

Presidential search goes on

To begin the search for a new University president, eight members of the University's Board of Trustees have been appointed to a Trustee Presidential Selection Committee.

The committee, which will ultimately recommend one presidential candidate to the full Board of Trustees in November, 1982, was established following Oswald's announcement that he will retire in June, 1983.

Quentin E. Wood, president of the Board of Trustees and chairman of the committee, said duties of the committee will include "formulating the search process — when it will start, who will participate and how it will be conducted."

Members of the Trustee Presidential Selection Committee are: Howard O. Beaver Jr., Reading; Walter J. Cantl, Doylerstown; the Honorable Roger A. Madigan, Towanda; Stanley G. Schaffer, Pittsburgh; Obie Snider, Inler; William K. Uherich of Clearfield and Dr. Helen D. Wise, Dover, Del.

Dr. Richard E. Grubb, senior vice president for administration at the University, will serve as executive secretary of the committee.

To assist with the presidential search process, Wood said the Trustee Committee has established a University Presidential Search and Screen Committee, which will be composed of representatives from various groups at the University.

Wood said the Trustee Committee has asked various organizations and groups on campus to submit names for possible membership on the Search and Screen Committee by Oct. 15.

The Search and Screen Committee's main duty will be to receive and evaluate applications and nominations for the position of University president, he said.

"The 15-member Search and Screen Committee will begin reviewing and screening all applications and nominations that are made for the position soon after Oct. 15," Wood said.

The Search and Screen Committee will continue screening applications until May, 1982, he said.

"The Trustee Committee will then ask the Search and Screen Committee for a list of five to 10 names," Wood said. "The Trustee Committee will then review this condensed list and select one name for the position and submit this name to the full Board of Trustees at the November, 1982 meeting."

Members of the Presidential Search and Screen Committee, which will be announced soon after Oct. 15, will include:

- Eight faculty members: four will be officers of the University Faculty Senate — its chairperson, chairperson-elect, past chairperson and secretary.
- Two faculty members will be from the University Park campus, one from a branch campus and one from the University Graduate Council.
- Two deans, to be selected from all University deans, including those of Admissions and The Milton S. Hershhey Medical Center, Libraries, Graduate School, Behrend College and Capitol Campus.
- One member of the president's administrative staff.
- One Commonwealth Campus director.
- Two students, one undergraduate and one graduate.
- One alumnus — the president of the Alumni Association.

Bike security and registration crucial

The most important aspects of bicycle theft prevention are registering the bicycle with University Police Services and securing it properly, a crime prevention specialist at University police said.

"It's a type of opportunistic crime," said John E. Rideout. "If you leave your bike unlocked and unsecured, it's going to walk away."

He said the bicycle should be secured to an object that is itself secure. The three major portions of the bicycle — the frame, rear and front wheels — should

all be secure, or at least the most expensive portions should be. It is possible to remove separate portions of the bicycle if they are not all secure, he said.

The bicycle should be locked up with a reliable chain and lock.

"If you spend in excess of \$100 for a multi-speed bike, you should spend a little more to secure it," he said.

No bicycle thieves were arrested in the last fiscal year, though about 16 bicycles were recovered, he said. When someone is arrested he is charged with theft under state law, he said.

Registration of the bicycle enables University police to identify it more easily in the event it is stolen. Rideout said information on registered bicycles is cross referenced in computers that are linked to computers at other police stations.

Rideout said 103 bicycles of an average value of \$100 each were reported stolen at the University last year. The State College Police Department said 144 bicycles were reported stolen in town between January and June, 1981.

"I tend to think Spring and Fall are worse months for theft because the nice weather increases riding," Rideout said. He said officers on patrol check bicy-
