

Pens tops Caps; Flyers tie Rangers

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Rookie Mike Bullard and Andre St. Laurent scored two goals apiece as the Pittsburgh Penguins defeated Washington 7-2 in a NHL game last night and seriously damaged the already slender playoff hopes of the Capitals.

The victory gave Pittsburgh a 10-point lead over Washington in the battle for the fourth and final playoff spot in the Patrick Division. Washington has 12 games remaining, two against Pittsburgh, and the Penguins have 11 to play.

Bullard scored two of Pittsburgh's four goals in the second period, increasing his total to 22. St. Laurent and Rod Shutt also scored during the period, giving the Penguins a 5-2 lead.

Paul Gardner and St. Laurent scored in the final period for Pittsburgh, which has won three consecutive road games despite notching only seven victories away from home in 34 starts this season.

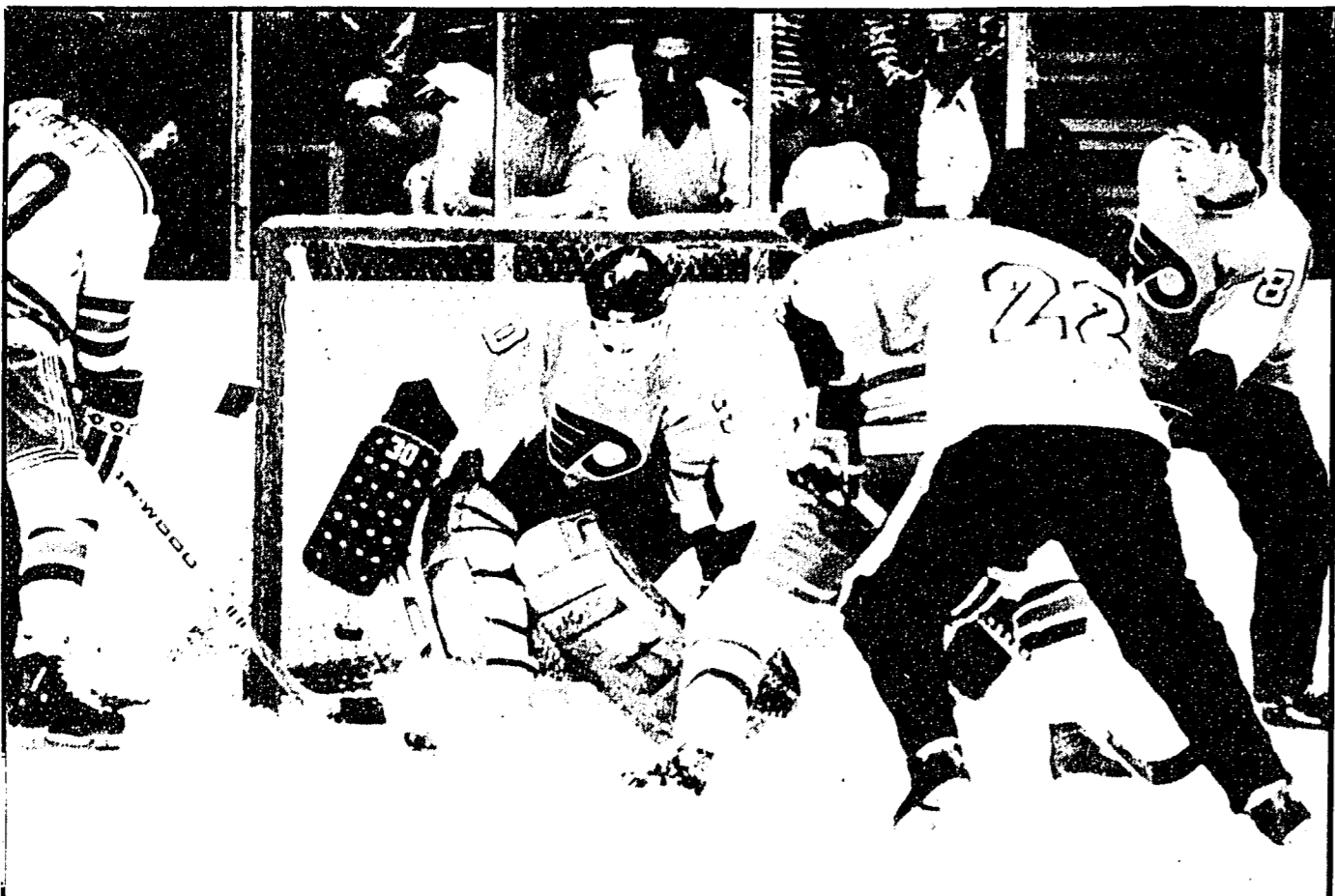
George Ferguson scored Pittsburgh's opening goal while the Penguins were shorthanded in the first period, and Bobby Carpenter retaliated on a power-play goal for the Caps on the same penalty.

