, rolled past St. Louis 20-7 as second-year quarterback David Woodley tossed a pair of touchdown passes and the young Dolphins defense yielded only 61 yards on the ground.

"You just can't make as many mistakes as we did and expect to win in this league," said Bradshaw, whose fourth-

quarter fumble was scooped up by Kansas City linebacker Thomas Howard and returned 69 yards for the winning touchdown with 1:59 remaining.

Steelers coach Chuck Noll, entering his 13th season with a 6-3 winning percentage, simply called the defeat a "team effort."

"If we keep making the same kind of mistakes, it's going to be a long, long year," said Noll. "But I am not considering any personnel changes."

The Steelers will face Woodley with

third-year pro Dwayne Woodruff at left cornerback, in place of the injured Ron Johnson.

Woodley, who became the Dolphins No. 1 quarterback last season after Bob Griese was injured, completed 14 of 28 passes for 178 yards against the Cardinals, but was sacked four times for 37 yards in losses.

Miami coach Don Shula, six victories shy of becoming the fourth coach in NFL history to win 200 games, said his club will be looking to establish consistency in

its ground attack, which amassed 144 yards Sunday.

The Steelers, who have not lost the first two games of any season since 1970, have never beaten the Dolphins in Miami, although the club did win two of its Super Bowl titles in the Orange Bowl.

The last Miami victory over Pittsburgh came in 1973. The Steelers have won all three meetings since, including a 23-10 decision last season, to even the series at three games apiece.

Ex-Steeler Bahr back in NFL with 49ers

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP) — The San Francisco 49ers have signed place-kicker Matt Bahr, and the former Pittsburgh Steeler is expected to coach the kicking in Sunday's home opener against the Chicago Bears.

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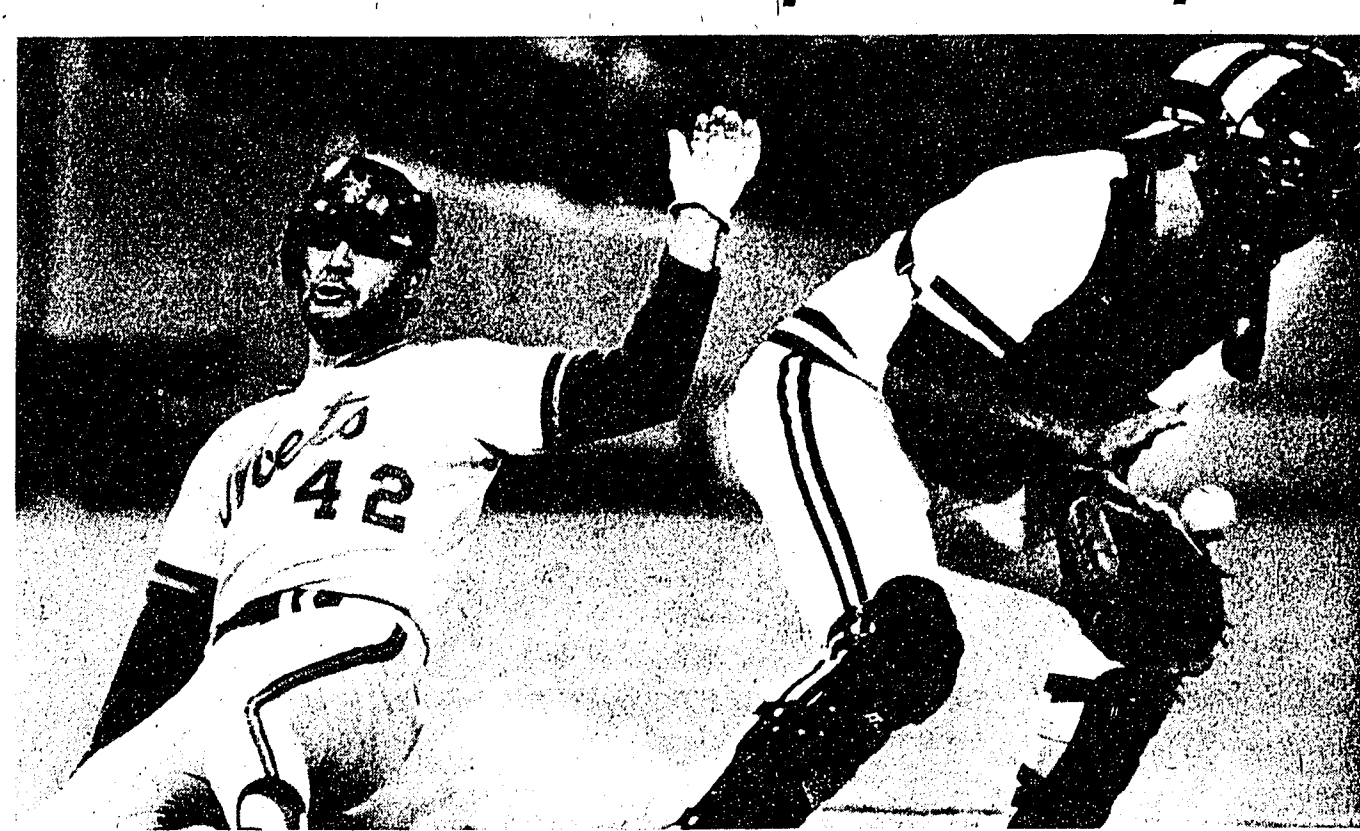

