Harriers compete at IC4As Face toughest challenge so far this season

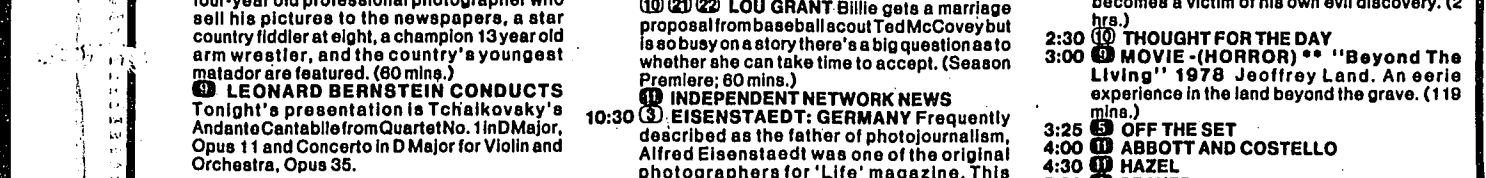
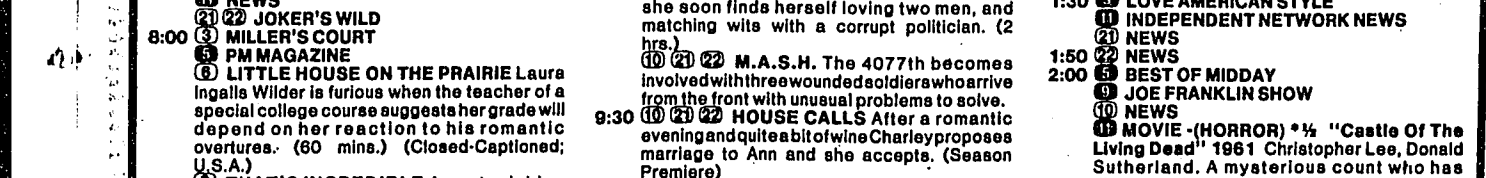
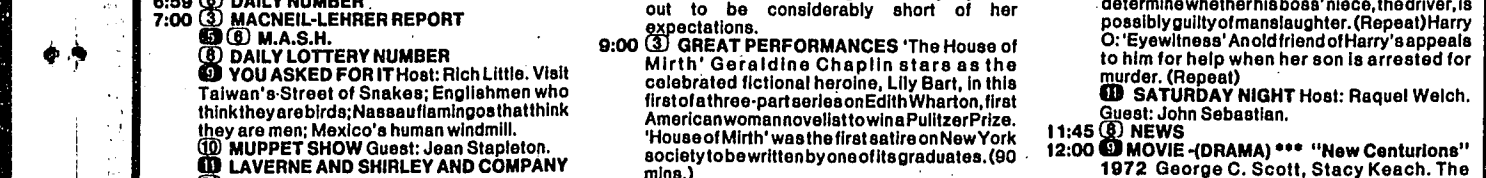
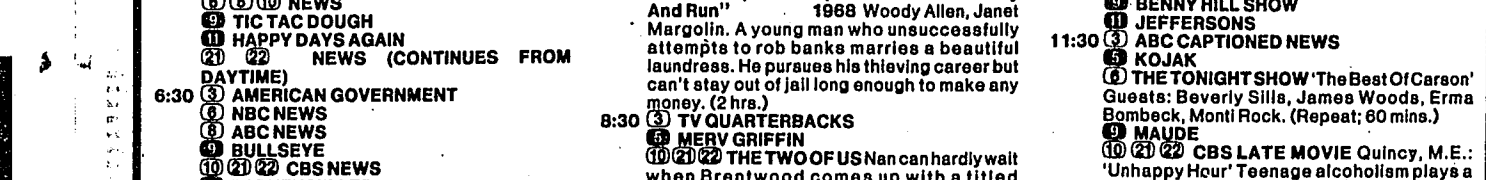
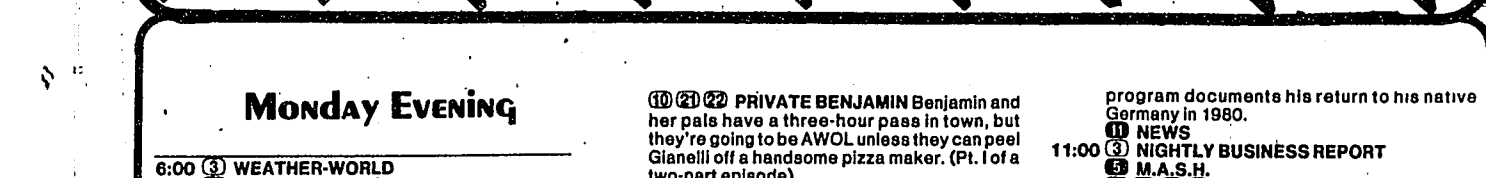
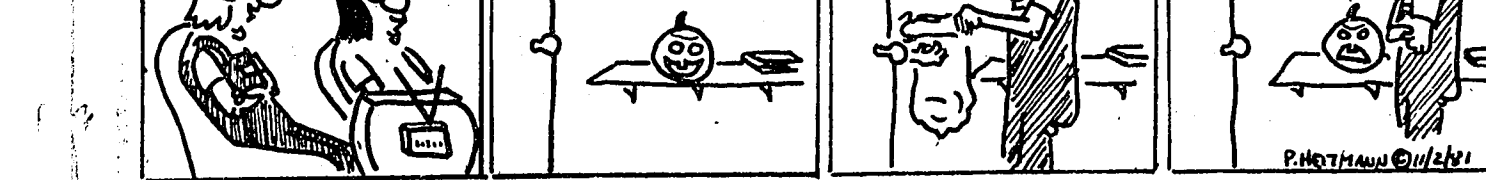
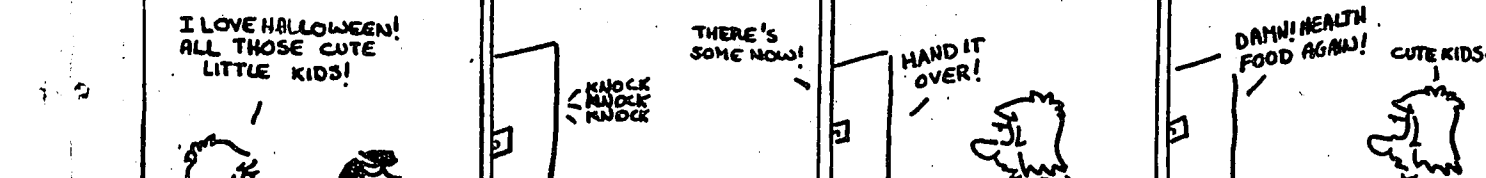
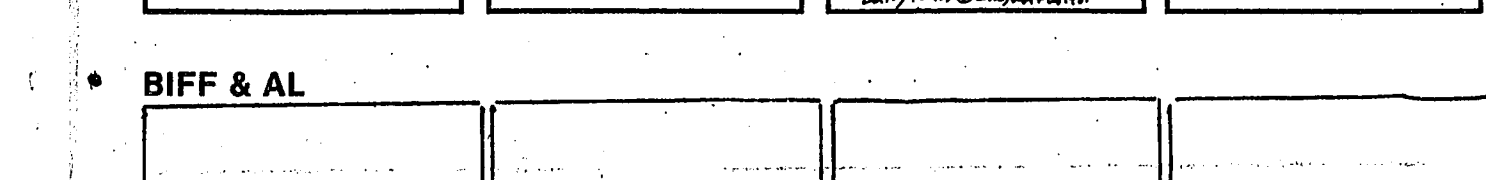
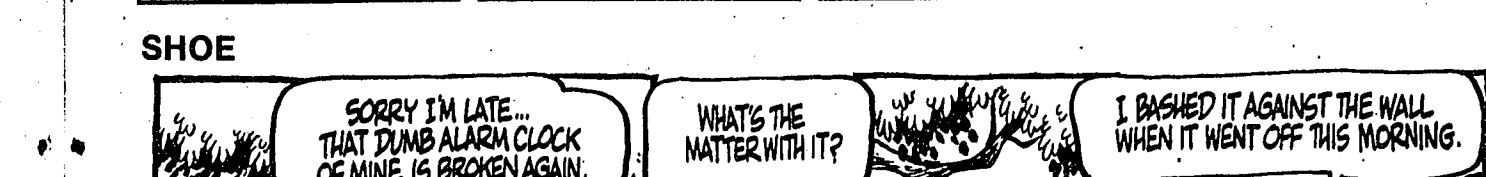
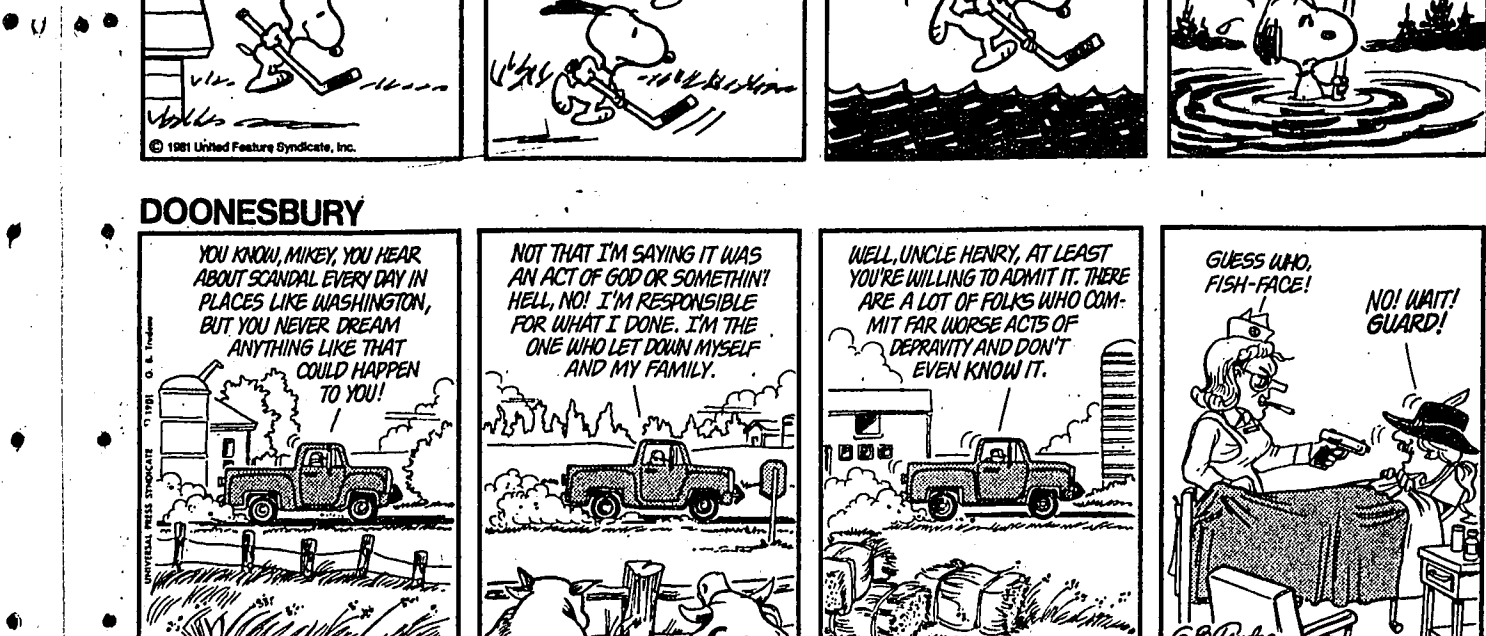
could be the presence of Providence, perhaps the best cross country team in the nation next to the University of Texas—El Paso.

PARADISE VALLEY, Ariz. (AP) — Despite a so-so season in 1981, San Diego Padres general manager Jack McKeon said his National League baseball club did not miss slugging outfielder Dave Winfield as much as people think.

"Not really," said McKeon, who attended general managers meeting here this weekend. "Nothing against Dave. He does everything he had."

McKeon squelched speculation that he is in line for the job. McKeon, however, was less glib on the reported swap between the Padres and Los Angeles for Dodger outfielder Pedro Guerrero and San Diego's slick-fielding shortstop Ozzie Smith.

Asked if any progress was being made in the negotiations, McKeon said: "Not that I know of."

The field hockey team is seeded No. 1 for the Eastern Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women regional playoffs.