Bengt Gustafsson scored for Washington in the second period.

Flyers 5, Rangers 5
NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie Ron Flockhart's 30-foot slapshot on a Philadelphia power play with 1:17 remaining last night lifted the Philadelphia Flyers into a 5-5 NHL tie with the New York Rangers.

The Flyers rallied from a 5-2 hole with three goals in the last 8 1/2 minutes. The tying score, Flockhart's 30th of the season, came after New York's Andre Dore was penalized for playing with an illegal stick. Philadelphia's Reg Leach had fired in a 15-foot wrist shot to bring the Flyers within 5-3 at 11:34 and, at 16:03, the Flyers pulled within a goal on a tally by Ilkka Sinisalo.

The Rangers grabbed a 2-0 lead after one period on a pair of power-play goals. Mark Pavelich established a team record for points by a rookie, getting his sixth point on his 20th goal, a backhander into an unguarded cage after Flyers goalie Rick St. Croix had stopped a shot by Mike Rogers. Don Maloney scored the other goal on the rebound of Reijo Ruotsalainen's slapshot from the point.

Two goals by Brian Propp tied the score in the middle period. Propp streaked in a pass from Brad Marsh at 3:30 and tipped Bill Barber's shot from the point on a power play past Rangers goalie Ed Mio at 11:13.

Only 50 seconds later, Rogers put the Flyers on top and stretched his consecutive-game points streak to 12. Maloney hit him with a perfect pass and Rogers scored on a breakaway with a shot over St. Croix's glove.

New York added two more goals in the third period. On a delayed penalty against the Flyers, Maloney passed to Rogers and slid into St. Croix. Rogers flipped a 10-foot shot into an empty net at 3:10.

Rob McClanahan sent home a 30-foot drive at 5:26 to make it 5-2.

Paterno given Dodd Award

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Bobby Dodd Award is presented "in recognition of a higher and more noble aspect of college coaching."

"I have great respect for Penn State football because of Joe Paterno," Dodd said, who compiled a 165-64-8 record during his 22 years as head coach at Georgia Tech.

"He cares about his football players, which is shown by the fact that the graduates almost 90 percent of them. I doubt if there's any other coach at a major program that can make that statement," Dodd added prior to the award presentation yesterday.

A plaque accompanying the award honors the recipient for "a style that emphasizes something more than winning a game... a belief that the game of football should be kept in perspective with college life in general."

It is presented annually by the American Sportsmanship Council, and Paterno accepted it at a luncheon in his honor at Three Rivers Stadium.

"The university has a commitment to football, but it's based on certain guidelines," Paterno said. "We wanted to do it with people who represent the university in a proper way."

Paterno has spent half of his 32 years at Penn State as the head coach. In those 16 years, his teams have won 151 or 82 percent of its games and made 14 bowl appearances. The Lions finished No. 3 in the country last year after beating Southern California in the Fiesta Bowl.

"One of the things I really admire about Joe and Penn State is that they play with student-athletes. They play with people who have come to get an education and play football both," Dodd said.

"That was my whole philosophy. We were going to graduate our football players. We were going to have an influence on their lives," Dodd added.

During an interview prior to the luncheon, Paterno said it is becoming increasingly difficult to keep college athletics in perspective because of the pressure to win at all costs.

And Paterno cited the situation at Texas A&M where former Pitt Coach Jackie Sherrill signed the richest college football pact on record to become coach and athletic director.

"You read about the shenanigans at Texas A&M and you wonder who's running the university," he said.