Hubie Brooks rapped a pair of run-scoring singles and Terry Leach pitched 2 1/3 innings of scoreless relief last night in Pittsburgh to lead the New York Mets over the Pirates.

Bill Madlock drilled a two-run homer and lofted a sacrifice fly to account for Pittsburgh's scoring. Madlock entered the game as the National League's leading hitter at .338 despite an 0-for-14 slump prior to last night's contest.

Braves 9, Astros 8
Bob Horner hit a three-run homer, the 100th home run of his career, and Rafael Ramirez had four hits and three RBI to lead the Atlanta Braves to a 9-0 victory over the Houston Astros last night behind the eight-hit pitching of Phil Niekro. The veteran Niekro, 7.5, escaped several early jams to record his second shutout and second complete game of the season.

Reds 5, Padres 4
Johnny Bench's run-scoring single with two out in the ninth inning capped a three-run Cincinnati rally and gave the hometown 5-4 victory over the San Diego Padres yesterday. Reliever Tom Hume, 8-3, got the win after working only one-third of an inning.

Yankees 5-3, Brewers 5-5
A three-run homer by Cecil Cooper and a solo shot by Ben Oglivie supported the

combined six-hit pitching of Mike Caldwell and Rollie Fingers as the Milwaukee Brewers beat the New York Yankees 5-3 last night in New York to gain a split of a two-night doubleheader.

The Yankees took the first game 5-2 behind Jerry Mumphrey's four hits, including a two-run homer, and the six-hit pitching of veteran Tommy John.

In the second game, Fingers salvaged the win with his league-leading 23rd save.

Twins 3, Blue Jays 1

Fernando Arroyo, Jack O'Connor, and Doug Corbett combined on an eight-hit effort as the Minnesota Twins beat the Toronto Blue Jays last night in Bloomington.

The Indians 8, Orioles 5
Rookie Von Hayes, one of five Cleveland batters with two or more hits, drove in two runs as the Indians defeated the Orioles last night in Baltimore.

The Twins came just one-third of an inning short of tying their club record of 27-2 scoreless innings, while the Blue Jays snapped a string of 30 consecutive

scoreless innings dating back to a 3-0 victory over Chicago on Sunday.

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Jr. World spikers defeated by Brazil

The U.S. Junior World volleyball team, featuring three starters from the men's volleyball team, succumbed to Brazil 15-8, 15-11 and 15-9 Tuesday night in the secondary pool at the Junior World Championships in Colorado Springs, Colo.

The U.S. faced Korea late last night at the Air Force Academy and had to win that match in order to advance to the Final Four. Korea also lost to Brazil earlier this week, but won two games in the match.

"We did some things well, but we did not, throughout the match, hit effectively from the outside," Penn State head coach and U.S. assistant coach Tom Tait said. "We had numerous opportunities, but did not put the ball away."

All three Lions — setter Bruce Van

Horn, middle blocker Mark Kraynik and outside attacker Jeff Johnson — were scheduled to start last night's game with Korea, Tait said.

In the last encounter between the two squads, Korea upended the U.S. three games to one in the Pac-Rim Championships in Hawaii.

Bucs name minor leaguers received in Garner trade

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday named two of three minor league players the team received in a trade that sent second baseman Phil Garner to the Houston Astros.

When Garner was traded to Houston earlier this month, minor league infielder Johnny Ray was the only other player in the deal to be officially identified.

In addition to Ray, the Pirates said yesterday they have received outfielder Kevin Houston and left-handed pitcher Randy Niemann.

Niemann, who underwent surgery in early July to remove bone chips in his left elbow, has been assigned to the Pirates' Portland AAA farm affiliate in the Pacific Coast League.

Before his surgery last year, Niemann recorded four wins and two losses in 10 starts with a 4.89 ERA. He played for Tucson, the Astros' AAA farm team.