"I don't think Sherrill was wrong in taking what they were willing to give him. Everybody's entitled to do that," Paterno added.

The recipient of the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award is selected by a committee of former coaches and past recipients. It is sponsored by the Coca-Cola Co., Delta Airlines and The Atlanta Journal.

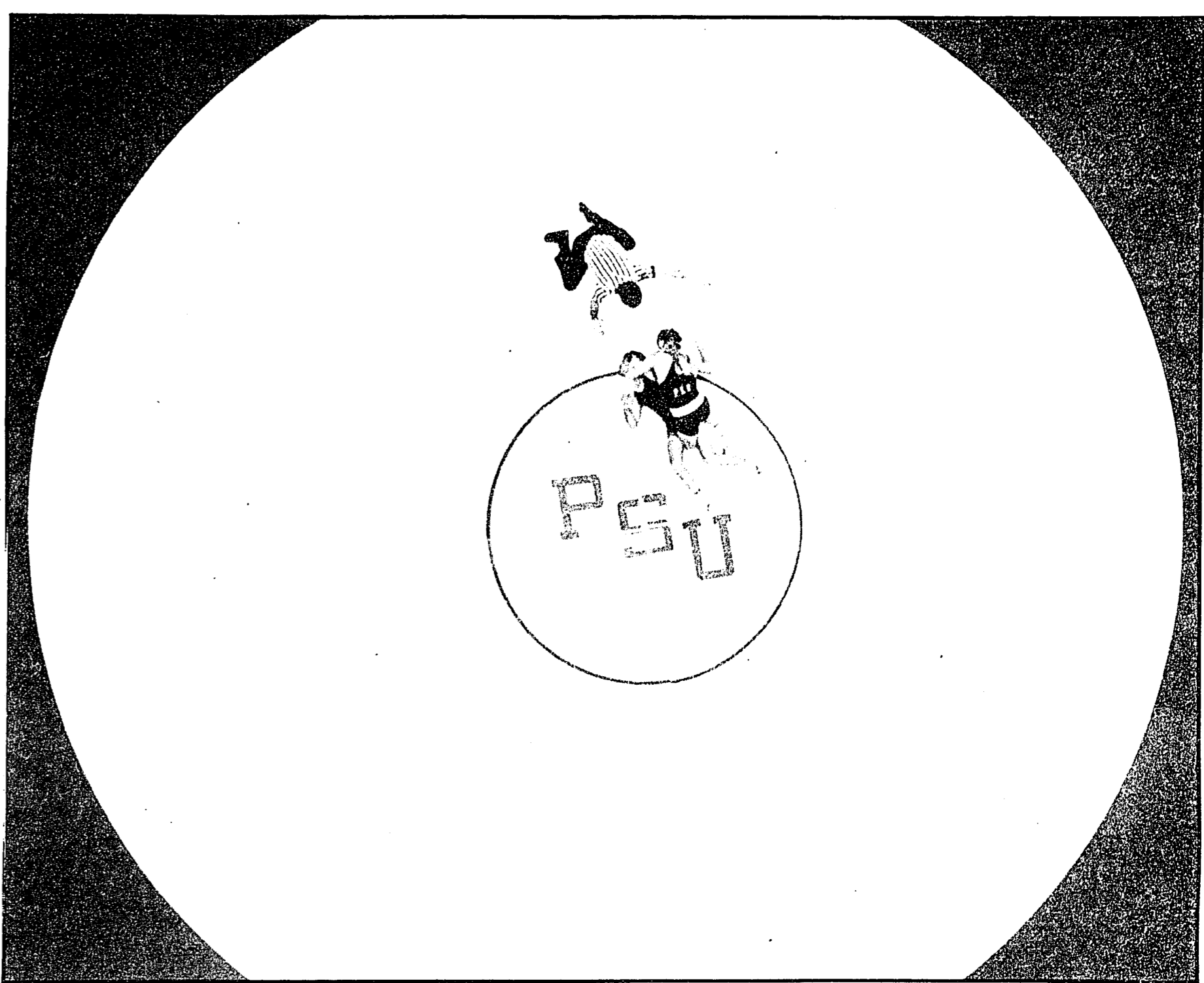