Houston has been assigned to Alexandria, Pittsburgh's Class A affiliate in the Carolina League, a team spokesman said. He batted .247 for Daytona of the Florida State League in 104 games, hit three home runs and had 46 RBI.

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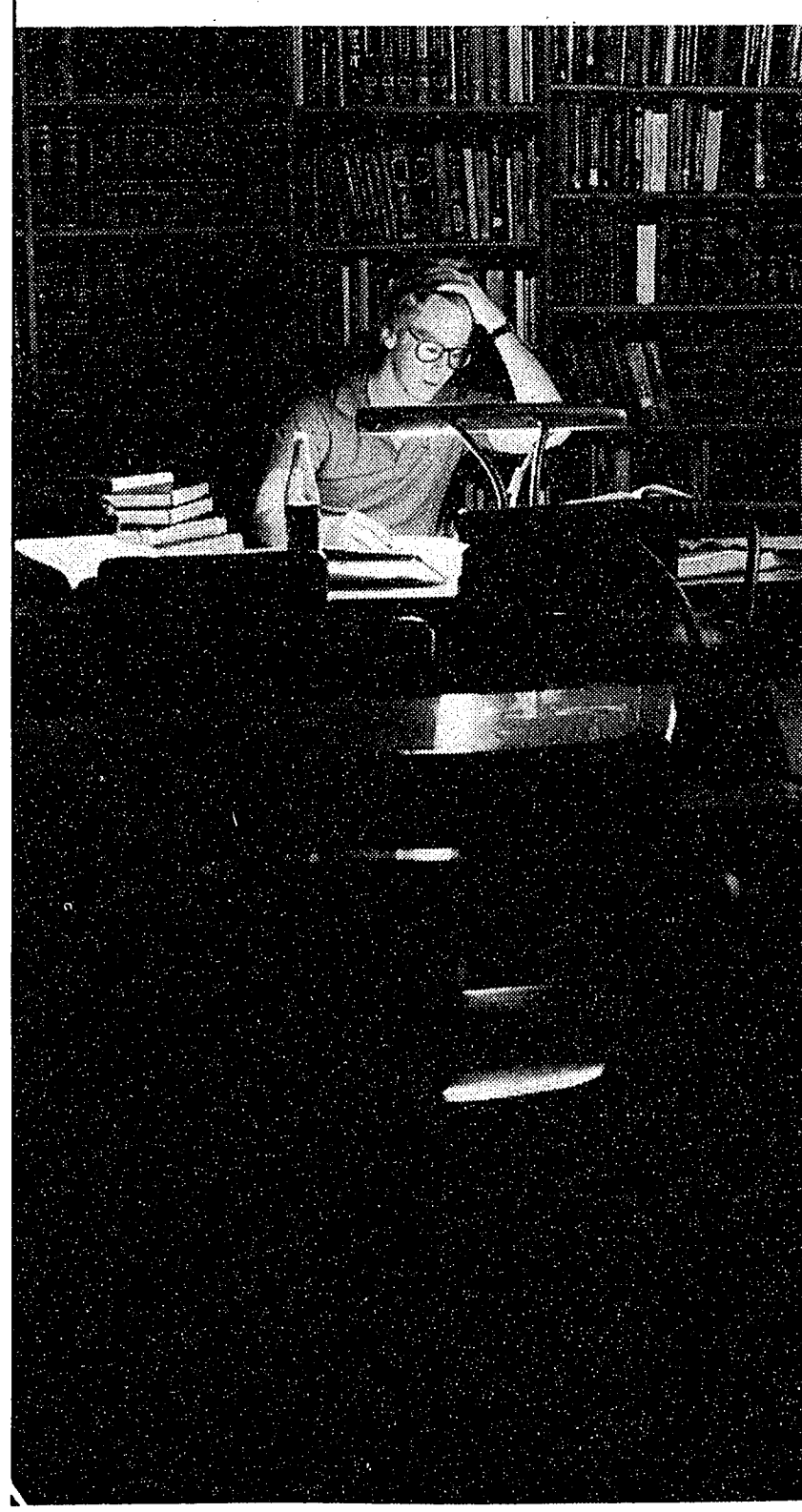
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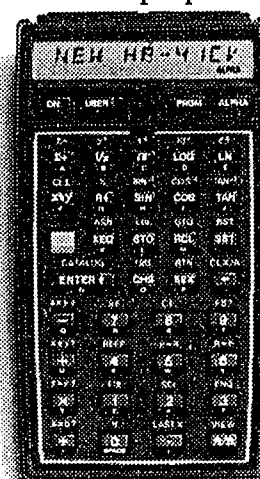
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
